Considerably closer to the US than either Puerto Rico or the Virgin Islands lie the small cluster of unspoiled islands known as the Turks and Caicos Islands. In the Atlantic about 30 miles southeast from the Bahamas and half-way between Miami and Puerto Rico, the group consists of 8 large islands and 40 smaller cays. The Turks Islands (Grand Turk and Salt Cay) are separated from the six Caicos Islands to the northeast by the deep channel of the Turks Island Passage.

Everything appears to be going just as the planning committee of the 80's had hoped for. When, Gerry, WA6POZ, #31274, Morrie, W6EHM, #4189, and I W6IRT, rewrote the entire 10-10 Bylaws, we had hoped that a large number of full members would maintain their interest and vote. A total of 4,400 ballots were received, this is more than 1/3 of our full paid membership.

In my opinion, this is a very reasonable return. I am sure it will pick up in future elections. Active members, active in the operation of 10-10 are exactly what we need to assure the future of this growing organization.

L.B. and Jean report that they received ballots with the following enclosures: QSL cards, advertising, membership renewal, religious stuff, request for repeater info and other things. We plan to include with the next ballot a request to not include anything other than the ballot.

The Annual 10-10 Board of Directors meeting was held early August in Seattle. All of the Officers and Directors were present with the exception of Gary

Ward, KD7UZ, #13825, who did not make it. The meeting agenda was prepared by Jack Miller, W9WYN, #6894. He did an excellent job. We followed the agenda as much as possible. The day prior to the meeting was taken up by an all day series of committee meetings and general discussion. This was helpful.

All committees came well prepared with material to discuss. One decision was to definitely not accept or promote any type of profit making product in the 10-10 News. We also decided to not change the classes of membership by adding a HANDICAP section. It was decided that our current handicapped members were not asking for any special deal. See the complete minutes of the 1992 meeting.

Now, here is some controversy: I personally would like to know how all of you feel about petitioning the FCC with a request to officially reduce the legal maximum power on ten meters. Now, I am talking about all classes of licenses, Novice through Extra. However, should the limit be limited to only 28.0 to 28.5 or 28.3 to 28.5, or maybe the whole band 28.0 to 29.7 MHz should be included??? Should the limit be 200 watts PEP or 500 watts PEP or what?? Would it reduce interference when the band is open or when a contest is on?? Would a permanent power reduction really solve any problems??? Should I continue thinking about it or forget it?? Maybe it would lead back to more experimenting with newer improved antennas?? I have been told by another national Amateur organization: "Never, ever volunteer to give up anything you already have. Especially with the FCC". Do you agree? Do you think this project should be an individual thing or should this be a 10-10 project????

Well there it is for this issue. I hope I have you stirred up enough to give some serious thought to the above questions. Discuss it at your chapter and club meetings. Let me know your thoughts on this subject.



exam session and his novice code at the Baytown VEC test session. He received his novice license from the FCC on July 27th and immediately fired up the family Kenwood TS 940S at home. His first QSO was with David Ober, W5RRR/KB5SWG, from the Johnson Space Center employees club station (10-10 #1123) and his second QSO and first DX was with Edwin Miller, W7GMH, in Hawaii. "That was so exciting that I try to make as many contacts as possible every day." says Casey.

Casey had the perfect chance to test his newly acquired skills the weekend following receipt of his license. Mike Davidson, KC5CP, helped Casey join the 10-10 club and gave him information on the contest held that weekend. Using the TS940 transceiver fed into a dipole, Casey made a total of 170 contacts in 30 states and 19 foreign countries! He managed all this in spite of getting a late start because of a misunderstanding about when the contest began.

Other local operators report that Casey caused quite a stir during the contest as many "piled up" to talk to him. Joe Hampton, N5NRN, of South Houston, TX listened to Casey during the contest and had the following high praise for him. "Casey was so smooth that he sounded like an old pro. He did an excellent job of handling those 'pile-ups'. There are a lot of us who could take some pointers from him on how to work a contest including me."

This contest made Casey eligible for his first award, the 100 Bar Award. He can hardly wait to receive it so he can frame it and hang it up in the family Ham Shack alongside of his FCC license. He plans to fill the walls with awards, as he has a young headstart to enjoy this hobby for a lifetime.

Casey's family has been just as excited about his interest in the hobby and so encouraged about his success in the 10-X contest, that his uncle Barry Haley, KI5WE, gave him a 10 meter yagi beam and his father Marty, AB5GU, erected a 50 foot tower for the antenna. Recent additions to the shack include a computer so Casey can become more adept at sending and receiving CW at faster speeds, and Packet radio with his mother, Wende, KB5TNU.

When Casey is not working DX, contests, or studying for his license upgrades, he does have other interests to keep him occupied. He is a straight A student at Pearl Hall Elementary School where he just began 3rd grade. He is a member of the Gulf Coast Youth Rodeo Association where his events include riding the bareback ponies and

calves. He is a voracious reader and enjoys Cub Scouts, swimming, roller skating, and cycling with his 9 year old brother, Cody.

A week after Wende sent me his biography, Casey had an accident while roller skating and broke his leg for a second time. Two days after the accident, Casey using crutches to walk, successfully passed his **Technician** class licensel **Congratulations Casey**. I predict by the time Casey turns eight, he will have passed his General CW code test and possibly have his Advanced license just like his father. One other note, his 9 year old brother Cody, is studying for his novice license and that will make the entire family amateurs. This is the start of another all 10-10 family.

In 1874 Jamaica annexed the islands and they remained a Jamaican colony until Jamaica became independent in 1962, leaving the Turks and Caicos a separate colony. In 1972, the islands acquired their own governor (appointed by the Queen of England) and today, the islands remain a British colony. Of the 12,000 people currently inhabiting the Turks and Caicos, most reside on Grand Turk and Providenciales, which is regarded as the most beautiful island.

Jody, VP5JM #52729, was born in Maryland, and visited the islands for the first time 16 years ago. She moved to Providenciales in 1981, and of all of the islands it has the most developed tourist industry. Jody not only manages other peoples homes and businesses, but has a guest house that she calls "The Hamlet" which she rents out to amateurs (and others). She says that renting her Hamlet to amateurs, which not only serves as a great spot for a vacation, but is also a great DX location has allowed her to meet so many nice hams, and through them has learned much more about amateur radio.

The equipment at VP5JM is an ICOM-751A, Heathkit SB200, PK232 and Lan-Link Software. The antennas are a 4-element tri-bander at 40 feet, a vertical and dipoles. Jody spends about 40 hours a week on the radio and loves 10-10 contests with her best effort resulting in 4th Worldwide for SSB. She has worked 275 countries. What does Jody like about amateur radio? "Mainly the friendliness and I love talking to so many far away places. During 10-10 contests, everyone is so nice, it's like 'old home week". Jody says that living on an island gives you even more reason for wanting to be an amateur radio operator. A course was given here so I took it and have been wrapped up in radio ever since. And quess what? In her spare time she is Secretary-Treasurer of the Turks and Calcos Amateur Radio Society.

TenX DX News

I hope everyone has survived the summer doldrums they have been terrible for DX here in the US! In Texas we have only had a few days of good propagation which resulted in hearing about 40 countries on ten. The conditions during the Summer QSO party were much below what everyone expected and scores will show a decline in the number of contacts from the previous summer. Likewise, the hunt for DX has not provided me with a new country since P29WK, #61592, was worked in Aprill

On September 1st the solar flux was 100 with an A=1 and K=1. These numbers were the best conditions all summer and do not reflect what has been a noisy summer with high A & K indexes that have stopped 10 meter DX! I predict we will hear Europe again this winter from the US but signals will be down 2-S units. You will start to hear Europe in October but due to cycle 22 changes, you will not hear Europe every day this winter. I just received a report from Ohio that Europe has been heard for a few hours, but weak signals.

I just completed a computer analysis of cycles 19, 20, 21 & 22 to see what we can expect for the remainder of cycle 22. A graph of these cycles shows that the prior cycles pretty much end up in the same general pattern in their last years as they approach minimum. The NOAA analysts are projecting a solar flux minimum in March 1996, so we will have a good DX season this winter!

This column was started when I offered to write DX news about members and others. All the calls you see here are 10-10's unless I say nonmem! Lets crank up the tower and see what's new for 10-10.

Feature DX Station: HP6AYV, 52764, Victor

Dr. Victor Warner is a specialist in lung medicine and enjoys ham radio. Victor at age 39 is an active 10-10 member who has earned many awards. He has a TS440 with a triband beam and likes to hangout on 28430 at 21-2200 during his coffee brake each afternoon. Victor is working on VP-WAS & OM-YL teams when not taking care of patients

that have lung problems etc. He worked the Summer QSO party where he made 426 QSO's for 795 points which may be the best DX score! Good luck Victor.

Victor has two problems: his 10-10 News is months late and the cost of dues! It cost him \$26 for his dues check to clear the bank! Without Air Mail his News takes 4 months. Victor went to a radio conference in Nicaragua YN in September and hopefully was on the radio as YN/HP6AYV. If you worked Victor, QSL to Dr. Victor Warner, Box 153, Santiago, Veraguas Panama. (US \$1 is the primary money in Panama).

Victor may be going back to Guatemala TG next year. We have a dozen members in TG but none are on the air!

When the mail gets delivered, he will be the fourth ham from the island to be a member. Two have moved and the third has not been active. He will be a nice addition to VP2V and he will be living on the island for a while. QSL Warrell, Box B, Road Town, Tortola, British Virgin Is.

Angola D2FGC operated by Stan, OK1FGC, #20103, has been active thru August. I have not seen any reports of ten meter activity but this is a much needed country. I suspect due to poor propagation on ten, that he stayed on 15 & 20. QSL must go to OK1AJN: Ivan Matejicek, Box 127, CS-46601 Jablonec nad Nisou Czechoslovakia

Bangladesh VK9NS, #47404, with a S21ZA by Jim Smith. Jim has been working on this for over a year and now S2 has begun issuing callsigns. Jim was active for about a week in August but no word on any ten meter activity. He has been in S2 several times and operated as S21U. He and his wife were invited to operate several months ago but were not allowed to operate when they arrived. His S21ZA operation may be the first legitimate operation by a foreigner. Willis Is. will be active around Oct. 7-14 by Jim VK9NS. The Mellish Reef trip has been canceled. Jim has had trouble with lack of financial support. Ex Yugoslavia. The former YU republics of Croatia, Slovenia, Serbia, Bosnia, Montenegro, & Macadonia are recognized by the US as independent states. Mail to these areas must indicate the name of the republic and place it on the last line of the address. Use the first digit of the postal zip code as listed in the Calibook for YU stations. The zip codes: Serbia(1,2,3); Croatia(4,5); Slovenia(6); Bosnia(7,80,88); Montenegro(81,84,85); Macedonia(9).

Croatia and Slovenia. The ITU confirmed that the callsign series for Croatia is 9AA-9AZ. Amateurs started using the 9A series in August and the new prefix has been confusing. The ITU has not yet received an official request for Slovenia to use the S5 callsign series as yet. The ARRL DXCC group has not voted separate country status for any of these new countries.





Paper Chasing

By Chuck Albrecht NOCKW #8105

As a Chapter Head/Certificate Manager (Colorado Centennial) I know first hand about problems that Paper Chasers and Chapter Officials have to deal with. When an award



is applied for, be sure to send complete information as to your callsign, 10-10 #, and complete address. Include a copy of your membership card showing that your 10-10 dues are current. Make sure that you have met the required qualifications of the Chapter that you are joining.

Last issue I mentioned the 10-10 Awards and Certificate Guide published by Jack Ford, KB7DUX #50803. You can order this guide, see the ORDER FORM on page 31. This guide lists the requirements for each 10-10 Chapter. When you are working for an upgrade, be sure to total points in your upgrade list.

When you enclose the fee, it is suggested you send cash. Out-of-state personal checks can be difficult to cash, even for \$2.00. Some certificate managers do not have checking accounts and they will be unable to cash them. If you insist on sending a personal check, make it payable to the person, not the chapter. Money orders are also a good means of sending the fee, but make it out to CASH or in the persons name you are sending your upgrade to. Most chapters do not have a balance large enough to have a checking account in the chapters name. As you can imagine, checks and money orders from DX areas can be a headache for the Chapter Certificate Manager.

Last issue I mentioned SASE - Self Addressed Stamped Envelope. Normally one first class stamp would be applied, but, if you ask that your computer list be returned, add stamps so that the postage is equal to the postage used to send the complete upgrade. Otherwise you add the burden on the Chapter to add more postage. My Chapter (Colorado Centennial) receives on the average of 40 letters, with upgrades, each week. You can see how this could create quite an expense if inadequate postage was provided.

Each edition of the <u>10-10 International News</u> features a report from the Chapter Coordinator indicating those 10-10 Chapters who have failed to

send in a report of activity for over one year. These chapters are then declared as "un-affiliated". In the past 19 years of my membership, I have noted that those chapters declared as "un-affiliated" can be a risk to those applying for their certificate. Risks amounting to very slow replies and/or non-receipt of the certificate. When a chapter allows itself to become un-affiliated with 10-10, I remove it from my awards list.

It behooves CM's (Certificate Managers) to give quick turnarounds on applications and upgrades. Paperchasers are very engaged in this part of the overall 10-10 program and just don't like to wait too long for replies from chapters. This is especially true just before Dayton, Reno and 10-10 Conventions.

A word about lists. Exchanging lists should be done after you make contact with a station. Also, including a SASE is a nice courtesy to the stations that you want a list and/or QSL card from.

Propagation

This is the first of a series of columns intended to help the 10 meter operator understand propagation - how radio waves travel from one point to another.



By being familiar with some of the characteristics of the many types of propagation, one can take better advantage of band openings, and thus, increase contacts and enjoyment of our hobby.

I will start with the basics of propagation, including basic theory and brief summaries of the various propagation modes possible on 10 meters. I'll then take a more in-depth look into these. With Cycle 22 on the downswing, openings will become fewer and farther between. This makes knowledge of radio wave propagation all the more important.

All propagation can be traced to the sun, either directly or indirectly. There is one exception to this, which is radio wave reflection (example being of an airplane or water tower, etc.). There are several obvious connections to the sun. One is the fact 10 meters is open much more often during the day than after dark. Another is the fact that solar flares can wipe out propagation for days in a row. Also, the sunspot cycle is obviously connected to the sun. It is important to realize how much of a vital part the sun plays in the day to day propagation on 10 meters.

The most important role the sun play's is ionizing the atmosphere. Actually, the ionization takes place in the ionosphere. The ionosphere is located roughly 50 to 420 km (30-260 miles) above the surface of the Earth. Ionization occurs when the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation or extreme ultraviolet radiation (EUV) comes in contact with the gases which make up the ionosphere. Ionization is simply the process of separating electrons from their atoms. Some of the gases, when ionized, refract radio waves, while others absorb the waves. This is why some bands are "open" only during the day, and others only at night.

Within the ionosphere, there are several different layers of ionization. The layers that affect propagation most are the D, E, F_1 , and F_2 layers. Although boundaries are often given to these layers,

one specific point where the layer suddenly terminates does not exist. In each of these layers, there is an area of maximum electron (ion) density. From this point, in both directions, the density gradually decreases. There are some exceptions to this which we will go into later. The boundaries that I will give are the locations where the layers are most likely to be, though they may extend a little higher or a little lower at times.

The D layer is located 70 to 90 kilometers (45-55 miles) above the surface of the Earth. This layer does not affect 10 meters as much as the lower bands, like 160 meters and 80 meters. The lower the frequency, the more it absorbs radio waves. This is why 160 meters and 80 meters are "dead" throughout most of the daylight hours. Remember that ionization is not an instantaneous process, so the ham bands may be conductive to propagation at times you may not think possible. Ionization in the D layer will gradually increase after sunrise, reaching a high point around noon, then will start gradually decreasing. This gradual decrease allows some propagation to begin shortly before the sun sets, and the gradual increase is the reason these bands stay open a few hours after sunrise.

The E layer is located 105 to 120 km (65-75 miles) above the Earth's surface. This layer can support more than one type of propagation. At the level that this layer is located, ions do not have to travel far before they recombine into neutral particles, and thus, don't propagate radio waves. Because of this, the ionization level must exceed the recombination level in order to have a sufficient ionization level to support propagation. This causes ionization to be most likely around noon, and least likely after dark. One example is Sporadic-E which doesn't play by any of the rules of normal propagation. Aurora (auroral scatter) is another which can occur at odd times.

The F layer is located between 145 and 400 km (90-250 miles) above the Earth's surface. During the daylight hours, it splits into two separate layers - the F₁ and F₂ layers. The F₁ is present only during the day. After dark, it is replaced by the F₂ layer, which broadens considerably after sunset. The F layer is what supports most propagation on HF frequencies, during the day and night. It's Maximum Usable Frequency (MUF) can reach 50 or even 60 MHz during sunspot cycle peaks. During the "valleys" of the sunspot cycle, the MUF can drop below 15 meters, (21 MHz), and thus below 10 meters also. This is when we need to take advantage of the other types of propagation.

The major types of propagation possible can be classified into some basic groups. They arecontinued on page 24

ionospheric waves (sky waves), line of sight waves (ground waves), and tropospheric waves. I will go into these various other types of propagation in the next issue. 

10-10 QSO Parties are open to all amateurs, but only paid-up 10-10 members are eligible for awards and chapter assignment of scores. They are conducted to encourage 10 meter operation and interest in the Net. Non-members may use numbers collected to qualify for membership; members may use them for awards.

RULES

- 1) PHONE contacts must be in the 10-meter phone band on SSB, AM or FM. CW contacts must be in the 10-meter band on CW or RTTY.
- 2) Exchange Callsign, Name, State or Country and 10-10 number. Some stations may also request your County.
- 3) A station may be counted only once.
- 4) Single operator stations only are acceptable.
- 5) All contacts must take place within the 48-hour contest period.
- 6) Logs <u>must</u> be kept in UTC (Universal Coordinated Time).
- 7) A DUPE sheet <u>is required</u> of all participants. Computer duping is OK. SASE to the Contest Manager for a sample DUPE sheet.
- 8) Chapter assignment of scores may be made only by a paid-up member belonging to that chapter as a <u>local</u> member and be able to work its Net via ground wave from the contest station.
- 9) Illegible or improperly submitted logs will be rejected.
- 10) Fallure to comply with these rules or their intent may result in disqualification.
- 11) SCORING: Two (2) points per contact with 10-10 number exchange. One (1) point per contact without a 10-10 number exchange.

AWARDS
