This year 10-10 awarded six $\$ 1000$ college scholarships. Elsewhere in the NEWS is a listing of the recipients and a brief write up of their background and aspirations? For 2008 the Board voted to increase each scholarship amount to $\$ 1500$ and limit the number of Scholarships to four. Funds for the scholarship come directly from members. Contributions to the 10-10 Scholarship Foundation are fully tax deductible. Please consider a donation and give generously.

This year the 10-10 Board met Thursday prior to the convention. The day was spent reviewing the activities of 10-10 and making some modifications to Bylaws and Operating activities. The major changes included;

1) All 10-10 Awards are to be free. SASEs or SAEs will not be needed to receive an Award or endorsement.
2) The PSK Award will have endorsements for all the various digital modes. Endorsements for other Awards will be studied and recommendations made next year. Additionally all Awards will be reviewed to see how best to be able to process them electronically.
3) To be consistent with the purposes of $10-10$ and to eliminate any confusion caused by QSO Parties being referred to as Contests, the name QSO Party will be used throughout 10-10.
4) $10-10$ will join with two other clubs, 700 and EPC, to host a true Digital Contest called Open Season. Details are being developed and will be announced later.
5) The CW/Digital party will be changed effective January 1 , 2008 to be two parties on the same date. A digital and a CW party. A member may enter one or both.
6) A new operating event will commence on January 1 , 2008, "Meet the Volunteers". This event would run throughout the year and encourage all those who volunteer for 10-10 to get on the air and meet the membership.

## 10-10 International Net, Inc. 2007 Board of Directors Meeting

August 9, 2007 Omaha, NE.

President Gross, WA6POZ, called the 2007 10-10 International Net Inc., Board of Directors meeting to order at 8:03 a.m. on June 9, 2007, at the Carlisle Hotel in Omaha, NE. Present were Vice President Larry Berger, WA2SUH, \#407, Secretary Jon Goering, NJ 71, \#43483, Past President Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, \#19636, Director Brad Kimble, KODBK, \#55192, Director Cliff Taylor, K5FBS, \#48461, Director Steve Rasmussen, NOWY, \#68684, Director Jack Moore, K5CC, \#50708, Director Rob Ireland, VE9KM, \#69811, Director Leslie Johnson, WA4EEZ, \#15675, Director Robert Farrow, N6OPR, \#45716, and Director Ken Harmon, K1IEQ, \#31363.

Vice President Berger led all present in the pledge of allegiance to the flag. An opportunity was provided for recognition of any other 10-10 member country. A moment of silence was observed in remembrance of recent Silent Keys.

Roll was called by Secretary Goering with all members present. Invited guest present was Treasurer Keith Schlottman, KR7RK, \#63324. General Counsel Dave Splitt, KE3VV, \#69831 was absent due to medical reasons. A sufficient number of Officers and Directors were present and a quorum was established.

President Gross introduced the guest attending the Board meeting - Paul Hemby, WN4AMO.

There were no additions, corrections, or deletions to the Agenda.

Hearing no objections to the minutes, the 2006 Board of Directors meeting held June 6, 2006 and as published in the 10-10 International NEWS, stand approved.

During the year the Board of Directors via the internet approved the appointments of Bob Farrow, N6OPR as a Director on December 11, 2006, replacing Joe Williams, WA9TSG who resigned; on February 2, 2007, appointed Larry Berger - WA2SUH as Vice President replacing Mike Elliott, K7BOI who resigned and appointed Leslie Johnson, WA4EEZ as Director, replacing Larry Berger, WA2SUH who gave up his post as Director to become Vice President.

## REPORTS -

President Gross reported that he attended Dayton, the ARRL Southwestern Convention, the New Waterkant Gathering in Germany, HamCom Convention in Plano, TX., and the Hill Country picnic in TX, He gave a 10-10 presentation at the Bellevue Amateur Radio Club, and if Nebraska has a State convention, he will do a presentation there as well. He also plans to be at Dayton Hamvention in 2008 and also attend the Orlando HamCation in February 2008. He is writing quarterly articles for the 10-10 NEWS and bi-monthly for WorldRadio.

Vice-President Berger reported on his replacing Mike Elliott-K7BOI as VP. He mentioned having talks with President Gross \& Mike Elliott on his duties as VP. He receives monthly reports from the Data Manager and has found them to be in order. He gives editing advice for the President's various articles. He has given talks on transmitter hunting at radio clubs and always hands out information on 10-10. People find it interesting that there is an organization devoted to 10 meters. VP Berger continues to be the Scholarship Manager.

Secretary Goering reported that he continues to reply to members questions. Most questions from members are how to renew their dues. He reported on the process of the 2006 elections. In November 2006, on behalf of the Board, he along with Treasurer Schlottman, KR7RK presented an appreciation plaque to President Imsande near his home. 10-10 members present were Jon Goering, N7AZ (NJ7l); Donna Goering, KBOJ OK; Keith Schlottman, KR7RK; Esther Imsande, KB6HW; and Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ.

Director Farrow reported that all 10-10 International daily nets are being called every day except Sunday. There are currently 12 net control stations (NCS) with 4 relief NCS to help cover. He tries to check in or be relayed into every net. He has been giving seminars on 10-10 to local radio clubs in the Los Angeles area and will be giving a talk at the ARRL Southwestern Convention in September. President Gross interjected that there has probably been more material sent out in the first eight months of this year than has been sent out the previous 4 years. This is a result of members putting on talks at hamfests and conventions.

Director Harmon reported on his activities of convention planning and has put together a book on how to run a convention. He currently has 2-3 leads for the 2009 convention and will continue to follow up with them. It was suggested that Director Harmon look into the Gateway Chapter as another possible lead. The board has asked that the convention committee have a site by December. Director

Harmon has formed a Convention committee by sending out questionnaires to others that have headed previous 10-10 conventions and requested that they be on the committee. He believes that any question that a potential convention group could come up with could be answered by this committee. The committee includes Mel Sojka, KD5DE, Rex Holford, KONO, Ray Moyer, WD8J KV, Ray Dobson, N5DAS, Jon Goering, N7AZ, and Ed Emco, W1KT. Director Harmon mentioned that if anyone is interested in sponsoring a convention, he is listed in the NEWS and on the 10-10 web site and would be happy to help.

Director Johnson reported that she has been concentrating and encouraging activity on the 10 meter band and 10-10 in general. She has noticed more active interest in joining than in recent years, as evidenced by the number of contacts that say they need her number to join. She has had conversations with GlobalQSL and will present on that later in the meeting.

Director Moore reported on the behind the scenes of the 10-10 website. The webmaster Dar Piatt, W9HZC has transferred the management of the 10-10 Newsgroup to Mel Sojka, KD5DE. This was needed as Dar had a heavy workload with work and the 10-10 website. Dar continues to make changes to the website when asked and has been working behind the scenes on cleaning up some 400 web pages that are unlinked. Dar has linked the 10 meter beacon list with Bill Hays, WJ50, so now the list is always current. Director Moore also reported that the Dar is redesigning the $10-10$ website to make it easier to navigate and will present the new look to the BOD later in the meeting. Director Moore suggested that all Board members notify him of any changes in their area of influence on the website. He briefly talked about the use of W6OI. Director Harmon held up a sign of W6OI that came from the TX convention. Included is a report from Mel Sojka, KD5DE covering Internet Operations.

Director Rasmussen reported he published 4 issues of the 10-10 News and did the contest scoring and all were on time. (Quite a feat considering his illness) He kept the 10-10 brochure updated and passed those on to President Gross. He also went to HamCom to help in the 10-10 booth and also helped President Gross with a 10-10 presentation at a Bellevue (NE) amateur radio club meeting. He mentioned while at HamCom that they received a $15 \%$ response as opposed to about 5\% at Dayton for the amount of traffic that stopped at the booth as compared to the amount of people overall attending.

Visitor arrived at 8:29 a.m. - Wolfgang, DK7LA
President Gross called for a break at 8:29
Meeting continued at 8:37 a.m.
Director Taylor reported on chapter activity. He continues to keep all reports current. He accepts quarterly reports from the 90 currently active chapters. He recommends any changes of chapters \& seals names and sends them to Jim Hardy, K4HAV. He is currently working with a group in FL to activate the QRT chapter of Cypress. Director Taylor said that there was one new chapter that started this past year. He has fielded questions from members relating to chapter(s) and in general has tried to keep 10-10 members informed in the different chapters. He also assisted Jack Moore, K5CC with the W6OI special event.

President Gross thanked all for their reports.
President Gross asked if there were any changes for the Organization Chart - Rev. 14. Director Kimble stated that Dan Morris, KZ3T needs to be added to the Awards committee. Director Farrow, N6OPR asked that Ann Anton, KE6OIO be added as a Net Control and that Steve Olplin, KB3KTR be added as Relief Net Control. He also noted that Dan Wisner, KC8IM and Earl Clapp, KA6RFB are also relief operators. A discussion ensued on NCS. VP Berger noted that under the last column under Misc., under scholarship, his name should be on the bottom. VP Berger asked that Joshua Long, W9HT be added to the Scholarship Committee. Treasurer Schlottman noted that the Scholarship Foundation probably should not be listed in the 10-10 Organization Chart.

Convention Report - See Director Harmon's report above.
President Gross led a discussion on advertising/public relations. President Gross notes that as an organization we are lacking an individual to do public relations for us. We need someone to take on advertising. Discussion ensued as to what the job description may be and to get the word out. Drafting a job description should be done. Discussion followed on the cost of advertising, where to advertise, and the frequency of the ads. President Gross appointed a PR committee of Director Harmon, Director Johnson, Director Moore, and Director Rasmussen, with Director Johnson as Chairperson.

Data Manager Gross reported that Carol Hugentober, WA8YL has stepped down as DX Manager because of a serious accident. Her responsibilities have been assumed by the Data Manager. He also reported that Ruth Bartholomew, NOKDB, the Silent Key Manager has began painstakingly tracking \& verifying Silent Keys starting from 10-10 \#1, using data from ARRL, QCWA, SSDI and other sources. He reported that as

Data Manager he continues to process new, renewals \& Life memberships. He handles all charges, verifies calls, name, and address changes. He also interfaces with the News Editor, Printer, US Post Office with the printing and distribution of the 10-10 News. He noted that with the change in the licensing structure in the U.S., new membership has started to increase and existing membership renewals has also begun to rise. He also reported on rising postage costs. Postage has now passed the cost of printing the News. Using the program Quark has reduced the overall costs associated with printing and distribution of the News.

Director Ireland led a discussion of a Canadian version of W6OI. He has agreed to pay the $\$ 60$ one time fee to acquire VE9TEN for life. Discussion ensued on the legality and ownership.

President Gross declared a break at 9:54 a.m.
Meeting continued at 10:06 a.m.
President Gross passed around the 2007 10-10 pin. A discussion of pins ensued. Gross commented that he bought 500 pins instead of thousands even if it costs more per unit; it is much easier to get rid of 500 than thousands.

President Gross led a discussion on changing the length of the officer's term on the Board to 2 years. Discussion ensued as whether Directors should be included in a shorter term as well, it was determined that a yearly election would not be cost effective. The idea is to hopefully increase member's interest to run for an office, a 4 year term may be holding members back. A motion was made by Director Ireland and seconded by Director Taylor to change Article 5, Section 4, of the by-laws to read "Each Officer shall serve a term of two (2) years or until his or her successor is duly elected and installed in office. Each Director shall serve a term of four (4) years or until his or her successor is duly elected and installed in office. Motion carried. The terms of the newly elected or re-elected Officers and Directors shall commence on the first day of January following their election

Treasurer Schlottman led a discussion on CONFLICTS OF INTEREST POLICY. This is an item that is now on IRS NonProfit forms. Since it asks if we have one, it won't be long before it is required. It basically says that the board has nothing to hide and any transaction that the board is involved in is fully disclosed. This item is being deferred until next Board meeting, so that General Council Splitt can advise what direction the Board should take.

President Gross led a discussion on the Operations Manual. The Ops manual contains some 170 pages and much of its contents don't belong there. Other problem areas are sections pointing to the by-laws, wherein the by-laws points to the Ops manual. A thorough updating is needed. President Gross had identified approximately 50 pages that could be deleted. A motion was made by Director Ireland and seconded by Director Rasmussen to amend the Operations Manual, Section 10 - Nominations, as outlined in the handout. Motion carried.

President Gross had visitors introduce themselves at 10:47 a.m.; visitors included Rex Holford-KONO, Dave-G4KHF, Frank Jeppeson-KCOAXM, \& Jim Whittlesey-KC4RHW.

Contest Committee Report:
Director I reland reported on the Contest Committee Report. The committee circulated a questionnaire to the membership and received a number of replies. Replies were circulated to the contest committee and Director Ireland took their opinions, formulated some proposals, and sent those back to the contest committee which they then agreed on. Director Ireland discussed the many answers received of the various questions of which helped formulate his suggestions for motions.

Director Ireland made a motion that the mobile contest shall be moved to the Easter weekend, seconded by VP Berger. Discussion ensued on the changing dates of Easter weekend and the various QSO parties. Visitors present were asked their thoughts, most felt that it should not be on a holiday weekend and no matter what date it would be someone is not going to like whatever date it would be changed too. Motion defeated.

Director Ireland made a motion that self-spotting shall be prohibited: the contest rules should include the statement "The use of non-Amateur Radio means of communication (for example, Internet, or telephone) to solicit a contact (or contacts) during the contest period is not permitted." (Adopted from ARRL). This statement should be added to rule 6.2.3, seconded by Director Farrow. Discussion ensued. Many thought that an emphasis should be more oriented towards QSO parties rather than contests. Some thought that allowing self spotting would help in getting more activity on the band. Secretary Goering, Director Farrow and Ireland abstained, motion defeated.

Director Ireland made a motion that the CW contest be changed as described in Section 3 of the Contest Committee report, seconded by VP Berger. Discussion ensued that people supported such a separate category but in the same contest. Director Ireland abstained. Motion carried.

Director Rasmussen made a motion that the CW/Digital Contest (separate categories) be made effective January 1, 2008. seconded by VP Berger. Motion carried.

Director Rasmussen mentioned that SM3CER contest page points to old contest info that no longer relates to $10-10$ contest rules. President Gross asked that Director Rasmussen inquire about getting this resolved.

Director Kimble reported on the Awards program. There is a rise in activity due to increased propagation on the 10 meter band. The digital award has been in existence for a year and has helped with an increase in our organization's presence. He mentioned that Mel Sojka, KD5DE is just having a ball running the Digital Award program. Director Kimble also reported that he gave a 10-10 talk at a local ham radio club and more talks will be coming up.

Treasurer Schlottman proposed that 10-10 issue all official awards for free, including postage. Due to costs of the delay of checks, the move toward electronic awards, etc, 10-10 can afford to cover the costs. Director Kimble made a motion that all current paid-up members are eligible to receive all awards for free, seconded by Past President Imsande. Motion carried.

Visitor arrived at 11:48-Mel Sojka, KD5DE
President Gross called for a break at 11:49 a.m.
Meeting resumed at 12:38 p.m.
Webmaster Dar W9HZC gave a presentation on the redesign of the $10-10$ website. He reported that there is currently over 400 pages that need to be updated, many with no links. Once the revised website is brought online it will be easier for members to navigate and for the webmaster to update. All attending liked the new look. Director Moore advised all that if you need changes done to the site to let him know. He also pointed out that we all need to look at the pages that correspond to our area(s) to make sure the information is accurate.

Director Johnson reported on GlobalQSL. VP Berger made a motion to adopt GlobalQSL as a method to handle QSL cards, seconded by Director Johnson. Discussion ensued. The Board had no problem with allowing them to print cards for 10 10 members. GlobalQSL Would like their logo on our website saying that we allow them to send QSL cards to the 10-10 bureau, this was questioned, and decided that this did not constitute any endorsement. Motion carried by show of hands. Directors Farrow and Taylor opposed and Director Ireland abstained.

Director Kimble reported that Jim Hardy, K4HAV has been working on a WIN1010 setup to send a Bar application via email. President Gross asked if we could get all award managers to accept the same format so that we can make it easier to fill out forms and move into the 21st century. If we had a generalized standard format it would make things easier.

Director Moore proposed a WAM (Worked All Mode) award. Discussion centered on how many contacts, what modes, digital, CW, AM, FM, SSB, etc to use or not use. More thinking of the particulars will need to be done outside of the board room.

Director Kimble next led a discussion on a QRP endorsement for the Digital Award. The proposal is for 25 contacts at 5 watts or less, which must include a mailed or a scanned signature verification of QRP operation. Discussion ensued on endorsements on other awards. President Gross suggested that Director Kimble go back to his award committee and come back with more specific language. Many agreed that mode endorsements would be great but that no endorsements would be numbered.

Director Moore would like to see an activity weekend where all the 10-10 officials, managers, and volunteers get on the air to allow members to work them. Discussion ensued as what to call this activity, who would be included, and the frequency of how often this would run. The general consensus was that it be held concurrently with the Annual QSO Party using the same general rules and for it to be effective January 1, 2008. Director Rasmussen will come up with a check off sheet. Vice President Berger made a motion that event be called Meet the $10-10$ Volunteers - as presented on the Organization Chart and seconded by Director Ireland. Motion carried.

Visitor at 1:34 p.m. - Mike Sullivan, WN5PMR
Director Kimble led a discussion about a possible new Digital contest. This is would be a PSK 10M only contest that would involve different groups. Each station is worth a point and multiplier by association. This would be on a weekend in June sponsored by 10-10 and the name would be "Open Season". Director Kimble made a motion to put together a PSK contest sponsored by 10-10 that would include the 070 club \& EPC club, operating in the first full weekend in June, to be called "Open Season" and seconded by Director Johnson. Motion carried.

Director Moore inquired about getting chapters more active other than their nets by having a weekend activity. President Gross asked that Director Taylor get with Director

Moore to work with the chapters to become more involved on the air over a weekend.

President Gross led a discussion on "what is a valid contact". Discussion ensued. Is a contact via a repeater valid? Is using a wireless microphone valid? Is using a remote station valid? Director Taylor will draft a questionnaire/survey for the membership.

Director Taylor reported on 10-10 reflector abuse. Director Moore will work with Mel Sojka, KD5DE to change how 10-10 "replied" reflector messages are automatically "Replied" To the reflector to forcing one to manually "Send" To the reflector.

President Gross announced that there will be no "Presidents Award" this year. In the past at the prerogative of the President a recipient would be chosen. President Gross would rather consider nominations from the officers of 10-10 International and have them write it up to the President and from this list, the President would select an honoree. He thinks 3 months before the annual board meeting each year would be the cutoff to submit a nomination.

Director Rasmussen talked about LZ1JZ QSL cards. TonyLZ1JZ would like to have business from 10-10 members. Director Rasmussen will look into this further and report back to the board.

Director Ireland moved that he be empowered to acquire and act as trustee for a Canadian club license on behalf of $10-$ 10 International which will be used by Canadian 10-10 members in the same manner as W6OI; the board will designate \#75000 to this call, seconded by Past President Imsande. No discussion. Motion carried.

Director Ireland commented on election nominees and a nominating chair. He thought it would be beneficial to get a list of the ending terms of the board members. The ending terms are listed here.

Director Moore commented that members have requested more technical information relating to 10 meters on the 10-10 website. This will be looked into. Also to be considered is the issue of shipping and insurance when sending a prize, possibly outside the US. The lure of a prize is to get members to attend the convention.

Past-President Imsande thanked everyone for all the cards and emails while he was in recovery for his stroke. It greatly uplifted him.

Treasurer Schlottman presented the 10-10 financial report for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2007. The total assets are almost $\$ 416,000$, with liabilities of about $\$ 280,000$. Treasurer Schlottman explained about liabilities. President Gross interjected that there was an email that stated there was 74000 members, and that there should be millions of dollars in the treasury. Statements like that are untrue. The numbers that we have to look at is Active members vs. Inactive \& Life members. It is only active members from which 10-10 derives funds from. Treasurer Schlottman described the Net Assets Unrestricted as available monies that could be used. He noted that every year that number has been growing, some in part to lower board meeting costs each year, lower publishing \& postage costs. Treasurer Schlottman finished by saying that financially $10-10$ is healthy and there are ways we can utilize our monies to benefit our members such as what we approved today with no fees for awards. He also mentioned that even though the number of members is down, we are still a healthy organization. Treasurer Schlottman explained that we need to document who are all the authorized signers of all of our various accounts. Past President Imsande made a motion that President Gerry Gross, VP Larry Berger, Secretary Jon Goering, and Treasurer Keith Schlottman be the authorized signers of our accounts, seconded by Director Harmon. Motion carried.

Treasurer Schlottman discussed the proposed budget. Discussion ensued for the amount to use for Promotion. It was decided that $\$ 3000$ should be used and that Awards and Contest be raised to $\$ 600$. Director Taylor made a motion to accept the proposed budget and seconded by Director Ireland. Motion carried.

President Gross adjourned the meeting at 3:35 p.m.

Roll was called by Secretary Goering with all members present. Invited guest present was Treasurer Keith Schlottman, KR7RK, \#63324. A sufficient number of Officers and Directors were present and a quorum was established.

There were no additions, corrections, or deletions to the Agenda.

Visitor arrived at 3:54 p.m. - Al Kaiser, N1API
Hearing no objections to the minutes, the minutes of the 2006 10-10 International Scholarship Foundation, Inc. Board of Directors Meeting held June 6, 2006 as published in the 1010 International NEWS stand approved.

A motion was made by Past President Imsande and seconded by Director Ireland to elect the current officers of the 10-10 International Net, Inc., as Board of Directors for the Scholarship Foundation for the years 2007 and 2008. Motion carried.
Reports:
Scholarship Manager Berger presented his report and stated the goals for the Scholarship Foundation. 2006 was the most successful year for the Scholarship Foundation with total income of almost $\$ 12,500$. The goal is to cover $6 \$ 1000$ scholarships and that was exceeded by over $\$ 6,000$. In comparison, in 2005, $\$ 9,107$ was donated. In 2006 there were fewer donors, than in 2005 and in 2004. The account balance is being held in a money market account with a balance of about $\$ 20,500$ which includes a $\$ 2,000$ donation that just came in with another $\$ 2,000$ employer match that will be coming. The expenses of the manager of around $\$ 75$ for postage and supplies are subsidized by 10-10. Treasurer Schlottman reported that we have a healthy balance and hopefully it will continue to grow and eventually be self supporting.

Manager Berger mentioned that with the increasing costs of college maybe the Foundation should be have more scholarships of $\$ 1,000$ or fewer for more money, perhaps increasing to $\$ 1,500$. A discussion ensued over the quantity and amounts of scholarships as well as investing the donations long term. A motion was made by Director Rasmussen and seconded by Director Taylor that we fund 4 scholarships of $\$ 1,500$ for the year 2008. Discussion ensued. Motion carried.

President Gross adjourned the meeting at $4: 27$ p.m.

In each issue of the News, we shall try to clarify a significant cluster of ideas used in antenna work. Our object is to help you make the best decisions about the antennas you buy or build without imposing our own prejudices on you. The more you understand, the better your choices will be.

## No. 57: A Different Kind of 10-Meter Attic Antenna

Due to restrictive covenants, many 10 -meter operators must use attic antennas or devise other ways to hide the antenna. Older ranch-style homes used to be long and narrow. Hence, many attic antennas are dipoles oriented along the length of the attic. A 10 -meter dipole is about 200" long. The operator had to orient the dipole according to the attic space, which might or might not place the wire broadside to the best target communications areas.

The last decade or so has revised home architecture so that the long attic is gone. In its place is a collection of smaller attic spaces, often with more vertical than horizontal room. For these spaces, we need a new kind of attic $10-$ meter antenna--one that will largely free us from orientation worries and still perform well in the confined space. It must still keep its distance from all metal wiring, ductwork, and foil sheathing. Enter the Cuthbert Cube.

A few years ago, Dave Cuthbert, WX7G, used some basic antenna folding ideas that had appeared in antenneX, an on-line antenna experimentation journal, and developed a 2 -meter antenna as a desktop improvement on the usual FM rubber ducky. The design evolved from bending, folding, but not mutilating the $1-\lambda$ quad loop with a side feedpoint for vertical polarization. However, we can easily tip over the Cuthbert Cube (which is not quite truly cubical) and obtain horizontally polarize patterns, just like a bottomfed quad loop. Fig. 1 shows the 2 orientations.


The Cuthbert Cube General Outine for Vertical and Horizontal Use

The equivalent of 2-meter desktop height is probably $10^{\prime}$ at the antenna bottom for the left part of the sketch, the vertically oriented cube. If we take patterns at that height, we obtain the elevation and azimuth plots on Fig. 2. The gain is modest on 10 meters: less than 1 dBi at an elevation angle of $17^{\circ}$. However, the pattern is nearly circular for the small volume occupied by the antenna.


Elevation and Azimuth Patterns for a Vertically Oriented Cuthbert Cube 10 ' above Average Ground

More relevant to 10 -meter CW and SSB use is the horizontal orientation. If we assume that the modern attic allows a 20 ' height above ground for the bottom wires, then we obtain the patterns in Fig. 3. The elevation angle is about $21^{\circ}$, which is lower than for a dipole at the same height. Because we have a loop and the vertical wires carry some current, there is some vertically polarized radiation. So the azimuth pattern is not a traditional dipole figure-8, but instead a broad oval. The maximum gain lies along a line through the feedpoint and the gap between the rear vertical wires and is between 6.7 and 6.8 dBi , less than 1 dB lower than a dipole at the same height. However, the radiation to the sides is only about 5 dB below maximum, enough to hear signals in those directions when the propagation is good.


Elevation and Azimuth Patterns for a Horizontally Oriented Cuthbert Cube 20'Above Average Ground
The 10 -meter version of the Cuthbert Cube is about 5'3 " on the feedpoint line. The vertical and the front-back dimensions are identical: $3^{\prime}-7^{\prime \prime}$. Hence, some version of the antenna should not only fit within a small attic, but we should also be able to orient it for maximum gain in desired directions.

The antenna is a closed loop and hence does not change its impedance much as we change height. The resistive part of the impedance is $50 \Omega$ at the design frequency. However, this antenna has a peculiarity: The
inductively reactive part of the impedance increases as we reduce the element size. Hence, for element diameters from about $5 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ downward, we need to add a series capacitor in line with the feedpoint. A $75-\mathrm{pF}$ to $100-\mathrm{pF}$ variable from a hamfest sale will work fine. However, if we use 1 " elements, then we no longer need the series capacitor, since the inductive reactance is no longer present at the design frequency. As well, we increase the passband covered with under 2:1 SWR to include all of the first MHz of 10 meters. Wire versions cover about 600 kHz of the band. Fig. 4 shows the $50-\Omega$ SWR curve for a Cuthbert Cube with 1" elements.


Building the Cuthbert Cube requires a set of dimensions. The following table shows 2 sets: one for 28.4 MHz and intended for wire versions of the antenna. The second set shows dimensions for a design frequency of 28.6 MHz and is intended for the 1" version. Fig. 5 provides a guide to which dimension goes where. Dimension E is the gap or open space between the vertical wires in the antenna. The dimensions are equally applicable to the antenna when used vertically.

A wire version will require some form of support structure. In a dry attic, wood and PVC--or some combination--are good candidates. You will likely need
corner supports and a way to prevent the wires from pulling the ends of the supports toward each other. It is also likely that you will need two more supports for the vertical wires. Since these wires have low current, you can run the wires next to the support posts, rods, tubes, or dowels. You will also need a short support for a plate to hold the coax connector and the series capacitor. Fig. 6 shows a simple schematic representation of the feedpoint with a single variable capacitor. Once you know the required capacitance to produce the lowest SWR at the design frequency, you can replace the variable capacitor by a fixed capacitor of the right value.


Feedpoint Arrangement for a Wire Version of the Cuthbert Cube However, be sure that it can handle the power of your transmitting equipment. 500 -volt capacitors are usually adequate for most standard transceivers.

The 1" element version of the antenna does not require a series capacitor. In fact, it does not even require tubing. You can substitute 1" per side L-stock, which is available at many home centers. The stock usually comes in $1 / 16^{\prime \prime}$ and $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ thicknesses. The thickness will make no significant electrical difference, but the weight ratio is $2: 1$. However, heavier stock is somewhat more rigid. The stock easily let's you create nut-and-bolt corners. As well, you can mount a coax connector directly onto the element at the feedpoint and run a bridge wire from the connector pin to the continuation of the element on the other side of the small (1/4") gap. You can choose whether the connector points horizontally or downward, depending on the likely coax run in your attic and walls. Use any handy plastic strip to join the parts of the element on each side of the gap to sustain a physically rigid element.

One advantage of this form of construction is that you can build everything in the shop and then break the antenna into pieces that you can get into the attic. A screwdriver and a nut-driver may be all the tools you need for in-place final assembly. As with all attic antenna, you want to raise it off the ceiling joists. You can hang it from the rafters or devise a wood or PVC set of elevating supports. The specific construction of your attic and how you want to orient the antenna will make your installation a custom effort.

A stronger alternative construction method is to use copper pipe with a $1^{\prime \prime}$ outside diameter. (Piping sizes are "nominal", that is, listed by the minimum inside diameter, not the outside diameter. You will have to check the actual outside diameter of the pipe you select.) You can torchsolder or sweat the corners with $90^{\circ}$ junctions. Only the feedpoint requires special attention to create a gap for the coax connector while retaining a rigid element. I do not recommend torch flames in the attic. So use this method of construction only for outdoor service or if your attic let's you fit the finished antenna through the entry.

The horizontal Cuthbert Cube may not fit everyone's needs--or even everyone's attic. But for some 10 -meter operators, it might make the difference between being on the air or not.

## General Comments:

We had a good turn-out of chapters at the Omaha Convention. ## Submission of I nformation:

This column must be in to the editor of the NEWS no later than the first week of the month of March, June, September, and December. So in order to make the deadline and, if you want your chapter information in the current issue, it needs to be in hand by the last day of February, May, August and November. Keep in mind that sometimes the newsletter is delivered a few days into the month rather than being on the 1st, Therefore, if you have a special or worksheet that is going to be done during the months of January, April, July, or October, then the information needs to be in to the Chapter Manager in the prior issue.


There has been little DX activity in the way of DXpeditions this past summer. The sun continues to produce few sunspots and some days no sunspots as we have reached the bottom of Solar Cycle 23. Earlier in 2007 we started the year with two big on-the-air DX events, but the only news this summer has been Sporadic E skip, like during the 10-10 Summer QSO Party when parts of the US had opening to Texas all day Sunday and half of Saturday.

We continue to have more record low solar flux readings of 67 during the past three months. Everyone is watching past the six month solar flux average to determine the average flux for the previous month. When that average turns up, it will indicate the start of Solar Cycle 24. The previous cycle had a record low solar flux of 67 ten years ago in July 1997.

Hope all of you that went to the 10-10 Convention in Omaha had a good time. I enjoyed watching the web cam and got to see one of the chapter tables taking a tumble on Cliff K5FBS. Cliff was not hurt by the table but his stuff was scattered on the floor. Thanks to Jon for the web cam!

YU Serbia/ Yugoslavia. A review... The country of Yugoslavia has been renamed Serbia and it has broken up into six pieces, each a separate new DXCC entity because of political independence. The area represented by YU1 \& YU7 is currently Serbia, using YT and YU prefixes. YU2 is now 9A Croatia. YU4 is now E7/T9 Bosnia-Herzegovina. Slovenia is S5 and Macedonia is Z3. The original breakup of Yugoslavia started in 1991 but the most recent change was 40 Montenegro. Since June 2006, Montenegro has been waiting for the ITU to assign an callsign block to this new country. They did not want to give Montenegro a new prefix, so it required the states of Montenegro and Serbia to agree upon a prefix from the existing prefixes of Serbia-Montenegro. So if you work one of these stations, please ask the station if you have a doubt as to what country it is. All of these entities have had previous 10-10 activity, however, there is no one living in 40 Montenegro that is a current member.

Countries Award: The total number of basic certificates issued is 619. I had one basic certificate and one upgrade this past quarter. Basic Certificates are now FREE but upgrades cost a Self-Addressed Envelope (SAE) and you should copy your QSL or eQSL cards instead of sending the originals to save postage. Use the website before you send your application and email any questions to me.

I made lots of QSOs on CW and PSK but only a few on SSB. I did work ten when it was open, but typically only made contacts out about 1000-2000 Km. My gear was a FT857 and mobile antennas, the first trip I used a HAMSTICK and the second trip I used a High Sierra screwdriver antenna. I was not allowed to put up a permanent antenna. Most of the US stations I worked were on 20 or 40 meters. I plan to give out my 10-10 number when I am asked in Qatar. I have a full UK license GOMKT, from way back when I was first stationed in the UK. Take care, Kelly" NM7H \& A7/GOMKT.

Propagation: Propagation has been poor the last part of summer in the US as few Sporadic E openings have been observed here in Texas. The last good opening was the Summer QSO Party the first weekend in August. Expect the daily solar flux to range from 69-85 the next quarter and the monthly flux will stay below 88 until Solar Cycle 24 is recognized by NOAA.

November 2006 through August 2007 the observed solar flux monthly averages were $86.4,84.3,83.5,77.8$, 72.3, 72.4, 74.5, 73.7, 71.6 and August 69.2 (lowest).

Cycle 23 is eleven plus years old. The flux remains in its lowest range with many days of zero sunspots. On September 10th the solar flux was 67 the A index 2 and K index $\mathbf{0}$ which is 14 points lower than last article. $X$ ray emissions from the sun have dropped to their lowest levels in 18 months. Solar activity is very low and a chance of a major/large flare is small.

Expect the best conditions on September 1720th, October 14-17th, November 10-12th, and December 7-10th. Over the next four months, for USA stations, expect a $10 \%$ chance of DX in the mornings to Asia, Europe or Africa and a 30\% chance into South America or the Pacific in the afternoon. To tell what DX paths are open, use the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200).

# A POINT TO PONDER?

I have just returned from the 1010 International Convention in Omaha. While there, I took advantage of the opportunity to attend the Board Of Directors meeting, which is open to all members. I was very impressed with the manner in which our Organization is run. The various Directors were given the opportunity to present ideas and a lively discussion was held and in the end, the best ideas prevailed for our organization. I came away feeling very good about the future of 1010. One of the ideas discussed was the clarification of what constitutes a legal contact to exchange 1010 numbers. The Operation Manual states that a legal contact is as follows: "A legal 10-10 contact must be a two way contact exclusively on ten meters. A legal contact consists of the call, 10-10 number, name, QTH (state or country) and date of contact. At no time is it acceptable for a 10-10 number to be relayed via a third station". This brought up for discussion several modes of exchanges that were never even dreamed possible when the original manual was written. Some of those modes discussed were as follows: Echo link, which is made by using a computer to link through the internet to a distant radio transmitter and contacting a station that could be many miles away, even Europe or any other DX Country. Another mode is ILRP, which allows you to make a transmission through your radio
to a repeater, linked to the internet and retransmitted through a distant repeater to another station, for instance, a mobile unit. This could all be accomplished on 10 meters. Say you use a wireless microphone at your base station. That may violate the rule also. Another mode, which many of us use is a 10 meter repeater. If a mobile in Florida puts out a call through a repeater in New York and a base station answers in Germany, that brings up the question, does the Florida and Germany station claim the contact as their QTH or does the New York QTH become involved. Another mode that people have been using that has not be addressed, is a contact on 29600, which goes through a link station. Say you put your station on top of a mountain transmitting on 29600 and you link to that transmitter using either a telephone line, internet or radio link and make a contact. Is this a legal contact? These are all pondering questions which need to be addressed as to the validity of a contact that can be counted for awards. These are just some of the new modes that are being used. In the very near future, I am sure there will be additional modes developed that we can only dream about today. As younger amateur radio operators become involved in this hobby, their interest will probably lie in using computers to enhance their enjoyment along with a radio. So, would a more modern interpretation of a 1010 contact be; originate with a 10 meter radio at point $A$, using whatever method necessary to reach a 10 meter radio at point $B$, QTH reported as being point $A$ and point $B$ ?

Last Quarter I introduced myself to the group and this Quarter I would like to introduce to you the NCS (net control station) who calls the daily net on Mondays 28.800 - Arnold J. Kalan WB6OJ B. We call him Doc. When WA6TQC called me and asked to be relieved calling this net, I asked Doc to take over thinking that Scotty was just going through a bad time and would be back calling his net. However that was not to be. Here is a short Bio on WB60J B.

My amateur radio life started when I was 5, believe it or not. My dad, Morris Kalan, M.D. received his ham license in 1939, W6SPJ. He had a National receiver, which type I can't remember. His transmitter was designed and built by my uncle, W6LS (Leo Shepard) and W6LAK (Ed Wallace). It was about 6 feet tall and when he tuned it up, all the lights in the neighborhood dimmed. My uncle also built the KNX radio transmitter in 1932. That's the CBS affiliate in Los Angeles. He also built the first permanent radio on Tarawa after the initial landing. I used to listen to my dad on the air and, after the war, he was active in phone patching GI's to their families back home.

My dad wanted me to get my license but I really didn't have much
time until I passed my medical specialist boards. In 1972 or '73 I went to the Lockheed Radio Club in Burbank to study for my novice license. When I walked in, there was a picture of my Uncle Leo on the wall in his Navy uniform. The club asked my aunt if they could have his call after he passed away. My first license was WN6OJB.

I had heard that a new club was forming in Culver City so I enrolled in it and got my speed up and theory learned and got my general ticket a year after my novice license. Had to go down to the FCC building and was I scared. My medical tests were a breeze compared to the FCC test. I received my extra class license a couple years ago after the code requirement stayed at 5 WPM. I decided to keep my "OLD JINGLE BELLS" call.

I can't remember when I joined 10-10. Must have been about 10 years ago. Actually, I got fed up being insulted on the County Hunter's Net and I had heard of $10-10$, so I joined. Best move I've made in radio.

With propagation being so spotty, I decided to relearn CW. I finally got up enough nerve to go on the air with my shaky fist in May 2006. Now, except for the 10-10 organization, you'll find me in the CW portion of the band. I'm still slow but I'm having a lot of fun and meeting some interesting people.

One of my greatest thrills in ham radio was operating from Palau in April of 2006. Jean, my XYL, and I were there for 6 days and I operated for 4 of them and made about 500 QSOs. My call sign was T88AP.

Besides my participation in 10-10, I'm a life member of ARRL and at the present time I'm president of the Medical Amateur Radio Council (MARCO).

That's my story. Hope I can do it for many more years.

### 6.2 10-10 QSO PARTI ES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Anniversary and Mobile QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules.

### 6.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event. Other logs received will be handled as checklogs. Checklogs are used to validate (check) other logs but do not receive awards

### 6.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTI ES?

There are currently five QSO Parties held through the calendar year:
Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.
Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10/10)
0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.
Fall CW - held on the last full weekend in October
0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

### 6.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP or any other similar types of assisted contacts are NOT allowed.
CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW portion of the 10 meter band and operated using CW and/or any Digital mode (RTTY, PSK, etc).
Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE portion of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved Phone method (SSB, FM, AM).
The SPRINT utilizes both CW and Phone portions of the 10 meter band.
NOTE: A OUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band.

### 6.2.4 ENTRY CLASSI FICATION

Entrant may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:
INDIVIDUAL: includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.
QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event.
CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority. The Club must have active 10-10 membership. Club entries must additionally list the call, name and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

### 6.2.5 TRANSMI TTER INFORMATI ON

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from only one call district, province, or DX country. Multitransmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

### 6.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10\# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10\#, then record a zero[0] in the log.

### 6.2.7 QSO POI NTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number.
One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number.
Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero[0] for points.
Any log showing $10 \%$ or more errors may be handled as a checklog.
A station may be counted only once regardless of mode.

### 6.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSI GNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that chapter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for a sprint may not be assigned.

### 6.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRI ES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR MAIL to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a checklog. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded.

### 6.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTI ON

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log, and Dupe Sheet as described here:
COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9)
or DX Country, Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10\#, number of contacts and points without 10-10\#, and total contacts and points claimed.
LOG must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 1010\# (zero [0] if none), QTH and Contact Point Value.
DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order, or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

### 6.2.9.3 ENTRY DEADLINE

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on $10 / 10$ ) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

### 6.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event, and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top Individual scorer in each US Call Area (W0-W9) and each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB and CHAPTER.

### 6.2.11 ANNI VERSARY QSO PARTY

This event runs from January 10001 UTC to December 312359 UTC. Entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have 10-10's anniversary year contained in their membership number.
Example: 2002 is the 40th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "40" in their membership number (i.e., 72040, 69405, $64054,40126,00407)$ would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10 -meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:
During the calendar year (January 1 though December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH, with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above.
Contacts must be made on the 10 -meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.) but all contacts must be made direct and unassisted. NO repeater, satellite, or Internet assisted contacts are permitted. The contact mode must be recorded in the log entry.
All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order.
This event is for Individual entries as described in section 6.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the Top Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following the Anniversary QSO Party year entered. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

### 6.2.12 MOBI LE QSO PARTY

This event is held on the third Saturday in March from 0001 to 2359 UTC. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:
Fixed stations contact mobiles, mobiles contact everyone. Mobile applies to vehicular, marine, aeronautical or other mode of transportation. If in doubt, contact the QSO Party Manager. A station operating a mobile entry must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in transit (moving).
Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation.
The on-the-air exchange shall be Call, Name, State, 10-10 Number (if a member, zero(0) if not), and county (if applicable). Only counties in the USA, Canada and England may be used as a multiplier.
Count one point for each contact whether a member or not. Fixed stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked. Mobile stations multiply the number of contacts by the number of different counties worked PLUS a bonus of the number of counties worked from.
All stations must submit separate logs for the counties worked from. Log scores will be combined by the QSO Party manager.
Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than 14 days after the end of the event. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

### 6.2.13 FOR MORE INFORMATION

Current information about 10-10 and upcoming 10-10 QSO Parties is always available on the 10-10 web site. Cover sheets, logging forms and dupe sheets are also available for downloading or printing.
