We welcome spring, as it is just around the corner and with the renewal of nature I hope we too can renew our goals, thoughts and wishes. The band has not been exactly great this past winter, but it sure has been better. The winter QSO Party seems to have been a success for most. As of this writing, I have not yet seen the results but I am expecting to see that there were a good many contacts made. I know of a number of members that took time out to assist in qualifying some new members and I wish to thank them for their efforts. Our Data Manager cannot wait to open the mail, so let's cover him up with new member's applications.

Now I need to address the subject of logging programs and the award programs of 10-10. Back in 1980 when I first started in 10-10 it was necessary to do all contesting, chapter awards, 10-10 awards etc. with pen/pencil and paper. Most members had some sort of method of keeping records on 3 x 5 cards, notebooks and the like. Very few owned any semblance of a computer, maybe a radio shack "trash 80" or something similar. Of course these few members found it much simpler to add data to the database and sort it for applications for awards, following the published guidelines. Whatever programs they had, they had to modify them to suit their needs for applying for these awards. Lotus 123, Dbase and other programs were used and adapted to meet the requirements for the awards. A number of year's back KBOON came out with a program that really made things easier and many members used the program. Limits and problems, sure, as with any new program and Don worked very hard to alleviate problems, take suggestions and modify to suit individual problems and needs. Some of us "wished" for other modifications but reality closed in and we worked around problems that could not be taken care of easily. Although, with regret, we did not list Don's program as an official 10-10 program, it was still one of the best at the time and Don tried his best to accommodate all. Yes, we have modified the awards rules, standardized some areas to eliminate the demand for less confusion, and even reduced the prices and eliminated the need in some cases for stamps. *At no time have we changed what constitutes a good 10-10 contact!* 10-10 Number, Call, Name, Date of Contact and QTH. There was a period when names were not used with the BAR applications, but this was a decision not made by the powers to be and was corrected when determined it was happening. The organization has progressed to the electronic mode slowly and is always keeping in mind the pencil/pen and paper members still out there. 10-10 has sanctioned Jim Hardy's WIN 10-10 as the official program for members if they wish to purchase and use it. This is entirely up to the individual. What program you use is up to you, but we cannot change the requirements to meet each individuals need. There are many programs out there that can be used to meet the criteria we publish for awards, and this is being done by many without too many problems. Change is an ongoing process and 10-10 will do it's best to keep up with the needs of the majority of the membership, keeping in mind the members who continue to do it the "old way".

Let's try to keep in mind that the purpose of 10-10 is to communicate on the 10-meter band. Number "crunching" is only one of the many methods. We have done much to have the information concerning the award programs available and easily accessible to those on the Internet as well as those who depend on "snail mail". Contacting the award managers will also bring you

the format and requirements for each individual award. Follow the guidelines, it is not so difficult. I have to do it too and find no difficulty following the directions. If I desire to work toward an award I do what is necessary or suffer the consequences. I too have had submissions returned, followed the directions given and resubmitted with success. I appreciate the help from the manager and appreciate that he/she is only following guide lines. My final word on the subject is simply, that I would appreciate any of you that find a real problem, to communicate directly with me directly, or any of the board members. Airing these things out on the reflector just adds problems and makes mountains out of molehills rather than gaining solutions. You elected these officials to represent you and you need to stay in communications with them.

IN ADDITION

2000 contacts in 2000: Why are there problems with this? The original intent was to generate activity on 10 meters and possibly create interest in 10-10 and hopefully gain a few new members. This was not intended to have people clog up a frequency with daily contacts, nor intended to take anything away from the difficult awards we do have. It is just a "FUN" undertaking to have more folks active. If 2000 contacts are made, then a simple certificate will be issued to those completing the task, not plaques as noted in the 10-10 News, as this was in error. Surely there will be some members that achieve many new contacts and numbers, if they move around instead of grouping on one frequency. It is really up to each individual how they play this game. To some died in the wool contesters it may seem frivolous, but there are many who will use this as a means of meeting new people, obtaining the 10 numbers needed to join and a good reason to just rag chew. As a member of the Board stated, "In the end , the way a member views the completed award is a matter of personal interpretation."

After much consideration the membership committee has come up with the following additional way to work the 2000 contacts. This will run concurrent with the other so check your logs back to January 1, 2000.

For those who wish to work on something more "worthwhile" as they suggest, we are also adopting a little different method of collecting 2000 contacts, and will be open to all 10-10 members with paid up dues as of December 31 2000. The rules are simple and in concert with 10-10 award rules.

1. Work 2000 different 10-10 members from January 1 2000 through December 31 2000.

2. Logs to be submitted in the following form:

a. List 10-10 numbers in ascending order with Call, Name, QTH and date of contact. QTH being state or country.

b. Hints - if you have a computer you can use MS Excel or similar program and later sort by 10-10 numbers. DUPE SHEET NOT REQUIRED!

3. As with any other QSO Party or contest, proof of dues must be submitted with log.

4. Deadline entry postmark will be 31 January 2001.

AWARDS: Wood framed certificates will be awarded to all who complete this task.

Now, what is to be gained by this - Possibly you can complete the WAS requirements, New county contacts, Worked all Countries, add more Bars, work the WPX, etc. Many possibilities for those who try. Let's all do what this is intended to do, generate activity on 10 meters. And, for those who worry about clogging up one frequency, move somewhere else, you don't have to be there! There are a good many folks out there willing to talk to you if that is what you wish. If you wish to add to the feeding frenzy on certain frequencies, then so be it. Folks, amateur radio is what you make it, not what someone else decides to do. Stay out of that trap and follow your conviction of good operating practice and friendliness to all. Don't get all caught up in what the other person is doing.

Where to send logs, etc. will be forth coming in the next issue of the News.

Well, there has been a huge change taking place in the amateur community with the new FCC changes taking place and I can see nothing but good coming the way of Ten-Ten. Test sessions all over the country have been inundated with everybody trying to take the written tests in preparation for the April 15th change. I know of many, many people who have passed written upgrades in preparation. After these are traded in for full upgrade CSCE's on or after April 15th, we should start to see a lot more activity above 28.500. Now is the time to start planning for more band utilization!

I myself took a month out and studied-studied-studied and passed my Amateur Extra written exam. That in itself will not do a lot for 10 meter operations, but it will help a lot on other bands (you mean there ARE other bands? - hihi).

There will be a lot of regular and "paper only" test sessions going on throughout the country on April 15th for those CSCE "trade-ins" and I have been notified that the Utica Shelby Emergency Communications Association in Michigan is touting itself as the first to offer amateur exams at the stroke of midnight. They will be letting hams into their VE session about an hour early, then everyone will start the countdown with WWV. They are expecting it to be a "little like New Year's Eve".

2K in 2K

New Year Long Contest Announced by Membership Committee

As a part of the celebration of the millennium, 10-10 will have a yearlong contest as a challenge to the membership to enroll 2000 new members in the year 2000. The contest, to be known as "2K in 2K" is an automatic contest, in that there is no logs to keep, no records, to keep, absolutely nothing for the membership to do, except, get their call and 10-10 number on as many new member applications as possible.

Awards will be given to the top 10 active (paid-up) members whose call and 10-10 numbers is listed the most times on new member applications. The 10-10 Official Programmer, Jim Hardy K4HAV, has developed a program to record all numbers and calls listed on new member applications. Here are the rules, which are very simple:

2K in 2K 10-10 Contest

PURPOSE: To encourage 10-10 members to promote 10-10 to non 10-10 members and to have their 10-10 numbers and call listed on as many new member applications as possible.

RULES:

1. Get your 10-10 number and call listed on as many new members applications as possible.
2. NO points - NO scoring - NO logs - NO record keeping by you - NOTHING to submit.
3. The scoring (or record keeping) will be accomplished by the Membership Committee
4. Only ACTIVE 10-10 members (those with paid up dues) will be eligible for the awards which will be given to the top ten calls listed on new member applications. If a non-paid up 10-10 member is listed in the top ten award winners, that non-paid up member will be skipped and the awards will be given to the top ten ACTIVE (paid-up) 10-10 members. An ACTIVE member for this contest will be a member whose dues are paid-up for the entire year of 2000.
5. An attractive plaque will be awarded to the top-listed 10-10 member. Attractive certificates will be awarded to 10-10 members listed from 2 through 10.

Now see how simple this contest is! Every new member application will be counted to determine the Call and 10-10 number that appears the most times. Pass your number to those on 10 that request information about 10-10 and be to tell them to list you as one of their 10 contacts. Watch each issue of the News and the 10-10 Column in World Radio for a listing of the top 10 in the race to win this yearlong contest.

The International Morse Code

A SERIES BY MARTIN REID N6QU

Are you a newly licensed ham considering “getting your feet wet” in operating the International Morse Code? Thinking about upgrading and wonder the best way to learn CW? Or, maybe you’re just wondering what all the fuss over the code is about. Well, if so, this article is intended for you.

Our discussion of learning the International Morse Code continues, with this, our tenth and last installment in this series.

In our last installment, we discussed abbreviations, making and ending contacts and “The DIT-DIT Game”. In this, our final installment, a few important thoughts.

Contests

When operating on the bands, you may occasionally run across what appears to be organized pandemonium. Multiple stations making repeated calls, with CQ’s followed by “TEST” or something else, and stations exchanging numbers. This, my friends, is referred to as “contesting”, a competitive and popular pursuit which provides periods of intense activity and opportunities to sharpen your operating skills.

Contests are a great opportunity for those of us with only modest stations, as the serious contest operators have great antenna systems and highly refined listening skills. Once you have polished your CW skills, you may wish to familiarize yourself with the rules of a particular contest and give it a try. If you’re interested in contesting, check out the major ham publications for information on current and future contests.

If you’re not interested in contesting, you may consider retreating to the Novice Bands until the “contest crowd” gets their fill and go away (most contests avoid the Novice bands). Remember, we all have our individual interests, so be tolerant of those who have as much right to use ham frequencies as you do.

QRP

Particularly when calling “CQ”, you will run across an unusual breed of CW operator – the QRP, or low power enthusiast. Their 5 watt or 1 watt signals will surprise you with their strength. Frequently made from kits, these low power stations are “pushing the envelope” to see how far a watt or two will go on HF. In the tradition of our early ham ancestors, these operators are working to increase their technical and operating skills and advancing the technical art. They rely on your honest and accurate signal reports. Just a bit of encouragement and patience will provide a rich reward for their hard work. Listen for QRP operators when you’re on the bands. You may wish to join them.

Poor Operators

You may, in the course of your activities, run across the rare CW operator who’s on-the-air operating conduct is less than desirable. You may sometimes hear more experienced hams referring to these operators as “lids”. Please leave comments regarding their conduct to the Amateur Auxiliary’s Official Observers. Never criticize or accuse. Instead, lead by example. Always use good operating procedures and conduct.

Logging and QSL’s

Much has already been written on this subject, so just a point or two. One mark of a truly professional operator is an accurate and up-to-date logbook. Recording your conversations with signal reports and a few personal comments will serve as a pleasant

reminder of the many fun contacts I’m sure you will have. Your log can also serve to provide reference information on station improvements and band conditions. Be sure to note all on-air activity, including tuning up and equipment changes. This information will be invaluable if you are ever accused of causing radio frequency interference.

QSLing may or may not be an interest of yours. Remember that many stations are working toward their Worked All States award or just decorating their shack. Our younger, new hams are particularly interested in QSL’s. Even if you are not interested in collecting QSL’s, please respond to those who send you cards.

Conclusion

And now, a last word as we wrap up our series on the International Morse Code/ CW operating will provide a wealth of pleasant experiences, a steady supply of new contacts, and new friends for any ham, new or experienced. You’ll be pleasantly surprised at the variety and numbers of hams who are anxious to talk to you on the Novice bands. It’s not only fun, on-air CW operation will gradually increase your code speed – enjoyably!

So, get your station set up, pick up a copy of Part 97, review it carefully and keep it handy. Organize your operating position, set up a few operating aids and get your log book set up. Then, jump in and join the fun! I hope to hear you on the bands!

10-10 is seeking volunteers to host the biennial convention in 2001. The particulars are listed below and we ask that you communicate with, Rex Holford 916 McKenzie Ave, Council Bluffs, Iowa Phone 712-325-8219 the Convention Committee Chairman, for further details if you are interested.

Purpose: To provide a location accessible by air and car for all members desiring to attend.

Basic Considerations

- (1) to arrange for accommodations with proximate access to meals
- (2) to provide a large room to be used as a chapter gathering area
- (3) to provide a room for the Board of Directors meeting
- (4) to provide facilities and arrange the banquet
- (5) to schedule forums with moderators on subjects of interest
- (6) to set up a convention registration area

Accommodations

Contract with a hotel/motel that can provide 50 or more rooms at a reasonable (discounted) price. The location should be near a major air terminal with free or inexpensive transportation to the convention location. The hotel/motel should have a good restaurant, banquet facilities, forum/meeting rooms large enough to accommodate the membership, chapter table set up and areas for socialization.

Meeting Essentials

(a) A large room to accommodate chapter table set-ups, registration tables, committee tables and a memorabilia sales table. This will be the main area of socialization, chapter business, etc.

(b) A meeting room for forums capable of accommodating at least 60 members for the entire day, including a sound system and any other audiovisual equipment deemed necessary.

(c) An area for a hospitality/refreshment bar to be hosted by 10-10 or the hotel/motel as regulations permit; the forum room should be satisfactory. Bar set-up and snacks should be arranged.

(d) An area with a large table or desk to be used for registration. The area should be close to or just inside the entry to the chapter table setup area.

(e) A room for a Board of Directors meeting large enough to accommodate 15 members. The room should be set up in board meeting fashion: one table with chairs for 15 and space availability for snack service. Generally the Board will meet in informal session! Thursday evening and formal session all day Friday.

Banquet Facilities

The area should be large enough to accommodate at least 200 members. It should have multiple round tables, if possible, with service provided by the local restaurant personnel or banquet personnel. It should include a speakers lectern, a sound system and a table or two to display prizes.

Arrangements should be made for a refreshment bar prior to and during the banquet.

Arrangements may also be made for local entertainment.

A Challenge for Y2K with a Year Long Y2K QSO Party

Here is a challenge for all 10-10 members. Make 1500, 1600, 1700, 1800, 1900 or 2000 contacts during the year and receive a handsome certificate for your effort. The rules are simple! Make 2000 contacts with a 10-10 member or with a non-10-10 member. ALL contacts count. NO points, just contacts. 2000 total contacts during the Y2K. And here is the one of the best rules. You can make repeat contacts with the same station any time during the year, but not within the same 24-hour period.

The whole idea of this year long party is to make new 10-10 friends and maybe encourage some non-members to become interested in 10-10 and join our organization.

Making 2000 contacts in 365 days will not be easy you say. Right you are. 2000 contacts are at least 5 contacts per day, almost 40 contacts per week, more than 167 contacts per month. That's a lot of 10-meter activity, but remember we have 5 QSO Parties a year. If you work all 5 QSO Parties only, that's only 400 contacts per QSO Party. Oh, you only work the three SSB QSO Parties, then make at least 667 contacts during each SSB Party.

Logging? That's simple too! All that is required for you log is: Contact Number, 0001-2000, Date, Call, 10-10 Number (Log a 0 - zero- for contacts without a 10-10 number).

NO dupe sheets required. A paper log form will be available for download from the 10-10 web site, www.tenten.org. A computer log is also acceptable as long as it follows the format noted for the paper log. Those members using the WIN1010 logging program, will be able to download a file to provide the necessary Y2K log from contacts entered into your WIN1010 program. How simple can it get? Hold all logs until after the Y2K Party is completed (2400 31 December 2000). Information will be published in the News and announced on the web as to where to send your logs.

Read the rules, and get ready for the Y2K QSO Party.

PURPOSE: To keep the 10 meter band occupied and make 2000 10 meter contacts during the calendar year 2000.

RULES:

1. Contacts must be on 10 meters - any mode (SSB, CW, FM, etc.)
2. One contact per 24-hour period with the same call sign. Same call signs may be worked once each 24-hour (0000-2400Z). Maximum number of same call signs in log is 365 (one per 24-hour period).
3. Both 10-10 members and non 10-10 members count as a contact.
4. NO points - NO scoring - just 2000 contacts.
5. Contacts made during scheduled 10-10 QSO Parties may be used.
6. Log the following information:
 - a. Contact number (0001 to 2000)
 - b. Date
 - c. Call
 - d. 10-10 # (Log a 0 - "zero" for a contact without a 10-10 number)

A paper log form is available on the 10-10 web site for download.

A computer log is acceptable providing it follows the above format.

7. Hold all logs until the after the Y2K QSO Party is finished (2400 31 December 2000). Information will be published in the 10-10 News as to where to send your logs.

8. QSL Confirmation of contacts NOT required, however, final judgment as to valid contacts may be determined by the Review Committee. Check logs will be used to determine valid contacts and the Review Committee, may at their discretion, ask for supporting data for any contacts claimed. The Review Committee shall be the final judge in determining valid contacts and their decision will be final.

9. Certificates will be awarded to those who successfully make 1500, 1600, 1700, 1800, 1900 and 2000 valid contacts. Awards will be made only to ACTIVE (current paid-up) 10-10 members.

SPECIAL AWARD: Contact 2000 *different* 10-10 members during the year and receive a very nice wood framed certificate.

An-Ten-Ten-nas



Information to help
you decide on the best
antenna for you

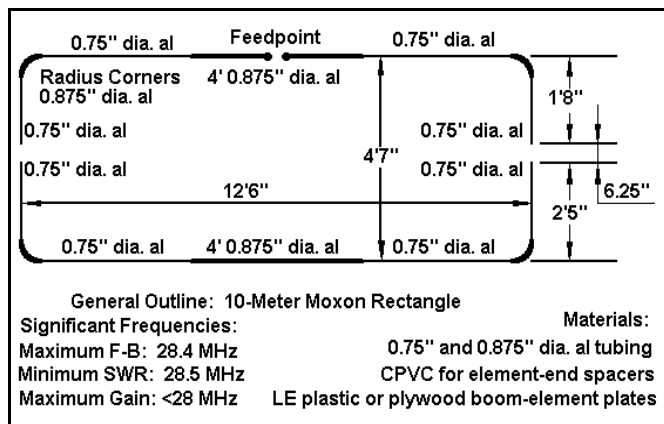

In each issue of the *News*, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

No. 27: A Compact Aluminum Moxon Rectangle

I often receive inquiries from folks who cannot quite support the width of a 10-meter Yagi (either 2 or 3 elements) because obstructions give them less than the 16.5' needed. Is there an antenna with decent performance that will fit in a space about 12-13' wide? If it can be home built to save money and require no fancy tuning or matching system, so much the better.

In fact, there is an antenna that fits this category almost perfectly. Imagine an antenna with the gain of a 2-element Yagi (6 dBi), the front-to-back ratio of a 3-element Yagi (>20 dB from 28.3 to 28.5 MHz), and an SWR of below 2:1 from one end of 10 to the other. In fact, imagine that the antenna has better than 15 dB front-to-back ratio all the way down to 28 MHz and still has about 12 dB front-to-back ratio at 29.7 MHz. (All figures are free space modeling estimates.) Imagine also that the antenna can be directly connected to 50-ohm coax with no matching system whatsoever (even though I always recommend a 1:1 choke balun). Imagine also that you can make it yourself from hardware store materials, that it will weigh about 10-15 pounds including the boom, and that you can make it in your garage with no special tools. Imagine also that when it is done, you will still have change from a \$50 bill.



The antenna is the Moxon rectangle. Past versions that I built using wire elements required lots of PVC to support them. However, if we translate the antenna into hardware store aluminum tubing, we can build a 1-boom version. Now peek at the sketch of the pieces. Some 7/8" and 3/4" diameter aluminum tubing form the main elements, with 3/4" tubing for the side elements. The corners can use radius-bent tubing or be squared by making some corner supports from L-stock. The combination of 7/8" and 3/4" aluminum tubing lets you telescope the ends into the center for a precise fit or a center frequency adjustment.

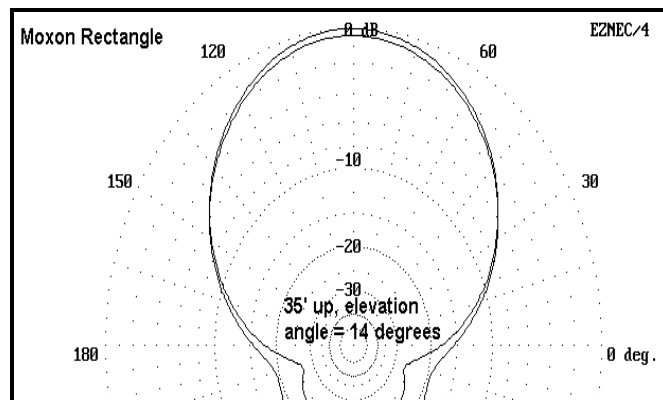
Since the end spacing and alignment is critical to make the

antenna give its full performance, you can slide a piece of CPVC or similar lightweight, durable tubing either inside the ends or over the ends and lock them in place with sheet metal screws. The rigid spacer is also a good idea to limit the twisting force placed on the curved or right-angle corners. Sheet metal screws also connect the 3/4" and 7/8" tubing together. Be sure that all hardware screws are stainless steel.

For element-to-boom plates, you can use any durable material. Spar varnished 3/8" plywood or 1/4" LE plastic make good plates. About 3" by 9" (or longer) plates give ample room to U-bolt the elements to the plate and have room for U-bolts that go over the mast. As with all good antenna structure, let the elements hang under the boom. What boom? Well, almost anything, from 1-1/4" nominal diameter PVC to a good grade of aluminum tubing (thicker-wall than the usual 0.55" hardware store variety) to a 5' length of spar varnished 1.25" diameter closet rod. Make up a boom-to-mast plate similar to the boom-to-element plates, only a bit more square, and you are in business.

The dimensions of the antenna in the drawing are too fussy, being direct translations of the computer model used to generate the antenna. Just try to keep the dimensions within about 1/4" of the drawing, and no one will be able to tell any difference in performance. Squaring the corners or missing the dimensions by a half inch will shift the performance centers by about 100 kHz at most. In most cases, you will not be aware of any difference at all.

Note that the antenna is just about 12.5' wide and under 5' front-to-back, for a turning radius of about 6'8" or so. Strapped up on the side of the house, the antenna is unlikely to overhang the neighbor's yard line. The antenna is light enough for hand rotating, but an old TV rotator might come in handy. Because of the antenna's characteristics, you may not need to rotate it much.



The pattern figure shows the optimal front-to-back ratio in azimuth patterns 20' and 35' antenna heights. Note the very broad forward lobe that is almost a cardioid, giving reception and transmission as wide as your peripheral vision. Behind you is silence—or at least a large dose of silencing. Les Moxon, G6XN, uses a wire version of the antenna with both elements remotely tuned: that way he works the world just by electrically reversing front and rear elements with a fixed mounting. If you want to learn more about the Moxon rectangle, find the Spring, 1995, issue of *Communications Quarterly*, and look at pages 55-70.

It is unlikely that anyone will ever produce this beam commercially, since it is a monobander without the super gain that avid DXers and contesters crave. You can only get that kind of performance from many Yagi elements. However, you can build your own compact antenna with a pretty good chance of success on the first try. It will beat a fixed wire dipole or a vertical hands down. So if you need a compact 10-meter beam for your compact home site, then you might roll your own version of the aluminum Moxon rectangle.

Annual School Roundup 2000

"Brinnon School, I hear you loud and clear here at the Johnson Space Center!" This is one of many such reports the students of the Brinnon School fifth and sixth grade class received while making Amateur Radio contacts with people around the world. For one week, these students participated in the annual Amateur Radio School Roundup, 2000. Guam, Argentina and many schools around the United States answered the call from Brinnon, Washington.

The School Club Roundup is an event where students use amateur radio to contact other students and amateur radio operators in the U.S. and around the world. This annual event is sponsored by the Council for the Advancement of Amateur Radio in the New York City Schools, the American Radio Relay League, and the ARRL Hudson Division Education Task Force. It gives students the chance to get on the air and experience the fun of Amateur Radio, and the educational benefits of the technical radio service.

"Where is Guam?" the students asked, racing over to the large map of the World, after making contact on 10 meters with an Amateur Radio operator located so far away. Each contact became an excellent opportunity for the students to learn about their country and the World. And many contacts were lengthy conversations allowing the students to speak with other students across America, or engineers, teachers, and others. As each contact was made, the excitement grew. By the end of the week, many students expressed the desire to start a local radio club and to learn more about public service and the technical aspects of Amateur Radio.

Tomas Hood, who's callsign is NW7US (10x-56526), and the class' teacher, Ron Wright, W7ERY, teamed up to prepare the students to participate in this year's School Club Roundup. NW7US was the callsign used to represent the Brinnon School. For this event the students learned basic electronic theory, radio operation theory, radio protocol (How to speak and conduct one's self properly on the radio.), geography, and how to log (make record of) radio contacts. Tomas came into the classroom several times during the weeks prior to the event to give students hands on training, and related instruction.

At first the students were not sure whether they would like learning about radio. However, after the first couple days most were eager to learn more and could be heard calling, "CQ!" (Amateur Radio shorthand for "Seek You") when they wanted to speak to their teachers and friends.

During the event the students spoke to more than ten other schools as well as the Johnson Space Center and the USS Lexington. During the contact with the Johnson Space Center, the students discussed the Space Shuttle, careers, and science with an engineer who took time to encourage the students to be diligent in their studies and in the pursuit of their goals.

10 meters was the primary band used. The first part of the week was rough, however, due to the Coronal Mass Ejection and the Solar Wind that caused an active and stormy Geomagnetic Field. But conditions improved nicely by the last part of the week. Many 10-10 members were contacted, and the support from 10-10 members was appreciated.

After participating in the School Club Roundup, some of the students are talking about starting a radio club at the school. The equipment used was provided by NW7US, and included the Cushcraft AP8 vertical multiband HF antenna, and both a Kenwood TS-830S and an Icom IC-706MKIIG.

Tomas is a local Amateur Radio operator and computer programmer whose two sons attend Brinnon School. They moved to the Brinnon, Washington area last summer from Seattle, and enjoy living here.

Myanmar 10-10 Country No. 293?

A DXpedition by Sally KM5EP #65064, Milt N5IA #8469, Cliff KD6XH #4427, Rich K7ZV #8840, Dan A7DB #21616, Luis XE1L #18056 plus other nonmember, operated from Thahtay Kyun Island off Myanmar. This is the old Burma in Zone 26 Southeast Asia. The call XZ0A was used for the first time, a new 10-10 Country, a new IOTA, a new prefix and a total of 79,784 contacts. The operation started on January 13th and ended February 6th after making 12,489 contacts on ten meters. Twenty four operators had several stations running with amplifiers and full size antennas on all bands. Several of the 1010 members used other calls from the mainland after leaving the island. They were XZ1DX (Dan), XZ1YL (Sally), XZ1L (Luis), XZ1ZZ (Rich). I hope some of you were lucky on ten.

Operating conditions to the west coast of the USA was average starting at two hours before their sundown. Propagation into the middle to east coast of the USA was very poor especially where I live in Texas! I heard them about four times but good enough to get into my log for an all time new one on ten! Myanmar is about half way around the world from Texas so their sunrise is our sunset. Until the solar flux went up toward the end of their stay, we could not hear them in Texas. quarter of 2000. On March 1st, the **Solar flux was 233 the A index 7 and K index 2**, which is an increase in the flux number from last quarter. There will be a 110 point swing in the flux numbers during the next three months as the season's change. It takes 4.5 years for the cycle to go up and 6.6 years to come down for a total of 11.1 years. Cycle 23 is now 27 months old, the flux continues to climb upwards and we have entered into a new Phase of this cycle. These next three years will be the best propagation, with the exception of the summer months when propagation changes for us in the USA. Last year, I predicted we would be hearing Europe and we have heard them every day since October 8th!

Expect the best conditions on March 1-3, March 29-April 2, April 29-May 1 & 27-30, June 25-30! For stations in the Eastern USA, expect a 95% chance of DX to the East-West path into Europe or Africa. For stations in the Western USA, expect 80% chance of DX into Europe and a 95% chance into Asia. All of the USA will get a 75% chance into S. America in the mid afternoon. Long haul F Layer skip continues to be the dominant mode of skip. Expect a 5% chance of Long Path into Asia starting at 00 UTC for central USA. The beacons (**28.175-28.300**) will tell you what is open, especially 28.200. A record number of beacons have been reported the past few months.

INFORMATION AND HELP ON THE U. L. S.

- The vast majority of hams have not yet registered in the FCC ULS, which opened for business on August 16, 1999.
- You can't renew your ticket until you have a valid registration on file in the FCC ULS, regardless of whether done by computer or paper.
- You will need Netscape Navigator 4.08 with 128-bit encryption to register on the FCC's ULS site. You may download at 4.08 at <http://home.netscape.com/download/>. There is a high probability that Microsoft Internet Explorer may not be suitable for registration.
- For the FCC Universal Licensing System (ULS) registration the URL is: <http://www.fcc.gov/wtb/uls>. Go there soon and thoroughly read the material. Download and print, "Accessing the FCC Network using Windows 95/98" which you will need to establish your dial-up network to the FCC.
- If you don't have a computer you can order the paper forms from the FCC Forms Distribution Center at 1-800-418-3676. To register, you'll need one copy of FCC Form 606 and FCC Form PR5000 Number 206-U. The later is a fact sheet with information you will need.
- Once registered, you will need a paper FCC Form 605 to do the actual filing to renew, or modify your license. It is also available at 1-800-418-3676.
- No use of FCC Form 610 is permitted by individuals after February 16, 2000 when that form became history.
- If you go the paper route, allow weeks and weeks for the FCC to process paper forms.
- Electronic registration by computer is much faster.
- A computer at a public access point, such as a public library, can be used for registration, provided the software is available.
- A friend with a computer can do your registration process, providing you are willing to give your friend the required information.
- You will be required to provide your name, address, city and state, ZIP, fax number, telephone number and Social Security Number. There are no exceptions. The fax, telephone and SSN are not made public.
- When your computer registration is complete you will have completed the equivalent of FCC Form 606.
- General information can be obtained from the FCC Call Center (toll-free) at 1-888-225-5322.

Apparently the vast majority of hams are not ULS-ready. The FCC estimated, in November 1999, that only three percent of hams that could and should register for ULS were registered. If you have not yet registered, the following information should be helpful.

The FCC opened its Universal Licensing System (ULS) to hams on August 16, 1999. On that day the FCC provided that FCC Form 610 could, if a Social Security Number (SSN) was written at the top of that form, be used for an additional six months. That six-month grace period expired on February 16, 2000. The FCC will no longer accept individual ham applications for renewal, modification, original licenses, or any other purpose on FCC Form 610. The only allowed use of the 610 relates to a trustee of a club station, and it isn't clear how much longer that use will be allowed.

You must immediately register with the FCC's ULS, or you won't be able to renew or modify your present license. There are no exceptions!

The ULS has been set up within the Wireless Telecommunications Bureau (WTB) of the FCC. The WTB oversees issuance of licenses to Ship, Aircraft, Amateur, Restricted and Commercial, and General Mobile Radio Services. Instead of several bureaus with several staffs of people all duplicating each others work by asking all the licensees in the WTB for their name, address, city, state, ZIP and other information, it's now on the ULS computer for use by all in the WTB who need it.

You must first of all register in the ULS before ANY application before the FCC will consider any application. That means until you are registered, you can't renew, or modify your existing ham license. If you

never register, your ticket will never be renewed, and will eventually expire.

You register either by using new paper forms, or by computer. If you use paper forms, be prepared to wait the number of weeks it takes the FCC to process paper forms. Things go much faster if you use computer, either your own or one at a public access location, such as a library. Also, a friend can perform your registration on the friend's computer, if you are willing to provide the required information.

If you don't have a computer, or don't have access to a computer, or don't wish to have a friend do your registration by computer, call the FCC's Forms Distribution Center (1-800-418-3676). Ask for a copy of FCC Form 606 and a copy of FCC Form PR5000 Number 206-U. The 206-U is some necessary information you need to complete the 606, including the mail and fax address to which your form must be sent.

Does your SSN have to be used when registering with the ULS? Yes, absolutely! The Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996 requires all Federal agencies to collect Taxpayer Identification Numbers (TIN) from all persons doing business with the agency. This includes all applicants for and recipients of a license. For most of us, our TIN is our SSN. Your SSN will not be available to the public. The ULS uses your SSN as a unique identifier. Your SSN and a password are needed to access ULS for electronic application filing.

Is personal information, such as your telephone number, required to be listed? Yes. You'll be required to provide your name, mailing address, fax number, phone number and any call sign for which you are licensed, regardless of radio service. The fax and phone numbers will not be available to the public. The FCC is authorized by the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, to collect the personal information requested by the ULS.

If you use a computer and the Internet, be aware that any browser other than Netscape Navigator 4.08 with 128-bit (strong) encryption probably won't work. The ULS was written around that browser, and it probably has nothing to do with Justice and current pending litigation. Strong, or 128-bit encryption, is required for online banking or trading and for many other interfaces. Maybe, in time, Microsoft Internet Explorer may be allowed, but it probably won't work now. Are you confusing Netscape Navigator 4.08 with Netscape Communicator 4.7 or later? Don't do that. Navigator 4.08 is a stand-alone browser. Communicator is a comprehensive software package, which includes the Navigator 4.08 browser for the Internet and lots of other Netscape products, none of which you need for ULS registration. Go to the Netscape Internet site at <http://home.netscape.com/download/> for additional information.

If you use a computer and the Internet, go to <http://www.fcc.gov/wtb/uls>. There you will find a great deal of useful information, as well as a button to proceed with your ULS registration. By reading, you will learn that you can register on the Internet at the above FCC site, but your actual application filing cannot be done on the Internet. Only by accessing the FCC's dial-up network can you currently do the actual filing. It is highly recommended that you download and print the specific instructions you view when you press the button, "Accessing the FCC Network Using Windows 95/98."

Once you attempt the registration process, the results typically will be either a rejection because of something you did incorrectly, a success, or sometimes even a partial success. In case of the later, you may well want to call the ULS Technical Support team at 202-414-1250, just to see whether all your data was received correctly, regardless of the indication on your monitor. These technicians appear to be well prepared to be of assistance.

General questions, of a non-technical nature about the process can be directed to the FCC Call Center at (toll-free) 1-888-225-5322.

When your registration is complete you will have complete FCC Form 606. You now are ready to do a filing via the FCC dial-up network. Understand, however, that you, as always, must not attempt a renewal until you inside of the 90-days that precede your current expiration date. Attempt to file for renewal outside of the 90 days will result in your application being dismissed and no action taken.

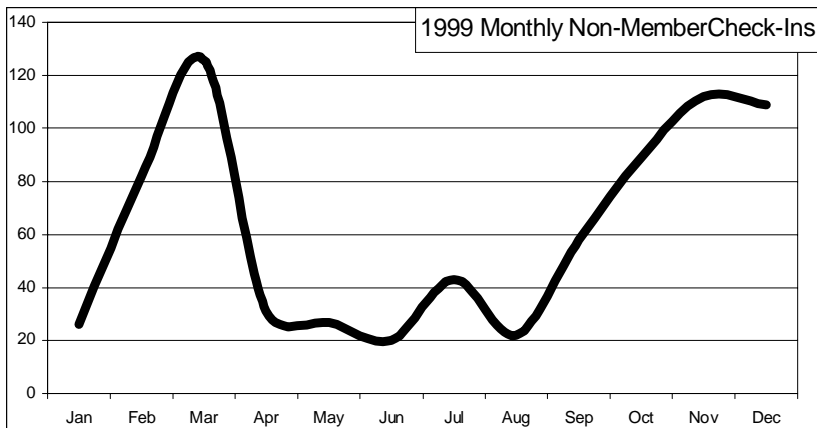
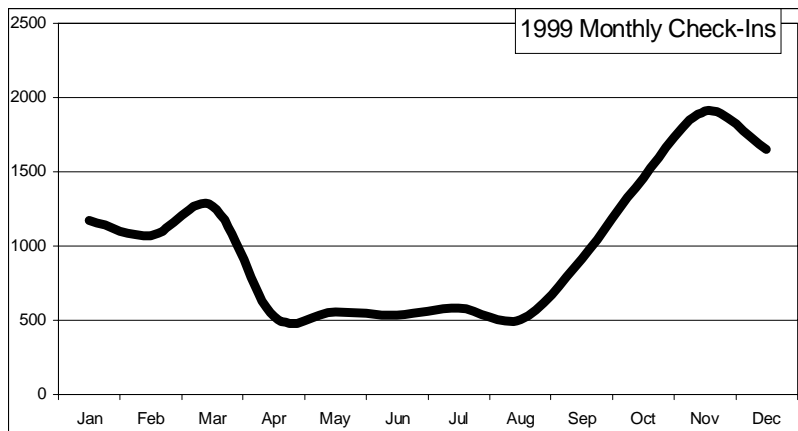

1999 IN REVIEW



REFLECTIONS

AS PRESENTED BY THE
HISTORIAN OF TEN TEN

Twenty years ago, the Winter 1980 *Bulletin* (now the *10-10 International News*) featured Dex Anderson, HB9BRQ/K3KWJ (now W4KM) on the front page. Here are some excerpts from the editorial by Charles F. Albrecht, Jr., WA0YNQ (now N0CKW) #8105:

"Our cover person this Quarter is DEX ANDERSON - HB9BRQ/K3KWJ #6271 (Operator of 4U1ITU #11111) currently serving with the U.S. State Department in Geneva, Switzerland. Licensed as W2YLN in New Jersey back in 1948, but inactive from '49 to '69, Dex got back into Ham Radio as K3KWJ in Washington D.C. and into 10-10 in 1972. He was instrumental in getting 10-10 numbers for club stations: W3DOS #5958; NN3SI #13100; 4U1UN #22222; and W4SWP/HB #25959. The latter was operated by members of the U.S. Delegation to WARC '79."

The Winter 1980 *Bulletin* also included an article by Dex HB9BRQ and Ted HB90P who were planning a 10-10 chapter in Geneva. Here are excerpts from their article:

"The chapter net might operate on c.w. in the U.S. novice segment, say at 28,150 MHz. Apartment-bound Dex, HB9BRQ/K3KWJ, is basically able to work North America on c.w. only, and the struggle to finish off 500 contacts for his VP number made him painfully aware of how few c.w. stations on ten meters would have 10-X numbers. Operation in the novice portion of the band would hopefully help propagandize the 10-X movement among novices (and technicians) and as a bonus would impact the low end of the band where the threat of intrusion is the greatest.

...If the Geneva chapter ever becomes a reality, its net will have the distinction of encompassing, ham-wise, three 'countries.' The French border runs close to the city of Geneva and 4U1ITU counts as a separate country for DXCC purposes. We would hope to have 4U1ITU, HB9 stations, and F stations as charter members—all within easy ground-wave distance of one another."

May the year 2000 be wonderful for all our 10-10 members. Occasional great band openings would also be appreciated!

10-10 Scholarship Applicant Information

10-10 AWARD INFORMATION

To apply for any 10-10 Award, **Proof of paid-up membership is mandatory.** A copy of your membership card or address label from the latest copy of the *10-10 International News* must be sent with your application.

An application listing the rules for each award is available from the appropriate Award Manager listed below. Please send your request with a #10 (business size) envelope, self-addressed and stamped with one unit of first class postage, to the Award Manager for the Award you are interested in obtaining. *Please* no phone calls to Award Managers for an application or list of rules.

BAR AWARDS

A 10-10 Bar represents a legal contact with one hundred (100) 10-10 members. A Bar award may be applied for and awarded for each group of 100 10-10 members that you work. Additional certificates are available for the Bar levels of 1000, 2500, 5000, 7500, 10,000 and every 2500 contacts above.

INTERNATIONAL 500 OF THE WORLD (VP)

When you attain the 500 Bar, you automatically become a member of the International 500 Club and will be assigned an honorary VP number to be used in conjunction with your 10-10 number. With the issuance of the number you are eligible to participate in the VP award program. The VP award recognizes those 10-10 members that work other members with VP numbers. A 10-10 member may apply for VP award endorsements when completing 100 contacts with VP members. A VP award may be applied for and awarded for each group of 100 that you work. Also available to VP members are the VP Worked All States award and the Lucky 13 Certificate. The Lucky 13 award is intended to

demonstrate the operator's ability to work the entire 10-meter band. The 10-meter amateur band extends from 28.0 to 29.7 MHz. The Lucky 13 award is awarded for completing a legal 10-10 contact with 13 different VP's on 13 different days on 13 different 100 kHz (plus or minus 10 kHz) segments of the band. These contacts must occur between 28.3 MHz and 29.7 MHz. There are 15 possible 100 kHz segments possible within this band section. For purposes of the Lucky 13 award, mobile, portable, or fixed operation may be used. Contacts can be made using any legal mode of operation. QSL conformation is not required.

WORKED ALL CONTINENTS AWARD

The 10-10 Worked All Continents award is issued for successfully working a 10-10 member in each of the six (6) radio continents (Africa, Asia, Europe, North America, Oceania, and South America)

COUNTIES AWARD

10-10 offers an award for working all 3076 U.S. Counties. The basic certificate is issued for the first 100 counties contacted. Endorsement seals are available for each 500 level. A plaque is awarded for working all 3076 10-10 Counties.

COUNTRIES AWARD

The Countries award certificate is awarded for confirmed contacts with 10-10 members in other countries. Applications require confirmations in the form of QSL cards (or non-returnable photocopies). A legal 10-10 contact within the applicant's country may be counted as one contact for this award. A basic 10-10 Countries certificate is awarded for contact with 25 countries. Thereafter, endorsement seals may be applied for in groups of 10 through the 75-country level. Beyond the 75-country level, endorsement seals are awarded in groups of five (5)

CW AWARD

The basic certificate for this award is earned with a minimum of 25 legal contracts with other 10-10 members

MOBILE AWARD

The basic Mobile Contact award is issued for 25 mobile contacts. Each contact must consist of the 10-10 number, call sign, name, QTH (state or country) of both parties and the date. Endorsement seals are available for the 50, 75, and 100 contact levels.

OM/XYL AWARD

Within 10-10's membership there are many husband and wife teams. These are referred to as OM/XYL teams. 10-10 offers the OM/XYL award for contact with as many of these teams as an operator can find. The basic OM/XYL Award is for contact with ten (10) teams.

WORKED ALL STATES AWARD

Make a contact with another 10-10 member in each of the 50 United States and you are eligible for the 10-10 WAS award

WORKED ALL STATE CAPITALS

For the basic award the applicant must complete legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 members in 20 state capitals

WPX (PREFIX) AWARD

The basic certificate is awarded for working 100 prefixes

GREAT BRITAIN COUNTIES & REGIONS CERTIFICATE

Also necessary is a DUPE Sheet. If you don't have one of the many logging programs that create their own dupe sheets, then you must make your own or download it from the 10-10 web site.

One example of a dupe sheet is basically a grid of 100 squares (10x10) that have a number (00-99) placed in the corner of each block. Into those squares you will put the received 10-10 number that corresponds to the last two digits of the number as shown below:

68684 goes in the 84 block
2549 goes in the 49 block
236 goes in the 36 block
94 goes in the 94 block
1 goes in the 01 block



When you are done with the contest and your log and dupe sheet is completed, then take the back page of your News with your address label showing. If you don't have an address label, place your membership card in that spot and make a photocopy. **You must be a member in good standing (dues paid) in order to enter a 10-10 QSO Party.**

Fill out all necessary information on the page as listed:

Contest Box – which contest?

Scoring Box – 2 points for each contact with a ten-ten member and 1 point for each contact with someone who does not have a ten-ten number.

Entry Box – type of entry, Chapter Assignment (if any), and your Call Area or ARRL Country operated from. (DON'T forget this last one!!!).

Check List – all MUST be YES to be an acceptable log!!!

Mail to the Contest Scoring Chapter as listed in the QSO Party Calendar *prior to the postmark date*. Please do NOT send an SASE or any monies as logs will not be returned and all scores counted will be posted on both the Web page and in the 10-10 International News.

MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION AND SERVICES

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, city, and state or country. A new member application and contact log is available in Section 1 on page 31 of this publication.
4. You must remit dues for one or more years full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 on page 31 of this publication.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$3 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the *10-10 News*.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three years. If you wish information on the extended payment plan, please contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Extended payment plan is not offered with senior life membership.

Family Life Membership

Family life membership consists of a primary life member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family life memberships run concurrently with that of the primary life member. Family life membership ends when the primary life member becomes an SK. Add \$75 for each additional family life. Only the primary life member will receive a copy of the *10-10 News*.

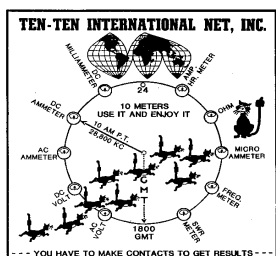
