From The President

Idle Chatter from the President

This is my last article as President of 10-10 International Net. Four years ago as I was beginning my presidency the bottom of cycle 23 was to have been reached and we were supposed to see the beginning and rise of cycle 24. Four years later, we may be in Cycle 24 but conditions have not improved as much as anyone had hoped. Now the propagation experts say that the peak years are 2012 or 2013. Hopefully in the short time remaining, conditions improve so we can enjoy the peak before we have to endure the slide back to the bottom.

These four years have passed quickly. Four years ago one of my objectives was to gain more exposure for 10-10. This has been accomplished as today I, Board members, Managers or volunteers are attending hamfests or conventions during most parts of the year. 10-10 is advertising in CQ, ARRL, WorldRadio and Canadian Radio Amateurs. We are also considering running banner ads on QRZ in the near future. Four years ago 10-10's web site was to be quite honest 'a joke'. With Director Mel Sojka's KD5DE #33513, hard work and with the assistance of a few others, our web site has been totally revamped. It has a List, Forums, Chat Rooms, Shopping Cart and a host of other services that were not possible with the previous web. Having and keeping a good web site demands continual updating.

Several other items have been started but are not finished. When I took office I made sure that each Director took responsibility for their area and let them operate according to their and the appropriate committee's wishes. I only got involved when the Board's interest was required. This area requires some additional work and I am sure that in the future we will see more changes. The Operations manual, a guideline on how the various areas of 10-10 are to operate; not a storage bin or a history of 10-10, has been shortened from over 175 pages to slightly over

100 pages. More work is required to remove redundancies and change the responsibilities of maintaining the manual from one person to the appropriate Director or Officer for each section. The 10-10 Board attempted to modify the definition of a valid contact and that was met with some stiff opposition. However, I feel the end result, while not the way I would have liked, is a good first step.

By the time this edition of the NEWS is received the outcome of the recent election should be known. We will have a new President and some new Directors to oversee the running of 10-10 starting in January 2011. The results are posted on the web and will be printed in the January NEWS. Several times this past quarter I was asked why I had chose not to run again. That decision was actually made four years ago when I was first asked to run. At that time I was ready to retire as Data Manager. I have been involved with the daily operations of 10-10 for over 30 years and like retiring from any job, it is time to pass the responsibilities on to someone else. Quite frankly, I would like to spend more time operating, traveling and being with the Grands. That being said I have not given 10-10 up completely. I will be on the Board for at least two more years as Past President and continue to be active at hamfests and conventions.

The duties and responsibilities of the President have been greatly exaggerated and misunderstood. From some of the comments I have read in the past, some feel that the position wields a lot of power and influence. Actually the position of President is very limited. No power: the President can not make motions or vote as part of the Board unless there is a tie. Some influence: as the President is one of eleven members of the Board and can try to sway the Board towards a desired goal, as any other Board member can. The President is a manager, setting meeting agendas, routing requests for services and insuring that the objectives of 10-10 as established by the Board are followed.

2011 is a convention year. Two years ago in Orlando it was decided to subsidize the cost of the Banquet. Food prices at hotels are not very reasonable, and it was decided to pay the tax and/or the gratuity. For 2011 we will continue this practice. While we strive to get the most reasonable room rates and banquet costs, costs just keep going up. It is one more way that dues and investments of 10-10 benefit the membership.

Mentioning prices that only go up! Most should be aware that the First Class US postage rate is once again set to rise next year. When you read the minutes of the last Board meeting you will notice that one item talks about the NEWS failing the 'flop' test. The 'flop' test means that

a single copy of the NEWS must be stiff enough to not bend along the longest axis when less than 50 percent is unsupported. This 'test', which we never knew existed or when it was first implemented, basically means that the NEWS could have been out of compliance for the past twenty years. To resolve this issue several solutions were examined to find the least expensive and ease of implementation. Some solutions looked at were folding and sealing the edges of the NEWS, replacing the cover with a stiffer paper stock or just using a heavier weight paper to print the NEWS. All of these options, of course, mean more expense to print and mail. Folding the NEWS can not be done mechanically unless the number of pages was cut to 24. Replacing the cover sheet with a heavier stock adds additional printing steps in the preparation process. And the weight of the NEWS would require addition postage. The simplest solution was to use a heavier weight paper for the entire NEWS. However this solution has its increased cost as well. The paper will cost more and the additional weight will cause the postage to increase to the next ounce of postage. This for the US membership is 17 cents per member per issue mailed. Not a major expense or a cause for alarm, yet. However, for DX members the cost is much greater: Canada - 25 cents and the rest of the world between 80 and 90 cents - again per member per issue mailed.

What we can we ALL do to keep membership dues where they are today. The answer is rather easy. Begin by receiving the NEWS electronically. In the coming months there will be an effort to use the internet more. Renewal notices, membership cards, awards certificates, and other items that today are sent through the mail will be sent electronically.

With this the last issue of the year and as my last issue as President I would like to take this final opportunity to wish each member a Happy Holiday season and New Year. May 2011 bring us peace and happiness and keep

us well.

On October 10, 2010, the **Netherlands Antilles** will cease to exist as a country within the Kingdom of the Netherlands and the islands will emerge with several new statuses: St. Maarten and Curaçao will each become an independent country within the Kingdom and will be granted the same status that Aruba attained in 1986. Bonaire, Saba and Sint Eustatius will be given the status of a public body in the Netherlands and will be directly under Dutch rule.

For Amateur Radio this means that the Leeward Islands (PJ2/PJ4) and Windward Islands (PJ5/PJ6/PJ7) will be deleted for ARRL DXCC. However, four new entities are expected to emerge on 10-10-2010. Both St. Maarten (PJ7) and Curacao (PJ2) will each become new DXCC entities. Bonaire (PJ4) will become a new DXCC entity. Saba (PJ6) along with St. Eustatius (PJ5) will become a single DXCC entity due to their proximity to each other.

JX Jan Mayen Island. Stan SQ8X, announced that a team of 5-6 hams, is planning to visit the Island of Jan Mayen between July 4-14th, 2011. 10-10 International Net, Inc. 2010 Board of Directors Meeting St. Louis, Missouri June 19, 2010

Vice-President Larry Berger, WA2SUH, #407 called the 2010 10-10 International Net Inc., Board of Directors meeting to order at 8:35 AM on June 19, 2010, at the Sheraton Westport Plaza in St. Louis, Missouri. Roll was called by Secretary Sandy Glenn, W7SSG, #74633. Present were Vice President Larry Berger, WA2SUH, #407; Director Brad Kimble, K0DBK, #55192; Director Cliff Taylor, K5FBS, #48461; Director Jack Moore, K5CC, #50708; Director Rob Ireland, VE9KM, #69811; Director Robert Farrow, N6OPR, #45716; Director Ken Harmon, K1IEQ, #31363; Director Paul Hemby, WN4AMO, #73825 and Director Mel Sojka, KD5DE # 33513. President Gerry Gross, WA6POZ, #21274, was absent due to medical reasons, as well as past President Chuck Imsande, W6YLJ, #19636. General Counsel Dave Splitt, KE3VV, #69831 was absent due to a family commitment. A sufficient number of Officers and Directors were present and a quorum was established.

Invited guests present were Treasurer Keith Schlottman, KR7RK, #63324, new Data Manager Joe Faria, W1SQL, #71965, and Editor Paul Riedel, KI0SR, #8861. Also in attendance were Marlon Gillbreath, WA0CKO, #37994, William Eggleston, N0WM, #2724, Jerry Heien, N9AVY, #43313 and Gary Miller, KA6GPC, #43555.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Director Taylor. An opportunity was given for the recognition of any other 10-10 member country. A moment of silence was observed in remembrance of recent Silent Keys.

The following items were added to the agenda: the rewrite of chapter guidelines; consideration of a Board succession plan; the Presidents award and discussion of the open season contest.

Hearing no objections, the minutes of the 2009 Board of Directors meeting held July 23, 2009 as published in the 10-10 International News, stand approved.

Reports:

In the absence of President Gross, Vice-President Berger gave the highlights of the President's report. President Gross reported that he attended the Dayton Hamvention, and HamCom in Plano, TX. He continues to write quarterly articles for the 10-10 News and a bi-monthly article for World Radio Online. He reported that in February he appointed Paul Hemby, WN4AMO, #73825 as Director to replace the position left vacant by the resignation of Director Leslie Johnson, WA4EEZ, #15675. The appointment was subsequently approved by a majority of the Board of Directors. Paul Hemby has assumed the duties as the head of the Public Relations Committee.

Vice-President Berger reported on his activities for the past year. He reviewed the monthly reports of the Data Manager and found them to be in order; was consulted with on several issues relating to 10-10 and the Scholarship Foundation; assisted in interviewing candidates for the Data Manager/Supply Manager position(s) and responded to several inquiries from 10-10 members. He reported that he gave talks at several local radio clubs on transmitter hunting and also worked in a pitch for 10-10 at the conclusion of his presentations. He continued in the role of Scholarship Manager for the 10-10 Scholarship Foundation and communicated with the Foundation for Amateur Radio, the administrator of our 10-10 Scholarships, (see 10-10 Scholarship Foundation minutes).

Secretary Glenn reported that in the past year as secretary she and her family had represented 10-10 at Sea Pac in (Seaside, OR) There had not been anyone representing 10-10 there in the past 20 years, so they were more than happy to have us present to hand out the 10-10 News, handle memberships, etc. She also fulfilled the duties of Secretary during the elections.

Director Hemby reported on Advertising. He said that we are presently advertising in four publications: QST, CQ, World Radio and Canadian Amateur. He has contacted each and asked them to list him as the contact for 10-10 advertising. He helped man the 10-10 booth at the Orlando Hamfest, where they had a great turnout, processed some renewals and handled new applications. He has been working with Director Moore to get the new Spirit of 76 QSO Party going.

Director Kimble reported on the Awards Committee. The committee has been fairly busy over the past year. Currently, there are four committee members. In the past year there have not been any issues that the committee had to deal with. All of the managers have been able to report at least once during the year with the exception of the GP Counties and Regions and WAS awards, due to propagation. But with propagation picking up he expects the coming year to be very active for the awards program. He also checks the Ten-Ten Forum on a regular basis to ensure there were no questions relating to the awards program by members. This will be his last report as Director and Awards Committee Chairman, as he will not be running for re-election at the end of his term.

Director Taylor reported as Chapter Coordinator. With the help of the Chapter Relations Committee he affiliated chapters wanting to become members of the

10-10 organization; re-affiliated those chapters desiring continued affiliation; and de-affiliated those chapters no longer meeting requirements and took care of problems which arose regarding chapters. He accepted quarterly reports from currently active 85 affiliated chapters and/or subchapters, to ensure lists were up to date on the 10-10 website and Chapter Net Guide. He continued to write the Chapters Manager's column for the 10-10 News, including chapter information that was of interest and list of chapters that accepted upgrades via e-mail. He recommended to K4HAV changes which needed to be made in the CHAPNAME and SEAL NAME listings in the WIN1010 program. These listings are updated as needed and contain the latest information on chapters and chapter seals (whether collectable or used on worksheets). This information is made available to any 10-10 member on the WIN1010DL web site. Director Taylor assisted Director Moore in the W6OI Special Event by finding members in the 1 through 5 Districts who wanted to participate and made the QSL cards for the event. He worked on the "What is a Valid 1010 Contact?" Ad Hock Committee to come up with a proposal to be delivered to the Board of Directors at this annual meeting.

Director Harmon reported on the 2011 convention which will be held at the Sheraton Westport Plaza Hotel in St Louis, MO on July 19-23 hosted by the Gateway Chapter, with the Board Meeting on the 20th of July, and chapters can set up tables on that day. Thursday would be the first day of the convention, all day Friday and Saturday would be a short day ending around 3:00 for "President's time" and getting ready for the banquet that evening. There was a lot of discussion on the 2011 convention and questions were brought up about the cost for the convention. There is \$10,000 set in the budget (two year budget plan) for hamfests and conventions. Also, door prizes for the convention are usually handled by the President and other members usually in the past have gotten donations from the Dayton Hamfest by contacting different organizations and getting donations. Letters are always a good way to get donations. A motion was made by Director Farrow seconded by Director Sojka to establish pre-convention seed money with a cap of \$2500.00 with the contact to be Director Harmon. Motioned carried.

Director Sojka gave the Internet Report. He stated that the web site continues to be very active, and we have recorded 175,856 visits, with the revisions below: April 11, 2009 – A Forum security patch was installed to stop spam bot attempts to register April 28, 2009 - A full service Shopping Cart was installed to allow for on line membership renewals and applications. Aug 10, 2009 -The Shopping Cart was modified to allow for club station renewals and applications at a reduced rate when the no news option was chosen. Aug 26, 2009 -A new Mailman mailing list became available using an outside provider. This replaced the list that had been dropped in December 2008. Feb 22, 2010 -To prevent unauthorized access, a security patch was added to the shopping cart. Mailman List: Set up new Ten-Ten list at EMWD hosting. There are no major hosting services that allow total Mailman usability; therefore a contract type service was the only option. Cost is \$4.00 per month for an average of 8000 outgoing posts per day. At the 6 month renewal date we had 139 subscribers to the list and renewed for a one year subscription. When shut down the previous list in 2008 there were just over 500 subscribers. Shopping Cart. This is a one of a kind application; the customer has to create the product using a form before the purchase can be made. This does cause a little problem at times, as many members will access the application out of curiosity and if they do not make the purchase, he and the Data manager get a copy of the form expecting a purchase to follow. This has happened 139 times. He is working on a revised form to see if some of the problems with the shopping cart can be avoided. Forum/Chat Room. We have 349 registered users on the forum and 139 in the chat room. The forum is not being used to its full capabilities. The chat room seems to be used only during QSO parties so it does have to be monitored for abuse on a regular basis.

A break was taken at 10:00 AM and the meeting resumed at 10:15 AM.

Director Ireland reported on the Publications Committee: He said that he and the Editor have solicited articles and other material for publication in the News with varying degrees of success. They have tried to start a series on radios and computers, but it has been difficult getting material from the original author. They have started a series on Board members and so will be looking in the near future for volunteers. It was asked that Director Kimble provide an article for the October issue of the News since he will no longer be a Director after December. He accepted. One other item discussed is that the News fails the "flop test." This refers to the weight of the paper going through the postal machine. The options for this are: 1) using 50# paper will cost approximately \$150.00 more per issue to send out and 2) using bulk rate which may be far less reliable. We will be using the heavier paper and using first class mail.

Director Moore gave his report on W6OI (official 10-10 Club Station), QSO Parties and the mobile contest rules.

W6OI

Club station W6OI was established in 1975 in memory of Jim Payne who was the Corporate Secretary and Treasurer for 10-10 as well as a Net Control Station. W6OI is available to current members or chapters for special events such as conventions and gatherings. Louise N6ELK operates W6OI on the 10-10 daily nets. The club station participated in all QSO Parties and was operated by Dan K7IUQ mobile and portable from December 9th to March 10th. W6OI was the official station at the Orlando Convention in July 2009 making over 100 contacts. **QSO Parties**

Marginal band conditions were reflected in the number of logs received for the various QSO Parties. The phone QSO Parties brought the greatest participation. There is a new QSO Party in July, "Spirit of 76", in which stations will operate 6 modes. Also in October there will be a special sprint on 10-10-10 . Ruth, N0KDB has designed certificates to be given to members working any of five categoriesone member with 1010 in number, 10 members with 10 in number, 10 volunteers, all 10 US call areas and 10 DX members. Mobile QSO Party: This event is held on the third Saturday in March. Director Moore recommended revision to the Mobile QSO Party rules. He said the current rules allow both mobile and fixed stations to submit logs and to use multipliers for counties worked from and for counties worked. This results in stations having to submit multiple logs and has caused scoring difficulties for both QSO participants and for the scoring manager. The revised rules would allow only mobiles to submit logs since this is a mobile event (fixed stations could submit check logs if desired). Points would be like other QSO parties, two points for working 10-10 members and one point for non-members. No multipliers for counties worked or counties worked from would be allowed; however, mobiles could work the same station from different counties and receive two points for each contact. A copy of the revised rules was given to all Board members. An outline of the revised rules follows:

- 1. Only mobile stations will submit logs; however fixed stations are encouraged to participate to help give out points and collect counties. Mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. A station operating mobile entry must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in transit.
- 2. Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation.
- 3. The on the air exchange shall be Call, Name, QTH, 10-10 Number (if a member) zero (0) if not) and county.
- 4. Scoring will be the same as other 10-10 QSO parties. Two points awarded for contacts with a 10-10 number and one point without a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties.
- 5. Logs must be in date/time order and list Date, UTC time, county worked from, Call, Name, 10-10 number, County worked, QTH and Contact Point Value. Fixed stations may submit logs as check logs only.
- 6. Logs must be postmarked no later than 14 days after the end of the event. Only members in good standing with dues paid are eligible for awards.

Discussion followed about the revised rules with questions being raised about fixed stations not being included and DX entities not being represented. No consensus was forthcoming and action was postponed until later in the day Director Farrow reported on 10-10 nets: He stated that 10-10 nets are called daily (except Sunday). There are a lot of questions by members about what is a VP so maybe we should put some information in the news about this. There was one net run by Dan, KC8IM that had 53 check-ins with the help of two relay stations. A big concern is that 10-10 Board members do not check in. There were 31 check-ins on Thursday, June 17th. He also stated that he needs more net controllers especially on the East Coast and the Mid-West. He was asked to check into having PSK nets and on June 1 started a PSK net, with three contacts, with one 10-10 member. Then on the second day there were no check ins. This net is run daily (except Sundays) at 1900 hours.

Vice-President Berger presented Data Manager Gerry Gross' report. Ruth Bartholomew N0KDB, #48715, Silent Key Manager, tracks, verifies and report on silent key activity, using data from the following: ARRL, QCWA, SSDI and other sources. She continues going through the 10-10 database identifying SK's. As of March 31, 2010 she is through 40,012 having identified over 2300 silent keys this year and 4900 as of this report. As Data Manager Gerry processes new memberships, renewals, and life memberships, handles all charges, verifies call, name and address changes. He also interfaces with the 10-10 News editor in the publication and mailing of the news. With the poor band conditions, memberships have slowed. As of March 31, 2010 over 350 members receive the news either a

download or by e-mail., and over 1100 members have signed up for a quarterly e-mail notification of important 10-10 events.

Vice-President Berger thanked everyone for their reports.

Old Business:

Organization Chart Review: Vice-President Berger asked if there were any changes to the Organization Chart. The following changes were noted: Net Control station N7PVL should be deleted and replaced by KC8IM. Data Manager WA6POZ is replaced by W1SQL. If there is anything else to be changed or added let President Gross know and it will be noted.

What is a Valid 10-10 contact: This discussion was led by Director Ireland. At the direction of the Board, an ad hoc committee comprised of Directors Taylor, Kimble and Ireland was established to work on the definition of a legitimate 10-10 contact. At the June 2008 Board Meeting, a change was made to the Operations Manual that stated "A repeater contact will count as long as both stations have no direct or indirect control over the repeater". Following some negative reaction an online survey was held, but with only 50 responses the Board felt that this was insufficient to warrant a further change. Therefore, a survey was published in the October 2009 news with 70 responses coming back; from that it appears the recent change in the definition a legal contact allowing the use of repeaters was not popular with most of the respondents nor was the concept of allowing the use of remote base stations. He also pointed out that the new language in 5.1.1.1.d.1 and 13.1.2.1 is not in agreement. The opinion of the subcommittee is to rescind the Board action of June 2008 and stipulate no repeater use for valid ten-ten contacts and harmonize these different definitions and make a single clear statement in the operations manual. Director Ireland made a motion for the definition to appear in 13.1.2.1 as essentially the old one with a few changes: "A legal 10-10 contact must be a direct, two-way contact exclusively on ten meters, and must consist of the exchange of call sign, 10-10 number, name, date of contact and QTH (state or country). Repeater, Satellite, IRLP or any other similar types of assisted contacts are not allowed. At no time is it acceptable for a 10-10 number to be relayed via a third station or copied from any other source. The QTH is the location of the transmitter and not the location of the operator." Director Farrow seconded the motion. (This discussion was continued after lunch).

At 12:10 PM a break was taken for lunch and the meeting resumed at 1:43 PM. An additional visitor to the meeting was Ruth Bartholomew, N0KDB, #48715.

After the lunch break the discussion resumed on what is a valid 10-10 contact. After much deliberation on the topic and in light of considerable opposition to the motion, Director Ireland and Director Farrow who seconded withdrew the motion.

A new motion was made by Director Hemby seconded by Vice-President Berger to read as follows: "A legal 10-10 contact must be a direct, two-way contact exclusively on ten meters, and must consist of the exchange of call sign, 10-10 number, name, date of contact and QTH (state or country). At no time is it acceptable for a 10-10 number to be relayed via a third station or copied from any other station. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP or any other similar types of assisted contacts may only be used for Bar and VP contact awards." The motion carried with Director Ireland voting "no."

Operations Manual Review: Vice-President Berger reported that President Gross stated at last years meeting that he was supposed to separate the Operations Manual headings by Director, but that did not get done as planned. Also each Director through committees would have the approval to make minor changes to the sections without approval of the Board. Any new awards would have to be approved by the Board.

Nomination Committee: Director Ireland reported that the committee received a good number of enquiries, and at the end of the process there were thirteen people that requested forms; ten submitted completed forms and two asked for their forms to be withdrawn, leaving a total of nine members asking to be nominees. The committee agreed to allow all names to stand so for the election. Therefore there are two nominees for President, one for Vice-President, one for Secretary and five for Director. The Committee recommended that the Board consider whether or not they wish to stipulate Board experience as a prerequisite for those wishing to stand for some positions such as President, Vice-President, etc. This will be an agenda item for next year's board meeting. The Nomination Committee completed its duties and everything was turned over to the Secretary to follow up on items for the upcoming election.

New Data Manager: New Data Manager Joe Faria spoke about 10-10 mail being shifted to Connecticut. He also mentioned there is a change in banks from US Bank to Wachovia/Wells Fargo.

Chapter Coordinator/Operations Manual Revisions: Chapter Manager Taylor stated that the following changes needed to be made.

1. Change all references in the entire document from Chapter Committee to

Chapter Relations Committee.

- 2. Change all references to Chapter Manager to read Chapter Coordinator.
- 3. Section B.1 Delete the word Local after both instances of the word more.
- 4. Section C. Delete this section in it entirety as it is no longer valid.
- 5. Change Section Heading D Chapter Privileges to read C Chapter Privileges
- 6. Change section heading E to D
- 7. Change first section heading F to E.

8. Add following to section D chapter reporting "These reports may be made via the US Postal Service or via e-mail. For access to the reporting forms, go to the resources and click on it, from the pop-up menu choose Forms. (the forms are on the fourth row)

A motion was made by Director Ireland and seconded by Director Hemby to have the changes made as presented and to be publicized in the 10-10 News. Motion carried.

2011 Board Meeting:

A motion was made by Director Harmon seconded by Director Farrow to have the convention and Board Meeting in St. Louis, MO in 2011.

Director Harmon withdrew his motion until we are able to speak with President Gross by telephone later in the meeting.

Chat Room:

Director Sojka described suggestions made by members in the chat rooms. It was suggested that we have a committee for the internet. It was also suggested that we look into Video Conferencing.

Advertising:

Director Hemby gave his report on advertising. We are advertising in four publications with their cost shown below: QST \$173.40/month CQ \$135.00/month World Radio \$33.00/month Canadian Amateur He was not sure of the amount.. He contacted QRZ. They have a top banner ad for \$50.00 month. Has been working with Amateur Outfitters for a web site for 10-10 members to purchase different personalized items (shirts, hats, mugs) In return for him being listed as advertising, 10-10 would receive 15% back for all sales to 10-10 members quarterly.

Director Hemby made a motion seconded by Director Harmon to "Give Amateur Outfitters a trial with a link to the website and remittance of 15% back to 10-10 on profit from sales, with a trial period of one year, with proceeds to 10-10 quarterly. Motion carried...

DX Conditions and Concerns: Director Ireland received a message from a DX member, it was suggested by that member (name unknown) that we have a Director appointed or have a DX as an officer. This could also be done by special invitation to the Board meetings or submit a report to the Board. It was decided to table this issue till a later date.

President Gross had said that he will check into the matter of Henry DL8YBM, as follow up, on the use of his club calls.

A 5 minute break was taken at 3:00 PM with the meeting resuming at 3:05 pm. At this time a conference call was made to President Gross to discuss some of the issues.

New Business

Convention: The convention would be July 19-24, 2011, with the Board meeting on Wednesday instead of the usual Thursday, giving three days of activities available, and the Sunday would only be a breakfast. If the board wants to change the dates to have the Board Meeting on Thursday, then the contract with the hotel will have to be renegotiated.

Succession Plan: The question was raised that Directors need to have dues paid up before the election. Also, an open item this year, with an action to be put in place at next years board meeting and put in the bylaws on "How do we elect Officers and Directors and if we need to specify their hands on experience within 10-10 not just by them being a 10-10 member for four years prior to an election for an office, and if we would want a succession plan for a volunteer to be able to move up to director, or director to move up to VP, Secretary to VP, and VP to President."

Presidents Award: President Gross presented the yearly President's Award for outstanding service to 10-10. This years recipient is Vice-President Larry Berger WA2SUH. Larry has been a ham radio operator since 1961 and a 10-10 member since 1969. He was Area Manager 2 from 1979 to 1997. He became a Director in 1998 and continued in that position until he was appointed to replace K7BOI, Mike Elliot in 2007 and was subsequently elected in 2008.

2011 Board Meeting

A motion was made by Director Kimble seconded by Director Taylor to move the Board meeting back to Thursday at the 2011 convention. Motion carried with Director Harmon opposed..

Then Director Sojka made a motion seconded by Director Hemby to announce that the 2011 convention in St. Louis, MO will be held during the week of July 18-24, with specific dates to be published when the contract is negotiated.. Motion carried.

Financial Report:

Treasurer Schlottman reported that 10-10 has had a positive change in assets since last year. Total current assets are \$66,598 with investments of \$410,000 and the total assets of \$476,598, most of which represents pre-payments of dues from life members and others. The budgets for 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 were reviewed. Director Hemby made a motion seconded by Director Taylor for \$1,000.00 to be added to the budget for preconvention expenses. The motion was defeated.

Director Hemby made a motion seconded by Director Sojka to pay \$150 a month for expenses to new Data Manager Faria starting July 1, 2010. Motion carried

Director Hemby made a motion seconded by Director Harmon to increase the amount paid to Treasurer Schlottman for expenses from \$150 a month to \$200 a month starting July 1, 2010. Motion carried. This amount has not been raised since 1994 and the Board felt that this is a wise investment.

Secretary Glenn made a motion seconded by Director Sojka to accept the budgets for the year 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 as presented in Treasurer Schlottman's report. Motion carried.

Mobile QSO Parties:

When discussion continued, Director Ireland seconded by Director Sojka moved that the revised rules be approved and that changes to the rules could be made at future Board meetings, if necessary. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 5:00 pm.


Director Kimble made a motion seconded by Director Sojka recommending that we fund four scholarships at \$1500 each for the next scholarship year. Motion carried



TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

6.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties The Anniversary, Meet the Volunteers, and Mobile QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules.

6.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as ckecklogs. Checklogs are used to validate (check) other logs but do not receive awards.

6.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently nine QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprit of 76 - 7 day, 6 mode event centering around 4 July each year

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10). 0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the 3rd full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the last full weekend in October. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

6.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRPL or any other similar types of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM).

The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter

NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band. 6.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrant may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:

INDIVIDUAL: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/ or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event.

CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority and must have active 10-10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment.

6.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

6.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10 # and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

6.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a checklog. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode.

6.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

6.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a checklog. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. All logs may be sent via Email. Please no .Q95 or .adif files.

6.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here:

COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9

or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value.

A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

6.2.9.3 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, than the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

6.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue.

Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top Individual scorer in each US Call Area (W0-W9), each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB and CHAPTER. Electronic certificates will be sent to the 2nd and 3rd place scorers in these categories.

6.2.11 ANNIVERSARY QSO PARTY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC.

In the Anniversary QSO Party, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have 10-10# anniversary year contained in their membership number.

Example: 2010 is the 48th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "48" in their membership number (i.e.,72048, 69485,64854, 48126, 00487) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:

During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above.

In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is permitted, regardless of mode of contact.

In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.).

All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order.

These events are for Individual entries as described in section 6.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following both the Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers QSO Parties. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

6.2.12 MOBILE QSO PARTY

This event is held on the third Saturday in March from 0001 to 2359 UTC. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions:

This is a mobile QSO Party, therefore only mobile stations will submit logs, however, fixed stations are encouraged to participate to help give out points and collect counties. Mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. If in doubt, contact the QSO Party Manager. A station operating a mobile entry must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in transit (moving).

Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation. Safety is paramount while operating mobile. If you are unable to park near multiple county lines due to safety issues (i.e. on a bridge, on a freeway, etc.), please move to the closest area which would provide the best operating conditions and still be able to give out multiple counties.

The on-the-air exchange shall be Call, Name, QTH, 10-10 Number (if available) and County. Scoring will be the same as other 10-10 QSO Parties. 2 points awarded for contacts with a 10-10# and 1 point awarded for contacts without a 10-10#. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties. (i.e. if K4HAV is a on 3 county line and he works K4JPC, That would count as 3 contacts, one for each County).

Logs must be in date/time order and list Date, UTC time, County worked from (If applicable), Call, Name, 10-10# (zero 0 if none), County Worked, QTH and Contact Point Value. Fixed stations may submit logs as check logs only.

Logs MUST be postmarked no later than 14 days after the end of the event. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are eligible for awards.

6.2.13 SPIRIT OF 76 (7 Days, 6 Modes) QSO PARTY

This event will run for 7 days and be around July 4th of each year. Make as many contacts as you can during the week using 6 modes. The modes that will be used are as follows as well as the **suggested** frequencies to monitor:

- 1. USB (28.345) 2. RTTY (28.086) 3. CW (28.050)
- 4. FM (29.600) 5. PSK (28.120) 6. AM (29.000)

Scoring will be as normal for QSO Parties, 2 points for members and 1 point for non-members. Dupes will be allowed once for each mode. It will be possible to work the same call 6 times in each of the various modes for a maximum total of 12 points per call. All other normal rules apply. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

6.2.14 FOR MORE INFORMATION

Current information about 10-10 and upcoming 10-10 QSO Parties is always available on the 10-10 web site. Cover sheets, logging forms and dupe sheets are also available for downloading or printing. The address is http://www.ten-ten. org. Any unanswered questions regarding the QSO Party rules may be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION AND SERVICES

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 on ten meters and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). A new member application and contact log is available in Section 1 below.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more years full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 below.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club Membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. No Family or Life Memberships are available. Membership is available with or without the 10-10 NEWS.

XXIP is a DOS based program that is updated monthly and is a roster of 10-10 membership through 10-10 #75001. It is available free at www.ten-ten.org/xxip.


