

I began the first week in February, now the 15th has passed and still cannot see the end of the road. I will extend my heartfelt gratitude to all those that served as editor in the past. Of course, we are in need for an Editor and after this edition that need may be significant.

Our Volunteer list is also short a General Counsel, due to a personal conflict. This is frustrating when this happens. I hope that one of our Lawyer types will step up to help use maintain the Bylaws and assist with board motions. Some do not realize how critical decisions from the board can be and how poor wording can lead to major issues.

I have just returned from the Orlando Hamcation. Even with a all day rain on Saturday we did hold a forum, considering that attendees had to walk about 75 yards and much of it in the rain I count a dozen in attendance good. I mentioned last edition that after many years without a forum at Dayton we were attempting to gain a slot. Well we are going to be in room #2 Friday 11-12. Please make an effort to be there. Your attendance will help maintain the slot for a forum.

The February QSO party created a large influx of new members. We should have well over 100 as a result. With the QSO party scoring process automated, it was a snap for the logs submission. I have yet to see the results but they are elsewhere in this issue. Last numbers I saw from the scorer reflected 123 logs, containing 12734 contacts on 3604 unique calls.

Some have noticed changes in the web site and before this News is published the site will be totally upgraded and hosted from a different server altogether. If all goes as planned. We outgrew our previous provider last fall and began plans to relocate at that time. As always, the members should show a bit of patience during this process. I have been involved with IT work since 1995 and have yet to see a move 100% on the initial effort, maybe this will be the time.

Do not forget 1 May is the deadline for you to submit your Bio's to the nominating Committee. The following offices will on the ballot President, Vice President, Secretary, and 4 Directors. Please consider serving the organization as an official.

One of the changes in this election is the electronic voting booth. The software has been developed and tested over the past 3 years and is ready to implement. You membership status will be verified, and there is a security process that prohibits multiple votes from the same member. The only requirement besides current membership will be that you will have to be a registered in the member's area. Before this year has gone, the only way to retrieve the electronic news will be through the member's area. You will not find a user name or password on the back cover of this edition. Those that are on electronic distribution will receive the credentials for this edition. We still have only about 75% of our members that selected electronic distribution registered in the member's area. Please complete the process. The News will be in that are on the first day of the publication month every issue.



DX News

Mike Davidson, N5MT (#24949)

The ARRL Ten Meter Contest on December 14-15th was a great weekend. I operated SSB and CW and gave out my 10-10 number when asked. In December 2012, the solar flux was about 125 during the Contest as compared to a solar flux of 165 in December 2013. I had a lot more contacts in my log as compared to all the other Ten Meter contest during this solar cycle 24. When you put one hundred countries in your Ten Meter contests log during one weekend, you have done well.

Well the sun finally got up the energy to provide us with a second peak for solar cycle 24 in January 2014. I have talked several times about low solar energy levels during cycle 24 as solar flux levels have been down compared to the previous cycle that also had a double peak in cycle 23. Well, the second solar peak of cycle 24 occurred in January 2014 when the number of sun spots peaked at about 250. Do not forget, a sun spot does not equate to a solar flux. The spots are always more than the flux level as they are different. There were several good DX countries on the band at the peak, so I was able to pick up several band countries for my log during the second peak. I also found several new digital DX contacts this year to help add to the growing number of band countries that I need for the ARRL DXCC awards.

Good luck this spring as the propagation in the USA will change just about the time that this article will be published in March 2014.

The International DX Convention will be held in Visalia, CA on April 3- 6th. Website: DXconvention.org.

I am posting this to the 10-10 website on March 1st.

Countries Award: There were two Basic Countries Awards and seven upgrades issued to four members this past quarter. All are taking advantage of the NO QSL cards required for awards. When you apply for any 10-10 award, you must use a form at the 10-10 website or use software that prints the forms for emailing.

Propagation: Propagation this year was better than during the first peak of the cycle in November 2011 when the monthly average flux reached 153.5. The MoAvg flux in May 2013 reached 131.4, in November 2013 it was 148.3. The MoAvg peak in January was 157.4 and then in February the MoAvg reached 169.6 the highest in 2014 so far. The peak day was February 5th with a reading of 193.5.

I expect the daily solar flux to range from 135-200 this next

quarter. The sun had 17 flares one day to shoot the flux up to 193 and on November 14, 2013, there were 22 flares.

On March 1st the solar flux was 165, the A index was 7 and K index 2. Look for the best conditions: March 4-6th, April 1-4th & 27-30th, May 25-28th, June 21-24th. Over the next three months, for USA stations, expect a 20-40% chance of DX in the mornings to Europe or Africa and a 30% chance into Asia, South America or the Pacific in the late afternoon. To see what DX paths are open, listen for the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200).

Oregon Trail Chapter Announcement

Qualification for Nomination to be an Officer or Director of 10-10

In accord with the bylaws, no member of 10-10 may qualify for nomination to be an Officer or Director of 10-10 unless he or she has been a full member for more than four (4) years immediately preceding his/her Nomination, and that he/she can show that their membership will remain current during the period of the office they are seeking. The Nominating Committee or Petition for Candidacy are the only methods to be used by members who wish to be nominated.

Selection by the Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee is charged with the task of selecting from those who indicate a desire or willingness to serve as an Officer or Director and to form a slate of candidates who the committee believes represent the best qualified candidates from information submitted to the Committee.

Petition for Candidacy

Members and nominees not selected by the nominating committee may petition for candidacy. Such petitions shall be signed by 50 full members and submitted to the Secretary by July 1, 2014.

Biographical Sketch

All Candidates, whether selected by the Nominating Committee or by Petition, must submit a biographical information form and biographical sketch. The Nominating Committee will use this information in the process of selecting a slate of Candidates. Those who petition for nomination must submit a biographical information form to be provided by and returned to the Secretary. This biographical outline, not to exceed 200 words of narrative, shall be printed in the July 2014 issue of the 10-10 News.

Notification of Potential Nominees

The chair of the Nominating Committee shall notify members selected by the Nominating Committee to be candidates in writing. The chair of the Nominating Committee shall also notify, in writing on or before June 1, 2014, members who are not selected by the nominating committee, and inform them of the proper method of placing their names in nomination by petition.

How I contest Allen Brier N5XZ #4530

I love contesting! If you have worked me in a 10-10 contest/QSO Party, you know that. I also love collecting 10-10 numbers for BAR awards. The two go together extremely well. And I love to give out 10-10 numbers to prospective new members. The 10-10 contests/QSO Parties are unique in that they are primarily there to promote 10 meter activity and to exchange 10-10 numbers. Operators approach the contests in different ways: some like to make casual contacts and rag chew a little, others (like me) like the thrill of pile-ups and competition and work as hard and as long as possible to WIN! So far, I have had fairly good luck in that department. Up to and including the last Summer QSO Party, I've won 12 times out of 25 entries going back to 1985 as WB5BIR. So I was asked to write an article on how I contest. Preparation:

Weeks before the contest, I prepare everything I can think of, including the station, other potential participants and myself. I make sure that the station is in good shape, i.e. all hardware (radio, antenna, amplifier, etc.) is in good working order, software is up to date, and I try to be well rested. Don't start making major changes to your station just before the contest, not a good time. I also let as many other hams know about the contest, by sending out emails, notices on reflectors, club newsletters, in QSOs, face-to-face, etc., to generate more activity. Every QSO counts! Software:

I strongly recommend the use of logging software specifically designed for 10-10 contests. General purpose logging programs can be used, but just will not work as well as the dedicated contest loggers. There are a number of excellent programs out there designed just for that: K4HAV's Win 10-10 http://hds.net/win1010.htm , N1MM www.n1mm.com , N3FJP www.n3jfp.com , GenLog, 10-X Logger (and more) are all designed to speed things up during the contest. First of all, they keep track of the time of each contact automatically, and can keep track of your frequency if you have your radio linked up via a CAT cable, or some other means. Second, they keep track of your score and make sure you don't work a station more than once or "Dupe" them. The will all generate an adif or Cabrillo file after the contest, which can easily and quickly be uploaded to the KJ4IZW contest scorer website http://hamclubs.info/scorer or a printout and in some cases, generate cover pages and dupe sheets to send to the QSO party manager. Some loggers (Win 10-10 and N1MM) provide callsign databases with additional information that will autofill your entry window to save even more time. Be sure to check them against the exchange given by the other operator...there can be errors in those databases!

Now about station hardware: By far, the most important piece of hardware in your station is your antenna. No two ways about it. In almost every case, the bigger and higher your antenna is the better results you will get. Your transmit signal will be stronger PLUS you will hear more. I have heard a thousand times from those with compromise antennas: "I can work every station I can hear!". Well, I can tell you that with a smaller antenna, you just cannot hear as much. I strongly urge you to consider the antenna and tower high in the station budget. I was told once that a good rule of thumb is to spend 1/3 of your station budget on the antenna, 1/3 on the tower and 1/3 on the station hardware itself. (That is assuming all new hardware...I got a used motorized crank-up tower at a good price, so my tower ratio is a bit less.)

Second on the list of hardware is the radio. The better radio you have, the more you will hear, and you will be better able to handle interference. Very important. Some of the new radios even have built-in memory keyers, voice keyers, etc. which are extremely important during a contest to save your hand or voice from fatigue. And having a pan adapter is a great tool to see where the band activity is.

Third is the computer/software, which I discussed earlier. Having a UPS on your computer is a big plus in case there is a power blip, which I get a lot around here.

Fourth is an amplifier. With an amplifier, you can go from always answering others calling CQ (also call Search & Pounce) to calling CQ Contest (running). You can almost always work more stations faster by calling CQ and letting others come to you. Some don't like to run high power, and even prefer QRP. That's fine, and legitimate, but if you want to score high, an amplifier is a big plus. As I mentioned before, however, the antenna is more important that the amplifier in a winning contest station.

The next thing to consider is having a comfortable chair, because hopefully, you will be maximizing your "BIC" or "Butt is Chair" time. The more time you can spend in front of the radio, the more contacts you're gonna make, period.

Having a good headset is high on the list of important hardware. I use a Yamaha CM500 with a mike boom, and a foot switch to key the rig. That way I can keep all fingers on the keyboard

Also, diet and sleep time are very important. Get plenty of sleep before and during the contest, and don't eat heavy or spicy foods. Keep it light with vegetables, fruit and/or energy bars. Drink plenty of water but not so much that you need to hit the head too often. I keep bottled water close at hand at all times and have my food ready well before the contest. Finger food or sandwiches are great so you don't have to handle utensils.

My station consists of an Elecraft K3 with the P3 Panadapter, and Alpha 78 Amplifier and at 4-el SteppIR Yagi up 75 feet. I run N1MM contesting software.

Now, it's time to talk about my strategy in 10-10 contesting.

Those of you who have worked me in a contest know that I am quite serious trying to work stations as quickly as possible, especially when there are multiple stations calling me. However, I will take time to chat if someone asked me a question or needs additional information about 10-10, the contest and what we are doing. Especially, when someone is collecting for their own number, I try to help as much as possible.

About 30 to 60 minutes before the contest, I will try to establish a frequency by calling CQ 10-10 and ask all those I work to come back after 0000Z to work me. Some of my most productive rates have been right at the beginning of the contest. At the beginning and during the contest, I try to find a clear frequency, normally between 28.375 and 28.450 and start calling CQ. I try to stay on that frequency as long as possible without moving and continue to let station come to me. I have had contests where I have parked on one frequency from 7am to 7pm working stations non-stop! But most of the time, the frequency is good for a few hours, then I move a ways if I think that spot is "used up". When things get slow, I will move up and down the band doing "Searching and Pouncing" as required. For me, running high rates, making contacts and just "blowin' and goin" is fun for me. Others like to operate in a more relaxed mode, but that's just not me.

The key to contesting is the desire and the will to WIN, staying in your chair (BIC) and ignoring everything else, not only your aching back, hunger pains or taking a break when the conditions are good and the rates are high, but also the boredom or sleepiness when the rate is low. Sunday afternoon can be really boring!

Before and during the contest I keep track of propagation by checking the SSN and Flux levels, and constantly refer to VOACAP www.voacap.com/coverage.html and DX Maps http://www.dxmaps.com/spots for predicted and real-time propagation data.

I hope I have provided some food for thought and "tips and tricks" for y'all to use in the next contest. I plan to be there, as usual and ride the peak of the sunspot cycle propagation. I have a goal of beating my own personal score of 1804 QSOs which I did back in 1990 and to beat the highest score I could find on record, when N7TT made 2003 QSOs in 1991. I know it will be tough, but that's what I aim for every 6 months.

Contest Station from yesteryear still on the air!

In the summer of 1971 I traveled via bus to the FCC field office in Dallas, Texas to take my general class license test. After getting my license WB5AIA in the mail finally I purchased an old Johnson Valiant Transmitter so I had could operate on Phone. Trouble was, the ONLY place there was much AM operation going on was ten meters. So I put up a tri-bander and was on the air! It wasn't long before I had a phone contact with Grace Dunlap K5MRU. She gave me a ten ten number of #218 and asked for mine. A ten ten number? What was that? Well soon I had my own number, #2019! I spent a year operating that old Valiant up on Ten Meters, having a ball collecting numbers at the same time. The next summer I earned enough money to buy a Hallicrafters HT-37 to pair up with my Drake 2B and I was off to the races on SSB.

Jump forward to 1990. After a short hiatus from Amateur Radio, I decided to get back on the air. Trouble was I had no equipment except for that same Drake 2B Receiver, having sold off everything else to pay for my son's birth. Imagine my surprise to find AM alive and well on 75 40 and 10 Meters!! I shortly purchased an old Johnson Ranger and was back on the air on AM. This started my "boatanchor" or "Vintage" radio craze.

There is something special about turning on vintage ham gear, seeing the dial lights illuminate the room along with the glow of vaccum tubes! They heat my shack up nicely in the winter! I buy and sell this gear, usually after keeping it and using it for a while. My current station, as seen in the accompanying photo, is a Johnson Ranger, lovingly restored, that drives a pair of 813's in a grounded grid homebrew amplifier. The Receiver is a National HRO of 1938 Vintage, along with a set of coils and matching speaker. Other vintage equipment comes and goes, but this station stays here. Though the HRO is somewhat deaf above 20 mhz (a common problem with pre-1960 gear), it still works on 29.0 just fine!

So, if you are bored with paper chasing and want to recapture some of the old time Amateur Radio fun, join the growing number of Amateurs and TenTen operators who are putting together vintage stations and getting on the air! Though the prices of these old radio's varies, they are higher today than 20 years ago. Demand sets prices for this vintage gear, as in all things. A certain amount of technical knowledge will be required. These old radios need lots of TLC. NEVER just plug one in and turn it on. Always bring it up slowly on a variac, as dried capacitors can cause catastrophic failures!

So, turn on those filaments and warm up a cold winter night, and enjoy some mighty fine AM audio through that vintage receiver with dual 6V6's for the audio output! See ya on the air! 

On the 10-10 Webpage is a tab for "Resources". Under that is a tab for "QSL Bureau". On the QSL Bureau page is a box that if you type in your callsign, it will tell you the number of cards and envelopes that are at the bureau.

With poor band conditions the past few years, QSL activity has been slim. With the current band improvements, I expect activity to pick up. With this improved activity, I recommend that you get 1 or 2 envelopes on file at the bureau.

Before sending QSLs to the bureau, it is a good idea to check to see if those hams have envelopes at the bureau. You can do this by using the box mentioned earlier in this article. If you send QSLs to hams without envelopes at the bureau, your QSLs will just sit at the bureau.

It should be noted that you do <u>not</u> have to be a current paid 10-10 member to use the QSL Bureau.

You can make QSOs on <u>any</u> band with other 10-10 members and use the bureau for your QSLs. Please direct all questions/comments to the QSL Bureau Manager, Terry Webb, at n0twterry@yahoo.com.

TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

5.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Spirit of 76 and Open Season QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules. The Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers are year long contact events.

5.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as check logs. Check logs are used to validate (check) other logs, but do not qualify the sender for any awards.

5.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently nine QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprit of 76 - 7 day, 6 mode event centering around 4 July each year 0001 UTC Monday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10). 0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the third full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the second full weekend in November.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

5.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP, Echolink, or any other similar type of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM). The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter band. NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band.

5.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrants may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications: *INDIVIDUAL*: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or

10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event. *CLUB*: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority and must have an active 10-10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10

10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

MOBILE: A mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. Use of a base station antenna, amplifier or commercial power is not permitted. Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation. Safety is paramount while operating mobile. If you are unable to park near multiple county lines due to safety issues (i.e. on a bridge, on a freeway, etc.), please move to the closest area which would provide the best operating conditions and still be able to give out multiple counties. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties. In addition to the normal log information provided the County Worked from and County worked must also be included. Mobile stations will receive awards within their own category and will not be included in the individual sections or Top Ten in the World. Mobile entries will only be accepted for Winter & Summer Phone and 10-10 Sprint QSO Parties.

5.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

5.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

5.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a check log. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode except during certain specialty events.

5.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

5.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a

check log. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. All logs may be sent via Email. Logs (if cabrillo, adif, or text) may also be uploaded at www.hamclubs.info/scorer/. Please no .Q95 files.

5.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points with 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value. A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

5.2.9.2 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15

calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

5.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top individual scorer in each Us Call Area (W0-W9), each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB, MOBILE and CHAPTER. Electronic certificates will be sent to the 2nd and 3rd place scorers in these categories.

5.2.11 ANNIVERSARY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS EVENTS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC. In the Anniversary event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have the anniversary year contained in their membership number. Example: 2010 is the 48th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "48" in their membership number (i.e., 72048, 69485, 64854, 48126, 00487) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions: During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above. In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is permitted, regardless of mode of contact. In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.). All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order. These events are for Individual entries as described in section 5.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January

15th of the year following both the Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers events. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

5.2.12 SPIRIT OF 76 (7 Days, 6 Modes) QSO PARTY

This event will run for 7 days and be around July 4th of each year. Make as many contacts as you can during the week using 6 modes. The modes that will be used are as follows as well as the suggested frequencies to monitor:

- 1. USB (28.345) 2. RTTY (28.086) 3. CW (28.050)
- 4. FM (29.600) 5. PSK (28.120) 6. AM (29.000)

Scoring will be as normal for QSO Parties, 2 points for members and 1 point for non-members. Dupes will be allowed once for each mode. It will be possible to work the same call 6 times in each of the various modes for a maximum total of 12 points per call. All other normal rules apply. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

5.2.13 10-10 SPRINT (October 10) QSO PARTY

An award will be issued for working all 10 USA Call Districts.

5.2.14 FOR MORE INFORMATION

Current information about 10-10 and upcoming 10-10 QSO Parties and events are always available on the 10-10 web site. Cover sheets, logging forms and dupe sheets are also available for downloading or printing at http://www.ten-ten.org. Any unanswered questions regarding the QSO Party rules may be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). The contact form and membership application is provided on the page that follows.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more year's full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 of the page that follows.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

To become a member either fill out the form on the following page and mail to the Data Manager at the indicated address or go online to the 10-10 web page, www.ten-ten.org and follow the links from 'membership' to 'application' and select membership category.

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. Dues are the same as the Primary member. No family or life memberships are available. Clubs have all the same rights and privileges as primary members except the right to vote in elections.

Electronic Membership

Electronic Membership is available to anyone who qualifies for any of the types of membership listed previously. Electronic membership means that all communications, including the 10-10 NEWS, from 10-10 to the qualifying member will be conducted via email distribution. The exception to this policy is when a member qualifies for a certificate from either one of the various QSO Parties or from one of the Awards programs.
