Through the hard work of Ken Harmon, K1IEQ \#31363, and his super crew of helpers, all of the things that you look for when attending such an affair were available. There were scheduled activities to keep everyone busy, there were surprises that kept everyone interested and there were chapter tables that kept the paper chasers chasing from one chapter to another.

A few of the highlights: The bus trip for the 57 lucky persons that got their tickets before the bus sold out. They saw the historical parts of old Boston and the surrounding area on their all-day journey. The surprise raffle held at the banquet made almost $\$ 1000.00$ for the new Scholarship Foundation. The surprise $\$ 500.00$ cash give away made 20 people happy as they walked away from the banquet with $\$ 50.00$ bills. And the surprise visit of Dave Sumner, K1ZZ \# 04852, Executive Vice President of ARRL, who spent Friday afternoon renewing old friendships and visiting with the Board of Directors.

The 10-10 Club Station, W6OI \#109, was active throughout the convention and was the control station for the parking lot net with Ruth Bartholomew, N0KDB \#48715, who did a great job as net control with over 160 check-ins. Thanks also go to Ed Emco, W1KT \#59148, for the installation of the W6OI antenna on the top of the Holiday Inn building. An 8hour job that paid off with the number of contacts made away from the convention site. At least one attendee made their 10 contacts from W6OI and was presented their membership in $10-10$ by Data Manager Gerry Gross, WA6POZ \#21247. A VE session was also held at the convention and close to 20 took various tests with a large percentage passing their tests.

The Saturday night banquet provided the 185 attendees with not only a good dinner but with a group of prizes that kept the drawing going for at least an hour. There were few that left the banquet without a prize thanks to the good work of Convention Prize Committee and the prize donations of many members.

The 2001 10-10 Convention will be hard to beat, but the challenge to do so is there. The site of the 2003 convention is yet to be decided but there are several possibilities in the works. questions. One action that I would particularly ask you to consider is the possibility that $10-10$ would initiate action to have the phone portion of the 10 -meter band opened up to all amateurs that have 10 -meter privileges. This would remove the restriction of 28.300-28.500 only for those with less than a General Class License. The Board discussed this in length and decided that the membership should be polled to determine the desire of the group. I would like to hear from you, each of you reading this, as to your feelings. Send me an e-mail or QSL card and let me know how you feel about opening up the 10meter band to all who have HF privileges. This would not include no-code techs, but would include coded techs that now have 10 -meter privileges from 28.300 to 28.500 only. The effort to get the FCC to respond to such a proposal would perhaps be possible only with the help and support of the ARRL. This has been discussed briefly with ARRL and they seem to be receptive to a joint effort by both of us to move such a proposal forward to the FCC. This could not happen overnight, but would take considerable effort on both the part of ARRL and 10-10. We will move forward on this only if the membership is in favor of such action. Let me know of your feelings. My e-mail and postal address is on page 2. Consideration to move forward with this project is up to the favorable vote of the majority of the membership. A few minutes of your time is all that is necessary to let us know of your feelings on this mater.

The Board was updated on the status of the formation of the new 10-10 Scholarship Foundation. This is covered in another article in this issue. The formation of the Scholarship Foundation is a major step forward in our effort to maintain the 10-10 Scholarship Program.

Another major project that the Board would like to move ahead on is the use of a complete integrated Awards Data Management Program. This would provide for the accurate record keeping of all awards issued to members in one central data program. At the present time, each Award Manager maintains his own listing of awards he issues and at times in the past, when an award manager is no longer available to maintain his position as a manager, the data from that award has been difficult to obtain or recover from his data. With a
standard integrated award program, this problem would no longer exist and all members' award data would be available to the responsible net officials at any time. Elsewhere in this issue is an article requesting a proposal from those members with computer programming skills that would be interested in participating in the development of such a program.

Editor Steve Rasmussen, N0WY \#68684, has just completed scanning in all 27 years of the past issues of the $10-$ 10 International News and has them placed them on a single CD. This was a big job and Steve completed it in record time. It is now available for purchase and will keep you reading for many hours. Look elsewhere in this issue for details as to how you can order one of these CD's.

Director Linda Barnes, KJ4FM \#43299, has volunteered to take over as Certificate Manager and will be responsible for the making and mailing of certificates for the QSO Parties and other special events such as the Y2K Challenge. By the time you read this the Y2K certificates should have been mailed. Next, Linda will be working on the QSO Parties from earlier this year. This is a job that was formerly done by our past president, Tom Henderson, K4CIH, before he became an SK and we hope to get caught up with all certificates that are due to members within the next few weeks. Please give Linda time to get caught up on this big job she has undertaken.

With the above you have a summary of the important items discussed at the Board of Directors meeting. I am sometimes asked, "What does the Board actually do". I hope that the above gives you a clear view of the details that the Board addresses at each Board Meeting. As a reference of time taken by the Board to address the above and other items not mentioned, a pre-Board meeting is held the evening before the formal Board Meeting. This usually runs from 7:00 pm until approximately 11:00 pm. Things of a larger scope are usually discussed and a meeting of the minds is solicited. The actual Board Meeting began this year at 9:08 am, and concluded at 5:07 pm with a one-hour lunch. It is an intensive 7 to $7 \frac{1}{2}$ hour session in which discussions and decisions are made regarding the present and future of 10-10. Membership inputs are always welcome. Contact me or any of the Board members.

## New 10-10 Scholarship Foundation Receives IRS Approval

The Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws for the new 1010 Scholarship Foundation have been approved by the State of California and the IRS has also approved the Foundation as a 503(c)(3) tax exempt corporation. This means that all donations to the 10-10 Scholarship Foundation are now $100 \%$ tax exempt. In the past we have always assumed that the monies donated to the Scholarship Fund were tax exempt, as all funds received were passed through 10-10 to the Foundation for Amateur Radio (FAR), the organization that makes the determination and awards the 10-10 scholarships. To remove any possible doubt about the tax-exempt status of Scholarship donations, the 10-10 Scholarship Foundation was established. Now with the IRS approval in hand, we can offer tax-exempt status to all Scholarship donations without question.

Completing this project to obtain tax exempt status for the new Scholarship Foundation, which is classified as a NONPROFIT PUBLIC BENEFIT Corporation under the Secretary of State for California, provides the membership, and others, with the assurance of safety in the deduction of all donations to the Foundation.

The Board of Directors, at the recent meeting in July 2001, once again approved the offer of five (5) $\$ 1000.00$ Scholarships for next year. If you have a relative or friend, that you would like to submit for consideration of one of the five 10-10 $\$ 1000.00$ scholarships, watch for the announcement in the NEWS, early next year, as to how and where to submit you application.

## 10 MEIER BAND FREQENCY ALOCATION

## Is the Restriction 28.300-28.500 Still Required?

At the recent Board meeting, the Directors discussed in detail the possibility of a proposal to the FCC to open up the entire 10-meter phone band to all amateurs with HF privileges. It was felt that the 28.300-28.500 restriction has served its purpose and is a "left over" from the Novice Enhancement days and no longer serves the purpose for which it was intended. It was the consensus of the Board that more efficient use of the phone portion of the band could be used if it were available to all who have 10 -meter operating privileges.

To accomplish such a change, it would take the efforts of several organizations and it would be necessary to determine if the FCC is amenable to such a change. It is felt that $10-10$ could not accomplish this on their own, and would require the support of organizations like the ARRL. Preliminary discussions with ARRL indicate that they may be interested in supporting such a proposal to the FCC.

It is the desire of the Board that a survey of the membership should be taken to determine if the membership would support such a proposal. Further action will await the results of the survey of $10-10$ members. This is your time to get involved. In order to determine the desire of the membership, it is requested that you either e-mail or send a QSL card (or letter) to the President stating your feeling on this mater. A simple "yes" or "no" will let the Board know how you, the membership feel. Your comments are also solicited. Please take a minute right now and send your position. YES, let's go forward and get the 10 -meter phone band opened up to all, or NO, leave things the way they are.

Remember 10-10 was originally organized to keep 10meters alive. It was the "use it - or loose it" phrase that you heard in the early days of 10-10 that may have kept others from taking our 10-meter frequencies.

## Anarcos Management Program

$10-10$ is interested in obtaining an Integrated Awards Management Program that would provide the capabilities for maintaining all awards issued to each member. This program would provide for the accurate record keeping of all awards issued to each member in one central location. It is desired that each award manager input his awards, as issued, into his portion of the data base program and then regularly his inputs would be transferred into the master program file.

If you are interested in presenting a proposal for such a program, you may request the quotation outline from: Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ \#19636, 10-10 President. Request for the Request for Quotation may be made either by e-mail or regular mail to the address on page 2 of the NEWS. The Request for Quotation can be make anytime after 1 October 2001 and Notice of Intent to Bid must be received on or before 1 November 2001. It is the intent to have the program fully operational by 1 September 2002.

An-Ten-Ten-nas


Information to help you decide on the best antenna for you

In each issue of the News, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

## No. 33: The Cheapest 2-Element Beam?

"Can I build a small directional antenna for less than \$20?" That was the challenge presented to me. The answer is yes. However, remember that this is a project designed for the dollar sign, so the gain and directivity will be modest. Here is what we need:

32' \#14 copper wire (Radio Shack and elsewhere)
15' $2 \times 2$ (good quality)
7' $1 \times 2$ or similar size Schedule 40 PVC
1' $450-\mathrm{Ohm}$ parallel feedline SO-239 coax connector Boom-to-mast bracket/hardware

The antenna is a 2-element wire parasitic beam with the ends tapered back toward each other. The elements are the same physical length, but the reflector is stub loaded to increase its electrical length. (See the last column for information on stubs.) Gain is about half an S-unit over a dipole, and the front-to-back ratio is about 2 S -units. Feed is a direct coax match, and coverage is about 900 kHz of 10 meters.


Figure 1 shows both the wire and support frame dimensions. The $2 x 2$ determines the side-to-side dimensions, while the cross piece determines the maximum front-to-back dimension. The end cross pieces keep the wire ends 9 " apart.

Use a good marine (spar) varnish (or modern poly equivalent) on all wood. Expect to re-varnish the wood annually. Be sure the $2 \times 2$ does not sag a lot. The cross pieces can be PVC or $1 \times 2$. If wood, give it the same spar varnish treatment.

Details of coax connector mounting, wire termination, and mast support are subject to many variations, so I shall bypass them here. Check with any handbook for many different ways to achieve the same goals. Likewise, mast details are omitted here.

The figure shows the stub dangling, but you can tape it to the center cross piece. Not shown is the $1: 1$ choke balun at the antenna feedpoint that I use on all antennas to reduce RF on the outside of the coax to the shack.


Figure 2 shows the azimuth pattern with the antenna at 20' over average ground. $20^{\prime}$ is the height of two sections of TV masting, which makes an adequate support system for hand rotating the beam. Whatever system you use to elevate the antenna (which I shall assume is as inexpensive as the antenna itself), be certain that the mast is well guyed or bracketed for safety.

The antenna pattern is not a paragon of gain or rear nulling, but it does have some nice features. The forward beamwidth is wide enough so that a single twist of the mast will cover all of Europe or all of the VK-ZL area--or from each of these places, a single setting will cover all of the USA and Canada. The rear has only one lobe, so that there are no antenna positions susceptible to QRM from some quartering rear direction.


Figure 3 is the modeled SWR plot across the first MHz of 10 meters. The antenna was designed for 28.35 MHz to provide a low SWR for the most popular segment ( 28.3 to 28.5 MHz ). You can shift the SWR curve downward by increasing the length of both wires equally about 2 " or so--or shorten them by the same amount to move a bit up the band. However, keep the wire end separation at the prescribed $9 "$ with the end cross pieces.

The antenna is related to the standard Yagi, although the elements are not exactly parallel. The element end coupling

also relates the design to the Moxon rectangle, but the sloping wires prevent us from achieving the high front-toback ratio of that design while still having any forward gain worth using.

So while the performance is modest, the price is attractive. The sloping wire array is a fun antenna to play with, since the cost is so low. However, the most important aspect of the design is that in an emergency--perhaps after some natural disaster has knocked down all of the regular antennas--this design can be fabricated from scraps from the rubble. You can make the electrical elements from house wiring that is no longer functional and lash together a frame with bailing wire.

If you have no inclination to play with the design at this time, you may wish to file this column away in your notebook labeled "In the event of emergency or disaster. . .."

## Ten Ten DX News <br> Mike Davidson <br> N5MT \#24949 <br> 

Europe is back on Ten! The change of propagation has come early for the USA as we had good signals coming out of Europe today. I worked members on five continents before I lost propagation. Last issue I picked September for this event, so it is nice to see the first opening just as I am finishing up this article!

I was pleased to be a speaker at the $10-10$ Convention in Worcester. I had the chance to present the research that I had done to determine the thirty-eight remaining countries that have never had any $10-10$ activity plus the most recently activated countries that I call a 'First Country'. A First Country occurs when a QSL is submitted for a country award for the very first time. These First Country events are getting harder to find as the total number of worked countries grows. With the help of Solar Cycle 23, we could see five to seven new 10-10 First Counties before we reach the bottom of Cycle 23.

There have been $\mathbf{3 0 3}$ confirmed 10-10 counties to date. The latest \#303 was Palestine E4/OK5DX by Slavo OK1TN \#52722, \#302 was Syria YK9A by Carl K9LA \#41258, \#301 Egypt was SU1/K5LBU Frosty \#51322, \#300 Tromelin FR/ F6KDF/T by Larry F5PYI \#54226, \#299 Chesterfield Is. TX0DX by Trey N5KO \#26780, \#298 East Timor Is. by Dennis 4W/K7BV \#5414.

News from ARRL DXCC: A new computer program called the Logbook of the World will be starting up in 2002. This Internet logbook will take electronic QSL data from a secure software program and transfer log information to the ARRL. This data will be matched with your records. Paper cards can still be checked by a card checker and they will approve a DXCC submission of electronic data back to the ARRL. Details at the ARRL web site www.arrl.org. (Editor comments: This looks great and will save time and money in DXCC processing at the ARRL. The DXCC award program has lost money for years. Do not expect a change in 10-10 card checking as we do not have the software that could provide the same secure services as the ARRL electronic logbook.)

A new DXCC country may be created on November $16^{\text {th }}$ from Ducie Is. just north of VR6 Pitcairn Is. If Pitcairn is allowed to join the IARU in November, Ducie Is would qualify by separation from VR6 to be a new country.

The DX Net on 28555 will begin October 7 at 1400Z.
Country Award: There were two upgrades over the DXCC century country mark this quarter. Congratulations to Lad W1CRL at 150 countries No.10, and myself N5MT at 265 countries No. 1. There are 570 basic certificates issued and a list of new certificates and upgrades are in the 'Awards'
section. Now that the mail has subsided, I am slowly going through the submitted QSL data looking for mistakes and trying to improve the accuracy of the data. Most mistakes are misidentified countries and they just require an update. Others produce a duplicate country and loss of a country credit, which happened to me. I promise to be fair and impartial and to hold the accuracy of the data as my utmost priority. So if I have rejected a QSL for a duplicate country, please work harder to find a new one this winter. I encourage you to use email if possible for questions, my address is at the end of this article. I will be glad to send a list of your country credits by return email or by mail for an SASE.

Propagation: The Sun continues its decline from a Cycle 23 peak of solar flux in the summer of 2000. So far Cycle 23 has proved to be more restrained than the previous cycle so I expect a smooth decline in solar flux for the next five years. Yes, many observed poor propagation this summer as compared to the previous years, which was disappointing but we still have two good winter seasons to go in this cycle. My prediction is for the Solar flux to range from $\mathbf{9 5 - 1 8 0}$ during the fourth quarter of 2001.

On September 2nd, the Solar flux was 184 the $\mathbf{A}$ index 9 and $K$ index 3 , which is above the flux numbers three months ago. A large $M$ class solar flare has pushed the flux up the past ten days. However, the average flux continues to decline from the highs in 2000. I foresee a 30 point drop in the average flux during 2002 and by December 2002, I expect a Solar flux range of 80-160.

Cycle 23 is now 3.8 years old. The flux continues to stay above 100 as this phase of the cycle turns down for two more years of good propagation during the winter months for the USA. Multi-hop F layer skip, will be increasing during the fall-winter months as the change of season begins to affect propagation.

Expect the best conditions on Sept 25-27, Oct 21-23, Nov 17-21, Dec 15-17, and Jan 11-13, 2002. Stations in the Eastern USA, expect a $70 \%$ chance of DX to the East-West path into Europe or Africa. Stations in the Western USA, expect $40 \%$ chance of DX into Europe and a $70 \%$ chance into Asia. All of the USA will get a $50 \%$ chance into S. America in the mid afternoon. Expect a $3 \%$ chance of Long Path into Asia or Europe starting at 0000 UTC for central USA. The
beacons from 28.175-28.300 will tell you what is open, especially 28.200 . Good luck.

I wish to offer you some statistics. In 1975, the official publication of Ten-Ten was the Bulletin. That was the first year the Bulletin was published in magazine format. It was ten pages. Prior to that it was bunch of pages stapled together and mailed. There are no known copies of those earliest publications that I am able to scan. For the first three years, there were three magazines a year. I think it was intended to have four, but they never printed them. They started out with 8 to 12 pages each, then went to 20,24 and 28 pages, 36 pages for the 50 th anniversary of 10 meters in 1978, and then settled on 32 pages in the Summer of 1978. In the Spring of 1980, the name of the publication was changed to the $10-10$ International News. There were two issues that actually went to 40 pages. In Fall 1987 when they reported the First Annual Ten-Ten International Convention, and the next issue Winter 1988 when they reported the new proposed by-laws.

When you calculate the total number of pages since that first published magazine in 1975, you come up with a total of 3,342 - and ALL of them may be seen on the new CD-ROM we have available for the paltry sum of $\$ 20$ US. Not only that - but that INCLUDES POSTAGE! See page 11 of this issue for more information on how YOU can get your own. If you were at the Massachusetts Convention, you may have been one of the fortunate few that were able to pick up the first edition of this CD. If so, then a special upgrade price is available for you. See page 11 .

All of the magazines prior to 2000 were scanned into the computer in black and white. Since then we have been outputting the original file in $p d f$ format and some of those actually have color in them. As we go create each edition, we are using as many of the photos in color as possible and hope to have all of them converted by the next edition in 2002. The cost of producing a full-color magazine is too prohibitive at this time, but we will be ready if the opportunity presents itself.

I hope you enjoy the CD as much as I did when scanning each page. It took a lot longer than I expected because I couldn't stop reading it!

I also wish to publicly thank Walter Friant WBØKIN \#15984 and Larry Berger WA2SUH \#00487 for cleaning out their closets and sending me all their old magazines. Without you this job could have never been completed.

President Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, called the 2001 board of directors meeting to order at 9:08 AM, at the Holiday Inn hotel in Worcester, Massachusetts. Present were: President Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ; Vice President Mike Elliott, K7BOI; Treasurer Keith Schlottman, KR7RK; Directors Linda Barnes, KJ4FM; Larry Berger, WA2SUH; Mike Crawshaw, G4BLH; Rex Holford, KONO; Brad Kimble, K0DBK; Bob Peschka, K7QXG; Ed Redwine, K5ERJ; Dave Smith, K6RDK; and Joe Williams, WA9TSG. Also present as guests of the board were; Data Manager Gerry Gross, WA6POZ; and Editor Steve Rasmussen, NOWY.

The roll was called with all members present with the exception of Secretary Dave Prichard, KA5OVO, who was excused due to illness. A moment of silence was observed in honor of all 10-10 International Net silent keys especially Morrie Goldman, W6EHM, and Tom Henderson, K4CIH.

Vice President Elliott was asked to act as recording secretary for the meeting due to Secretary Prichard's absence.

The orders of the days and agenda were read and a motion was made by Director Redwine to allow discussion apart from the published agenda as needed. Motion was seconded by Vice President Elliott, motion passed.

Motion was made by Director Redwine and seconded by Director Peschka to accept the minutes of the 2000 Board of Directors meeting as published in the 1010 NEWS, motion passed.

President Imsande presented his annual report. The President reported on his activities since becoming President after the untimely death of Tom Henderson, K4CIH. His report also included his activities as Vice President, PR Manager and Chairman of the Membership Committee. He covered recent appointments made since becoming President - Vice President, Countries Award Manager, Worked All States Manager, Scholarship Manager, and W6OI Station Trustee. He reported on activities and booth results at the recent Dayton Hamvention and activities in support of the 2001 Worcester convention. The President also reported on the hard work and dedication of the various committees. He reported that the Data Verification Committee had been disbanded and that Don Ruf, KB0ON, had been appointed as Data Verification Manager (a new position). This position will assure that correct 10-10 VP and SK records are maintained. As PR Manager the President continues to author a bimonthly column for Worldradio. The move of the 10-10 web site from Lehigh was discussed. As discussed at the 2000 board meeting, a new 10-10 patch, pin and decal design has been completed and is receiving great acceptance by the membership. The President, K4CIH and the Treasurer attended the Southwestern ARRL convention where they had a booth and presented a $10-10$ forum. As Chairman of the Membership Committee, a new contest, Work the Numbers, has been instituted for 2001. One of the major accomplishments of the past year is the progress of the 10-10 Scholarship Fund. The necessary forms, 10-10 Scholarship Articles of Incorporation, have been prepared and approved by the State of California for the establishment of a new corporation to support the funding for the 10-10 Scholarship Fund. A set of Bylaws for the Foundation has also been prepared. The necessary forms have been submitted to the IRS to grant the Foundation 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status.

Vice President Elliott presented his report. Having been appointed in March 2001 he reported on his activities since that date. His primary activity has been to finish a "re-write" of the 10-10 Operations and Procedures Manual started by Tom Henderson, K 4 CIH . The anticipated date of completion is Fall 2001. A second activity is to author an Ops Manual for the 10-10 Scholarship Foundation. That is to be complete by Winter 2001.

The Secretary and Archivist reports were submitted for the record, as Secretary Prichard was not present due to illness. The minutes of the 2000 Board of Directors meeting in Boise, Idaho, were transcribed, sent to all board members, published in the 10-10 NEWS, and placed in the archives. The Secretary has begun a project of scanning the minutes of all board meetings, 1991 through 2000, and burning them to CD for simple storage and distribution. If the process is successful 10-10 may consider doing the same with other printed information stored in the archives.

Treasurer Schlottman presented the Treasurer's annual report. The report reflects that our organization is financially stable with sufficient reserves to cover the expense of maintaining services to our life members, as well as our current members, and our operating expenses. The Treasurer's report will be published in the next issue of the $\mathbf{1 0 - 1 0}$ NEWS. $10-10$ presented five $\$ 1000$ scholarships in 2000 to deserving ham radio students and will do so again this year. Scholarship donations have increased in 2001 due largely to contributions made in the names of K4CIH and W6EHM. Trends show that membership may decrease in 2001 and 2002. This is due to declining propagation. 10-10 needs to concentrate on revenues in 2001/02 as dues receipts are expected to either stay constant or decrease slightly. Mileage cost for 2001/02 was approved as the approved IRS rate. The 2001/02 budget was presented to the board. Motion was made by Director Kimble and seconded by Director Williams to accept the budget as proposed. Motion passed.

## Committee Reports

President Imsande presented the activities of the Financial Committee and concurred with the results of the Treasurer's report as stated. Director Crawshaw presented the Communications reports and stated that the committee's priority for the year has been the selection of the quarterly Top Operator award for the 10-10 NEWS. He stated that one problem area was in a supply of the certificates for this
award. President Imsande reported on the activities of the Membership Committee, which included the establishment of a new contest - Work the Numbers. This contest is receiving acceptance of 10 -meter operators and seems to be working well. Director Redwine presented the Operations Committee report. Director Redwine began by thanking the many awards managers for their dedicated service and announced the appointment of two new managers - Mike Davidson, N5MT, as Countries Manager and Cliff Taylor, WB4FBS, as Worked All States Manager. Both appointments were approved by voice vote of the board. Director Redwine agreed to ask all managers to provide a full electronic back-up of their particular award data. This back-up to reside with the Operations Committee chairman. He also announced that no new award programs are contemplated at this time. Upon the direction of Director Redwine a motion was made by Director Smith and seconded by Director Peschka that the Worked All States Capitals Award be retired and that all present recipients of the award be recognized in the 10-10 NEWS. Motion passed. A second motion was made by Director Peschka and seconded by Director Barnes that all 10-10 awards not be based upon or awarded on a mode basis. Motion passed. Director Redwine was asked to work with the Contest Manager, Don Ward, WORTV, to explore methods to have 10-10 contest results published in other publications - QST, Worldradio, etc. Director Crawshaw agreed to approach the RSGB and the comparable German organization with an offer of honorary 10-10 membership. It was the consensus of the board that other foreign organizations should be similarly approached. Treasurer Schlottman reported that all award managers are current with their monthly expense reports. Director Holford reported on the activities of the Planning Committee. The majority of the committee's activities have been in support of the 2001 convention. There was praise for the Battle Road Chapter and Ken Harmon, K1IEQ, in particular for their efforts.

## Orders of the Day

President announced that the 2002 Board of Directors meeting would be held in San Antonio, Texas. The meeting will be held in conjunction with the annual Hill Country picnic. Times and dates will be announced at a later date.

The 10-10 Data Manager, Gerry Gross, WA6POZ, gave his report. He stated that a revised procedure for issuing renewal notices should be developed. The Data Manager and the President were charged with working out the details and notifying the board. The Data Manager also discussed the use of "old" copies of the NEWS as a renewal tool. He will choose approximately 100 to 200 recent expirations and target them with a special mailing for renewal. Past members from the 1980's and 90's will be the sample group. The board expressed that efforts such as this must be undertaken to ensure that 10-10's membership is maintained.

The 10-10 Editor, Steve Rasmussen, NOWY, reported on the writing and production of the 10-10 NEWS. He mentioned that delivery of the NEWS in .pdf format is being explored. President Imsande agreed to establish a committee to explore this issue to see if a significant number of members would prefer the delivery of the NEWS electronically.

A site for the 2003 10-10 Annual Convention was discussed. To date there have been several expressions of interest - the South Texas Light Horse Brigade Chapter, the New Mexico Mud Duck Chapter, and K6RDK on behalf of San Francisco. A formal solicitation for the convention will be published in an upcoming issue of the 10-10 NEWS.

## Unfinished Business

President Imsande reported that as directed by then President Henderson, he completed the design of new pins, patches, and decals consistent with the design discussed at the 2000 Board of Directors meeting. With President Henderson's concurrence he had a quantity of each manufactured. These were placed for sale at the recent Dayton Hamvention At that event the new design out sold the old 10-10 design by far. President Imsande expressed a belief that the time had come for 10-10 to adopt an alternate identifying logo to be used as needed by the organization. Motion was made by Director Redwine and seconded by Director Barnes to accept the new pin, patch, and decal design as an additional identifying logo of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Motion passed with one abstention.

President Imsande presented the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws for the 10-10 International Net Scholarship Foundation. The purpose of the Foundation is to ensure that 10-10 has a mechanism in place to solicit tax exempt donations to sustain the monies necessary for providing continuing scholarship funding for deserving ham radio students who wish to attend college. Several motions were advanced in regard to the Foundation. A motion was made by Director Redwine and seconded by Director Berger to accept the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws (dated February 26, 2001) as submitted. Motion passed. A motion was made by Director Williams and seconded by Director Smith to elect the present officers of the 10-10 International Net, Inc., as officers of the 10-10 International Net Scholarship Foundation. Motion passed. At this point, the 10-10 International Net Board of Directors meeting was adjourned to allow for the convening of the 10-10 International Net Scholarship Foundation Board meeting at 10:34 AM.

The Boar4d of Directors meeting of the 10-10 International Net, Inc., was reconvened at 10:50 AM.

Director Crawshaw asked for clarification of the FAR scholarship award rules as they pertain to an awarded scholarship being used outside of the United States. Director Berger agreed to contact FAR with this question and report to the board. Director Berger announced that donations to the scholarship fund for 2001 are ahead of plan largely because of special donations for K4CIH and W6EHM.

Treasurer Schlottman reported on the activities of the Youth Assistance Task Force established during the 2000 board meeting. The idea of a Youth Operator Award (for those under 21 years of age) was discussed. Director Berger discussed the need for articles in the NEWS stressing youth involvement. He
volunteered to work with the Editor to find ways to incorporate this concept. Director Kimble volunteered to author an article for the NEWS about his family's involvement in amateur radio. It was the consensus of the board that the Youth Assistance Task Force should be disbanded and efforts in this area should continue on an individual basis.

## New Business

President Imsande reported on appointments he had made over the last few months. A motion was made by Director Williams and seconded by Director Smith to accept the appointments of: Mike Elliott, K7BOI, as Vice President; Larry Berger, WA2SUH, as Scholarship Manager; Mike Davidson, N5MT, as Countries Manager; and Cliff Taylor, WB4FBS, as Worked All States Manager. Motion passed.

The position of Data Verification Manager was discussed. A motion was made by Vice President Elliott and seconded by Director Williams that 10-10 establish the position of Data Verification Manager, that the Data Verification Manager shall be responsible for the establishment and maintenance of the accuracy of VP and SK records of 10-10, that the data accuracy may not be limited to VP and SK records but may include call signs and associated 10-10 numbers as they relate to VP and SK records, that this position shall report directly to the President of 10-10 and that Don Ruf, KB0ON, be confirmed as the Data Verification Manager. Motion passed.

In accord with Section 5 of the 10-10 Bylaws stating 10-10 membership shall be canceled upon the revocation, cancellation or suspension of an amateurs radio station privileges, a motion was made by Director Kimble and seconded by Director Berger to cancel 10-10 membership for John M. Yount, K4QIJ, \#13463. Motion passed. Documentation of FCC action in revoking the amateur license of K4QIJ was submitted and is appended to the minutes for archive.

President Imsande led a discussion on the need for a complete Awards Data Management computer program. It was the consensus of the board that such a program is needed and that the production of such a program should be pursued. President Imsande agreed to discuss the need with several 10-10 members. The board recommended that by October 1, 2001 proposals for such a computer program should be solicited from qualified members through the 10-10 NEWS.

The board reviewed the fees associated with the LinGer contract for services as $10-10$ 's Data Manager. A motion was made by Director Williams and seconded by Director Smith to adjust the approved LinGer fees associated with the following services; new members, changes/renewals, and preparation/mailing of renewals and foreign NEWS. Motion passed. A new fee schedule is appended to the minutes for archive.

The board discussed the concept of a retainer fee for the Editor. It was felt that such a concept was long overdue. A motion was made by Director Smith and seconded by Director Williams to institute a quarterly contractor fee of $\$ 150.00$ ( $\$ 600.00$ per year) for the Editor of the 10-10 NEWS to begin with the next 2001 issue. Motion passed.

The President spoke about the need for each Director and Officer to take on an additional job to help with 10-10 issues. An example was sited - that of preparation of certificates for 10-10 various awards and contests. Director Barnes volunteered to serve in this capacity. Director Barnes will now be responsible for the production of quantities of all awards certificates, QSO party certificates, special event certificates and Top Operator of the Quarter certificates. Director Barnes will need to interface with the various Managers directly

Director Peschka volunteered to re-write and update the "Certificates" section of the QSO Party Brochure if that is what is required. He agreed to coordinate with the 10-10 Editor and Data Manager to insure that all 10-10 brochures have correct information regarding certificates. If a re-write is required the correct information must be supplied to the 10-10 Contest Manager, the Operations Manager, and Director Barnes as she will be responsible for the production of all certificates. A motion was made by Director Crawshaw and seconded by Director Peschka that the following QSO Party award certificate changes be made; certificates will be sent to the top scorer in each country and each U.S. call area, a country is defined as limited to those countries listed in the current ARRL DXCC countries listing, certificates will also be sent to the Top 10 Finishers in the World and certificates will be sent to the first place finishers in the Club, QRP and Chapter categories.

The Data Manager asked that the board consider the reassignment of the 10-10 number assigned to the Schenectady Amateur Radio Club. That number has been used by the in conjunction with the Electric City Chapter for a number of years. Electric City has a new club call, KG4NYL, and has requested the change. A motion was made by President Imsande and seconded by Director Barnes to have the \#27679 reassigned to club station KG4NYL. Motion passed.

President Imsande reviewed a listing of those Officers, Directors and Managers that should be receiving the XXIP program to be used in accomplishing their assigned tasks. Copies are to be provided to the SK Manager, all Award Managers, the Operations Committee Chairman, and all Directors and Officers. Hard copies and additions/changes are no longer required - only the electronic version of XXIP is required. The Data Manager was so instructed.

Director Crawshaw lead a discussion of how 10-10 might work on improving the use of the 10 -meter band. It was seen as limiting that many hams are restricted to phone frequencies between 28.300 and 28.500 MHZ . To improve use of the band it was the consensus of the board that the band should be opened from band edge to band edge to encourage use by more hams. President Imsande agreed to discuss this issue with ARRL and ascertain their position. To accomplish such a change will take the efforts of several organizations and it will be necessary to determine if the FCC is amenable to such a change. President Imsande stressed that all board members should discuss this idea with members. He indicated that he would see that a poll was taken using 10-10 members through the Internet. President Imsande was in hopes that he could report on his
contacts with ARRL, the FCC and the poll results by the end of the year.
Director Crawshaw asked about a change in XXIP that now made the call-up of SK call signs impossible. The Data Manager reported that while that had been a problem in versions of XXIP issued after January 2001, the new version of WinIP (the new windows version of XXIP) had corrected the problem.

A discussion was held on the rising costs of e-mail subscription services. A motion was made by Director Williams and seconded by Director Barnes that the reimbursement for e-mail charges for each Officer and Director be adjusted beginning August 1, 2001. Motion passed.

At this time a visitor joined the board meeting - ARRL Executive Vice President Dave Sumner, K1ZZ, \#4852. K1ZZ had dropped by the 10-10 convention site to visit with old friends and took the opportunity to visit with the board and answer questions. The idea of opening the $10-m e t e r$ band from band edge to band edge was discussed. K1ZZ explained that the current restriction is a holdover from the days of "Novice Enhancement". He felt that the ARRL board is open minded on the subject and that this could be an activity that 10-10 and ARRL could possibly work together on. He stressed that ARRL is interested in 10-10's views and would welcome comment on the subject. He did caution that the FCC is now asking that all petitions for rule consideration be "packaged" for submittal. The next package to go to the FCC will be submitted in 2002. Therefore, 10-10's timing to address this issue could not be better. K1ZZ was thanked for taking time to visit the convention and in turn he invited those attending the convention to visit the Newington, Connecticut, while on the east coast.

A motion was made by Vice President Elliott to amend the 10-10 Bylaws to reinstate the practice of including the Immediate Past President as a non-voting member of the Board of Directors. It was explained that in cases of death of 10-10 officials such a position could help assure continuity during times of transition. After discussion the motion was withdrawn.

President Imsande announced that there were currently two positions that must be filled. The positions are 10-10 Historian and 10-10 Archivist. Board members suggested several individuals that may have interest. President Imsande agreed to follow-up with these individuals.

The practice of sending a letter to each member who donates $\$ 5.00$ or more to the Scholarship fund was discussed. A motion was made by Director Smith and seconded by Director Kimble that the practice of sending a certificate for each Scholarship donation of $\$ 5.00$ or more be discontinued. However, a letter of acknowledgement will be sent to contributors in accordance with IRS regulations. Motion passed.

Motion was made by Director Holford and seconded by Director Smith that all revised resolutions and changes to the 10-10 Bylaws as adopted by the Board of Directors on July 13, 2001, shall become effective immediately. Motion passed.

All business being completed, a motion was made by Director Redwine and seconded by Director Smith that the meeting be adjourned. Motion passed and the meeting adjourned at 5:07 PM, July 13, 2001.

With the issuance of the number you are eligible to participate in the VP award program. The VP award recognizes those 1010 members that work other members with VP numbers. A 10-10 member may apply for VP award endorsements when completing 100 contacts with VP members. A VP award may be applied for and
awarded for each group of 100 that you work. Also available to VP members are the VP Worked All States award and the Lucky 13 Certificate. The Lucky 13 award is intended to demonstrate the operator's ability to work the entire 10 -meter band. The 10 -meter amateur band extends from 28.0 to 29.7 MHz. The Lucky 13 award is awarded for completing a legal 10-10 contact with 13 different VP's on 13 different days on 13 different 100 kHz (plus or minus 10 kHz ) segments of the band. These contacts must occur between 28.3 MHz and 29.7 MHz . There are 15 possible 100 kHz segments possible within this band section. For purposes of the Lucky 13 award, mobile, portable, or fixed operation may be used. Contacts can be made using any legal mode of operation. QSL conformation is not required.

## WORKED ALL CONTINENTS AWARD

The 10-10 Worked All Continents award is issued for successfully working a 10-10 member in each of the six (6) radio continents (Africa, Asia, Europe, North America, Oceana, and South America)

## COUNTIES AWARD

10-10 offers an award for working all 3076 U.S. Counties. The basic certificate is issued for the first 100 counties contacted. Endorsement seals are available for each 500 level. A plaque is awarded for working all 3076 10-10 Counties.

## COUNTRIES AWARD

The Countries award certificate is awarded for confirmed contacts with 10-10 members in other countries. Applications require confirmations in the form of QSL cards (or non-returnable photocopies). A legal 10-10 contact within the applicant's country may be counted as one contact for this award. A
basic 10-10 Countries certificate is awarded for contact with 25 countries. Thereafter, endorsement seals may be applied for in groups of 10 through the 75 -country level. Beyond the 75-country level, endorsement seals are awarded in groups of five (5)

CW AWARD
The basic certificate for this award is earned with a minimum of 25 legal contracts with other 10-10 members

## MOBILE AWARD

The basic Mobile Contact award is issued for 25 mobile contacts. Each contact must consist of the 10-10 number, call sign, name, QTH (state or country) of both parties and the date. Endorsement seals are available for the 50,75 , and 100 contact levels.

## OM/XYL AWARD

Within 10-10's membership there are many husband and wife teams. These are referred to as OM/XYL teams. 10-10 offers the OM/XYL award for contact with as many of these teams as an operator can find. The basic OM/XYL Award is for contact with ten (10) teams.

## WORKED ALL STATES AWARD

Make a contact with another 10-10 member in each of the 50 United States and you are eligible for the 10-10 WAS award

## WPX (PREFIX) AWARD

The basic certificate is awarded for working 100 different prefixes

## GREAT BRITAIN COUNTIES \& REGIONS CERTIFICATE

 A basic certificate is awarded for completion of a legal 10 -meter contact with another $10-10$ station in five (5) of the numbered Counties/Regions/Unitary Authorities of Great Britain.

2) Log each contact in the following order: 10-10 Number, Call, Name, Location (State or DX Country), Date.
3) Start date: 0000Z 01 January 2001

End date: $2400 Z 31$ December 2001
4) Deadline for log submittal is January 15,2002

Note that logs must be in the order noted in 2 ) above, no exceptions. The location for $\log$ submittal will be announced later in the year. For those using WIN1010 to log their 10-10 contacts, Jim Hardy, K4HAV \#17605, has added a feature to the WIN1010 program to track and print out the "Work the Numbers" contacts you make during the year 2001. 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
3. You must make contact with ten members of $10-10$ and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, city, and state or country. A new member application and contact log is available in Section 1 on page 31 of this publication.
4. You must remit dues for one or more years full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 on page 31 of this publication.

## Primary Membership
