



After reviewing the past two Silent Key reports from Ruth, N0KDB (48715) for the NEWS it's evident we're losing members at a rapid pace. The number of 10-10 members declined by nearly 300 in just the previous two quarters. That figure doesn't add in the 90 SKs from this issue so it isn't something we should be dismissing lightly. It should be especially disconcerting to those of you who collect 10-10 numbers for various awards and chapter upgrades. It doesn't take a math whiz to figure out the fewer active 10-10 numbers there are means it will be harder to accumulate 10-10 numbers for those awards you're chasing. Without an influx of new members to fill in for the now departed SK members it will be difficult, if not impossible, to achieve these awards.

So how do we replace the 10-10 numbers no longer available to us to work? Dare I suggest we should try to recruit *new* members? Not just to the 10-10 organization but to the hobby as well. I've been around hot rods and old cars all my life and recently I saw an ad in the back of one of the car magazines I read. The ad is about the same size as the 10-10 ad in the back of QST. The ad has a picture of a man holding a young boy's hand and they are walking towards a car show. The text of the ad reads: "Take a kid to a car show". I wonder why amateur radio operators don't share this sort of enthusiasm for our hobby. Seems the term 'Elmer' is being used less and less these days which is a poor reflection on amateur radio.

Surely *someone* in the past has helped you in your pursuit of our hobby. Passing your tests? Chasing DX? How to build antennas that work? How about that new digital mode that someone helped you learn? It might be a bold statement on my part but I seriously doubt there's one of us who haven't had at least one person help us, teach us, show us something we needed help with in our hobby. Why the aversion to help someone else out in return? It doesn't cost anything to help another ham, or prospective ham, with the exception of a little of your time. Think back to the time someone spent teaching you about the hobby. Do you owe another ham something just because someone helped you learn or do something? No, you don't owe them anything but think back about where you would be if someone hadn't have stepped up and spent some time with you. It's entirely feasible you might not still be in the hobby had it not been for and Elmer or two in your past.

My wife, N3DCj (74876) suggested an award for Elmers since everyone wants to chase wallpaper. Sound silly? Tell that to the ARRL as they already have an Elmer award: http://www.arrl.org/elmer-award. If it will encourage people to be more proactive towards recruiting members into the hobby and 10-10 International then I'll even design it.

From The President

As in the past, I waited until after the Dayton Hamvention to compose this article. That event tends to give one a new perspective on Amateur Radio. At this event, you will find the newest radios, info on the most popular operating modes, or insight into future of the hobby itself. I was able to handle a new 5 watt handi talkie that operates 6 to 40 meters, this unit is not much larger that the old IC2AT. I was able to discuss the operation of softwaredefined radios used with tablets and cell phones with the designers of the software and interfaces. No matter what your avenue of interest, if it can be found Dayton is the place to look. This year the event was outstanding for Ten-Ten. We had K1IEQ Ken Harmon #31363, KB3GWX Ann Harmon #74600, K5FBS Cliff Taylor #48461, and KR7RK Keith Schlottman #63324 staffing the booth. Having this many besides myself allows time for other staffers to roam. The logbook sign in rate on Friday was intense, if it that had continued Saturday we would have had a record showing.

Of course, one of my tasks was to procure door prizes for the Convention. This at times is a bit painful if the dealers are having poor results at the show. This year was the exception all the dealers appeared to be having good response. As a result, I have almost as many door prizes as we have registered attendees at this time. This brings up a painful situation. Since 2005, the attendance at the Conventions has been less that desirable. This topic will be on the agenda at the board meeting in Hartford. It has never been the purpose of the event to produce profit for Ten Ten, but it is of no benefit to hold a convention that less than 1 percent of the current members attend. On the other hand there were over 200 members at Dayton that passed by the booth and I am sure there were that many more that never stopped by. Maybe we need to go back to the early convention methods, instead of a stand-alone event. As always, the Board and I are open to your input.

As all are aware, the organization depends on a volunteer work force. Some positions are a bit more active than others are, but all are critical. There are those that serve a Net Control stations, these are the source of many new members. When we have a vacancy in the net control area, it places a burden on others because no matter what the Nets should be called. These nets define the purpose of Ten Ten. Preserving ten meters for Amateur Radio use, through activity. Currently we do have one net without an assigned Net Control, contact N6OPR #45715 if you can act in this position. Volunteers also act as our Awards Managers and from infrequently we have needs in that area as well. We have a new 1000 and up Bars Award Manager - Marilyn Webb, KK4HH #76400. Our previous Manager N3TGB #68129 has served in that position for several years. Doris has served as a Director and Net Control in the past and now desires to travel a bit more. Another are that requires volunteers are our many committees. Without a strong volunteer force, we could not function. If you wish to be on the Volunteer List, please contact me.

In the late 80's and early 90's we began embracing a technology that would forever change every aspect of life. What began with as a simple tool has gone full circle to consume every waking moment for some. The personal computer now tends to be a required apparatus, but the technology based on it has effected both Ten Ten and Amateur Radio. One example is our election of officers. In the first election, there was a full slate of candidates, at that time there were 10 directors and we had 26 members qualified to run. Ballots sent by postal mail and nearly 4800 returned for counting. This trend continued until 2002 when 2177 returned for the count. The in 2004 6500 went out and 355 returned, this downward trend has continued and in the recent election, only 174 ballots made the count. What happened? Every eligible member including family members received the News containing the ballot. This did increase the cost of that issue. There was only one Directors office contested. Maybe it is time for an electronic election with the mail in option. The mechanics were in place, but the idea did not meet positive response. Maybe it is time to change attitudes allowing for forward progress instead of a maintenance posture. Maybe the whole election process needs to be changed, please contact one of the Net Officials if you have input on this matter.

This problem has migrated into all aspects of Amateur Radio. The Ten Ten Awards Programs have also fallen victim. With the removal of the QSL Card

requirement, it was felt that there would be increased activity on the Awards front. That is not the case. I recently applied for an award that began in 2000. To my surprise, I received certificate number 97.

I normally do not spend much time in phone portion of the band. I do listen everyday for the Official Nets, DX Nets, hold a Chapter Net every Saturday and do participate in the Phone QSO Party. I check the beacons often and spend most of my time on PSK, RTTY and CW. Contacts are there for the taking, but not many members appear there. At the very same time at the other end of the shack, I see members posting on the mailing list or Facebook that live in areas that I am working on PSK? What am I missing? It was bad enough to have cell phones make the use of repeaters and handi talkies a rare occurrence, but to have Facebook and Twitter replace HF seems to be on the horizon. The only bright side is that young people are beginning to loose interest in technology that does not present a challenge. This past week alone I have worked several Amateurs under the age of 20 on CW and the cool part is they are using paddles and keys without any computer assistance. This has created a new interest in that portion of the band. Look for me 28.045 - 065 and I will use your speed. Otherwise, check 28.120 on PSK. I will look for you on the low end of the band.



CHAPTER COORDINATOR'S COLUMN by Cliff Taylor, K5FBS, 10X 48461

General Comments:

- 1) If your chapter is planning a special sometime during the months of October, November. or December, please let me know and I will announce it in the next newsletter.
- 2) During the months of April, May, and June, the following chapters have sent in either quarterly reports or chapter updates and are alive and well: Alii, Arizona Desert, Bauxite, Chesapeake Bay, Branding Iron I, Branding Iron II, Colorado Centennial/Colorado Frontier Gang/Centurion/Golden Aspen, Cowtown, Gold City, Lonestar. Maine-iacs, New Mexico Mud Ducks, Oklahoma Route 66, Oregon Trail, Portland 500, Santa Fe Trail and Trail Driver. Many thanks to the reporting officials of these chapters for keeping us up-to-date.
- 3) Because the following chapters have failed to fulfill the requirements for affiliation, they have been designated non-affiliated: Crazy Eights, and Lilac City,
- 4) Again I would like to bring the following to your attention. If you are not aware of it, the requirement for a chapter to be localized was dropped some time ago. DX News

The Summer has brought a small change of propagation that has helped us have a few stateside contacts as well as propagation into South America from Texas. The Digital and CW weekend contests produced a few contacts on Ten that went into my log and helped me get a couple of certificates from both of these QSO parties. We had an increase in the solar flux this quarter but more flux did not help with more DX getting into the log. You will see by the listing on the next pages, that the number of people going places later this year is greatly reduced. As for cycle 24, it has made some progress and a new peak is possible in late 2013, but I see fewer state side and DX contacts in your log in 2013 as compared to last year.

Just as I am posting this DX article, the Open Season QSO Party using PSK started on June 1st for two days. Please get on PSK and make a few contacts as your points are helpful plus it will help others get on the band. Last year 10-10 had more people participating in this QSO Party than in past years so please make some contacts!

Coming in July, 10-10 has a unique QSO Party called the Spirit of 76 which lasts for seven days from July 1-7th. The most important rule to remember, you want to talk with others stations on six different modes: AM, FM, CW, SSB, PSK and RTTY. Members are two points, others one point and you can make six different contacts with the same person for a clean sweep. Remember it's a QSO party not a contest so take your time and enjoy the band!

Good News for 10-10 DX chasers. A group of YL ops is going to Kangerlussuaq Greenland in mid August. Only one operator Kay WA0WOF #23802 is a 10-10 member. There has been no 10-10 activity for 20 years from OX as the only local member has been off the air after his radio broke. More info on the next page.

I continue to use the ARRL LoTW QSL service as it saves me a lot of postage. Your computer logging program will produce a LoTW file for uploading your log to the LoTW server. I presently have about a hundred pending confirmations that will add to my score. A recent change to the TQSL program that you use to upload your data now has more features and functions, so try it soon.

I was able to work Ken Z81Z/K4ZW #18573 for a new 10-10 country from the Rep. of South Sudan on March 6th. Ken will be in Ethiopia ET in June 8th at the club station ET3AA on a new work assignment but there has been no word if he will return to S. Sudan. Since the war between Eritrea (E3) and

Ethiopia ended in 2000, this region is now safer for ham radio activity. Both Eritrea and Ethiopia have had 10-10 activity in past years, so good luck.

I am posting this to the 10-10 website on June 1st, as I start my twenty-third year being your DX Editor so enjoy the DX info that follows. This past quarter has been real slow for DX and state-side contacts have been down, even with the increase in the solar flux this past quarter.

Countries Award: There were six upgrades and one Basic award issued to four members this past quarter. All are taking advantage of the NO QSL cards required for awards. When you apply for any 10-10 award, you need to use an approved form at the 10-10 website or use software that prints the forms for emailing.

8P Barbados. Jeff VA3QSL/8P9HI #73406, was on from April 6-13th. He used a IC-7000 into a dipole.

Dean 8P6SH/8P2K #45815, was on during the CQ WPX contest March 30th. QSL via KU9C.

C6 Bahama Islands. Paul K1VK #9756, was in the ARRL IDX SSB Contest March 2-3rd as C6ANM. Also, Chuck KG9N/C6A #17038, was on from the Bahamas from March 28th to April 4th including the CW WPX SSB contest. LoTW.

CT Madeira Island. Falk DK7YY/CT9 #23467, was on from April 8-11th.

ET Ethiopia. Karl K4YT/ET3AA #37347, is back in Ethiopia starting May 19th for an unknown length of time.

E6 Niue. Graeme VK4FI/E6SG #37824, was on Niue between March 22-29th.

FO French Polynesia. Al KZ3AB #63030, was in Tahiti, Bora Bora, Raiatea and Tahaa from May 3-13th using call sign FO/ KZ3AB from his hotel which counts for DXCC.

FS St. Martin. Andy DK5ON #54260, was on the French & Dutch sides of the island from March 10-29 $^{\rm th}$.

G England. Peter G0NQZ #72724 was operating as GX4BJC/A in East Sussex during May 2013.

HR Honduras. Gerard F2JD/HR5 #63443, was back in Honduras from February 26th for three months.

J7 Dominica. Richard KK4GV/J79GV #39793, was active from March 9-17th using only SSB. LoTW.

Propagation: Propagation during the Spring of 2013 has been better than 2012 due to an increase in the number of solar flares this year. The highest flux in 2012 was in July at about 135. In May 2013 it got up to 160. I expect the daily solar flux to range from 105-150 this next quarter as cycle 24 continues. There still is a possibility that if the sun continues its solar flare-ups, that we could have one more peak this winter for cycle 24 like we had in cycle 23.

On June 1st the solar flux was 102, the A index was 9 and K index 4. Look for the best conditions: June 12-14th, July 9-12th, August 5-8th and Sept 1-3rd. Over the next three months, for USA stations, expect a 10-30% chance of DX in the mornings to Europe or Africa and a 15% chance into Asia, South America or the Pacific in the late afternoon. To see what DX paths are open, listen for the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200).





10M Vertical Antenna Images





10M Vertical Antenna by WB5CXC

After reading an article by N2UHC on a 10M vertical dipole I decided to build my own. The antenna in the article was made from electrical conduit. I had some problems with the electrical conduit as it was very hard to tune. I have built several of the Copper Cactus 2M antennas and have also been building EH antennas, so I decided to use similar building methods and material for my 10M vertical dipole (copper pipe and PVC pipe). I used 3/4" copper pipe for it's rigidity and the 1/2" copper pipe allows for adjustment. I began by modeling the antenna using EZNEC. I decided to mount the antenna close to the ground. This gives the antenna a low angle of radiation. You can notice that you have a decrease in the gain but I think the low angle of radiation will make up for the loss in gain.

Materials:

3/4" X 10' Copper Pipe Lowe's / Home Depot 1/2" X 10' Copper Pipe Lowe's / Home Depot 1 1/2" PVC Sch. 40 Pipe Lowe's / Home Depot 3/4" X 1/2" Copper Pipe Reducers Lowe's / Home Depot # 8 or #10 X 1/2" Sheet Metal Screw Lowe's / Home Depot SS Hose Clamps Lowe's / Home Depot With the price of copper, you might want to use alumunim tubing.

Start by cutting the 3/4" copper pipe in two 5' sections. On one of the section mark 1', 2', and 3'. At the marks drill a 3/8" hole through the tubing on one side. All the hole should be lined up. On the other section mark at 6" and 1' and drill 3/8" holes through the tubing on one side. These holes will be used for mounting the copper pipe to the PVC pipe.

The 2 reducers have to be modified. Using a hack saw cut a groove in the 1/2" end down to the 3/4" section. This will give the hose clamp room to compress the reducer and hold the 1/2" pipe. Now on the inside of each reducer you will find a little tit. This is used to stop the pipe at the correct location when inside of each reducer you will find a little tit. This is used to stop the pipe at the correct location when Solder the reducer onto the 3/4" pipe. On the section that has two holes, solder the reducer on the opposite end.

Cut the 2 - 3' section of the 1/2" copper pipe. This will be used for the ends of the antenna. Slide the 1/2" pipe into the reducers leaving about 2' exposed and secure using the hose clamps. Lay out the PVC pipe and the two sections of the antennas. The spacing between the two sections should be approximately 1". Drill a hole through the other side of the tubing where you have the 3/8" holes. This hole should be sized so the sheet metal screw will rotate freely. Now place the copper pipe and PVC pipe according to the drawing. The PVC should extend approximately 14" above the center of the dipole. Using a 1/8" drill bit drill through the hole in the copper pipe into the PVC. Fasten the copper pipe to the PVC pipe using the sheet metal screws. Now mount the coax to the antenna. The braid of the coax should be on the section closes to the ground. There are many ways to connect the coax to the antenna (using screws, soldering, etc.). Mount the antenna using the PVC pipe. Mounting solutions is up to you. The antenna may be tied down with non-conduction rope. This will give it more stability. After mounting the antenna, connect it to your rig and tune the short pieces (1/2") to obtain the best SWR. As can be seen from the SWR plot the 2:1 bandwidth is over 1 Mhz.

Anyone of us who have been in the hobby for an extended length of time will agree that the computer has truly revolutionized amateur radio. Indeed our radios are nothing more than computers with an antenna connection on the rear panel. The software available for amateur radio has made our hobby more enjoyable and more productive in terms of log keeping, award management, and so forth. Commercial software generally revolves around digital modes, log keeping, and utilities such as antenna modeling and more. The amateur radio freeware available is what drives the digital modes as well as many amateur radio related utilities. In this issue of the NEWS we will review some applications that 10-10 members have submitted to help others learn about their purpose and availability. None of these programs are commercial applications as 10-10 cannot promote commercial products because of our nonprofit status.



Todd, KC4TVZ #60783 sent in a note about several ham related programs which he uses at his QTH: Log4OM by IW3HMH, PSKExpress and TenXLogger by N7YG.

Log4OM

One of Todd's favorite features of Log4OM is the program's interaction with online logging services such as LoTW, eQSL, and others. Todd sent this with his recommendation of Log4OM, "What impresses me the most about Log4OM is it will automatically upload to eQSL dot cc, HRDlog dot net, and ClubLog dot org, instantaneously when the QSO entry is entered. Then with just a few mouse clicks, Log4OM will upload to ARRL LoTW."

PSKExpress

This software, unlike YGPSK is multi-mode and will allow you to use PSK, RTTY or MFSK at various speeds. The basic look and feel is similar to YGPSK so if you are experienced with YGPSK, this should be a snap. The README file is a PDF file and can be accessed from the Help menu at any time.

The logging function is also different from YGPSK. I am using a free version of SQL Lite, a really neat and powerfully database that does not require you to install a database server such as MySQI or SQL Server. I've also included the SQLite administrator software in case you want to tinker with the databases that are created.



TenXLogger

TenxLogger is a special purpose logging system designed specifically for the Ten-Ten International QSO parties that are held throughout the year. It is a small, lightweight and simple program that will log contacts, check for duplicate contacts based on the QSO party rules, automatically calculate points and score, and process a log for submission to the QSO party manager, and process a log for submission to the QSO party manager in addition to a dupe sheet.

Additionally, it will export an ADIF formatted file for importation into the users standard logging system, send a submission to eQSL or LOTW (Logbook of the World), and lookup a call sign using the Hamcall Remote server, FCCLookup, QRZ XML service, QRZ CD or the Buckmaster CD.


I have a desktop gadget on my main desktop which gives me real time solar data from N0NH. It is available at: http://www.hamqsl.com/solar.html

The first is a weather related utility from amateur radio software author Scott Davis, N3FJP of "Amateur Contact Log" fame. The second is a nifty utility called Great Circle Maps by Roger, SM3GSR.

WXWARN


WXWarn is easy to use free weather software that will monitor National Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts, etc., and alert you (audio and visually) as new ones are issued. Monitor the whole US, just your state, county or county list. You can also monitor and screen for specific alerts. Living in Florida here means we have our weather concerns and this utility allows me to maintain a watchful eye in case I need to fold my Zero Five vertical down onto the ground.

WXWarn will also display up to 12, real time weather graphics that you can configure for content and size! This software is designed to download and parse weather data published by the NWS. The program is free for non-commercial use and the download link is here: http://www.wxspots.com/wxwarn.htm

Great Circle Maps

The title itself is self-explanatory for this free program by Roger, SM3GSR. This isn't just another program that creates a world map based on your QTH. In the Telnet window you get the predicted SNR from spotter to the DX station as well as from your location to the DX. On the maps borders, coastlines, rivers, lakes can be added, text and lines can be partly transparent and in the color of your choice. The program saves its different settings in the configuration dialog and it allows you to plot squares from any text file with locators in it (like adif files). 10 METERS - USE IT OR LOSE IT

I wondered the other day how many folks realize why 10-10 exists. Is it to provide a place for chapters to call home? For people to chase wallpaper or awards? Swap 10-10 numbers? Work QSO Parties? How about *none of the above*? I'll bet a lot of members don't realize the 10-10 International Net was created to prevent what happened when the FCC took away 11 meters away from amateur radio because it wasn't being used enough.

In case you've never read them the 10-10 bylaws clearly lays out the 10-10 mission statement for us:

ARTICLE II - MISSION STATEMENT

Ten-Ten International Net, Inc. is an organization dedicated to assisting, encouraging, and promoting amateur radio activity on the 10 Meter amateur band, using all lawful modes of operation and embracing new technologies. Our aim is to assist in the growth of amateur radio around the world, to mentor new members, and enhance fellowship among radio amateurs.

Notice how the mission statement never mentions exchanging membership numbers? Nothing about participating in 10-10 QSO Parties. Nothing about joining and supporting 10-10 chapters. In one short statement the organization states our goals:

"dedicated to assisting, encouraging, and promoting amateur radio activity on the 10 Meter amateur band"

So what's with the "Use It Or Lose It" title to this article? Do you honestly think the band is safe from encroachment? It is if you're parked in the 28400 to 28500 window, but what about the other sections of the band? What about the low end where CW ops hang out? 28500 and up are available but vastly underused because everyone seems to prefer 28400. We really do have a huge chunk of the band available to us but the vast majority of 10-10 members seem to stay between 28300 to 28500. Unless they check into the daily net on 28800 but otherwise they tend to congregate below 28500.

FREEBANDERS

Many, if not most, of us have encountered encroachment by freebanders on several sections of the 10 meter band. These folks who are venturing onto 10 meters aren't all a bunch of good old boys with a "kicker" in their pickup truck. A lot of these folks are as serious about CBs as we are about our hobby. The cb'er some three blocks away from me is running an 8 element beam on what looks to be at least a 40 foot boom up 60 feet. Of course he is running an amp because he has blanked out the Cypress Chapter net on 28465 from his favorite operating spot of 26800 AM.

Here's a website that has more than just a few references to freebanders, "shooting skip" on 28Mhz and other remarks about using ham gear on CB radio: http://bit.ly/12PPqtG. Sad to say that some of the posters on that forum claim to be amateur radio operators but they never use use their call signs. A great many of us currently licensed weren't around when the FCC reassigned the 11 meter band from being an amateur radio and to the new "Citizens' Band". The Citizens' Band was "channelized" when it was assigned to Class D Citizens' Band radio. Why? Because hardly anyone was using the 11 meter band is why. All that room there and someone took notice of it and the rest as they say is history.

You know, 11 meters isn't the only band that freebanders use. Actually one of the most common HF freebands is on the 45 meter band using the frequency of 6.670 MHz LSB. Granted this is found mostly outside of North America but freebanding is freeebanding no matter the location of the station. Are there other freebanding frequencies in use which might encroach on amateur bands? Absolutely! There are and here they are (again mostly outside North America): 85 meter band: 3.450 – 3.495 MHz LSB. (calling channel is 3.475 LSB), 45 meter band: 6.600 – 6.700 MHz LSB. (calling frequency of 6.670 LSB), 22 meter band: Channels such as 12.105, 12.130, 12.160, and up to 12.256 MHz., 21 meter band: 13.630 – 13.995 MHz (calling frequency is 13.995 MHz USB).

There is also freebanding on what are called the *non-government frequencies* used by freebanders which are considered as "*safe*" areas. Coincidentally these "*safe*" areas are all around the 12, 11, and 10 meter bands: 25.010 – 25.070 MHz, 25.210 – 25.330 MHz, 26.175 – 26.480 MHz, 26.950 – 26.960 MHz, 27.410 – 27.540 MHz, 29.700 – 29.890 MHz, 29.910 – 30.000 MHz. In addition the previous frequencies, there exists comments online about freebanders operating USB on 17 meters around 18.030 MHz.

FREEBANDING ON VHF/UHF

The HF bands aren't the only places where freebanding takes place. We've all read about truckers, fishermen (fisher persons?), and even cab drivers using 2 meters. How about the 440MHz range? Here's an article on a racing web site that use VHF/UHF (mostly UHF) rigs on their racing machines to keep track of each other. Their justification for using these frequencies was that none of the rigs could reach any of the repeaters from the remote area where they were racing off road. Another justification for running unlicensed was because some of the area where the racing takes place is actually in Mexico and yet the racers are American. So I guess in their eyes it is okay to run unlicensed as long as they are away from repeaters and out of the jurisdiction of the FCC. (Link: http://bit.ly/10tlYHd)

This last item about freebanding, racing and amateur radio frequencies took place back in 2008 when a motorsports park requested the temporary use of several frequencies around 448 MHz. Their justification was that the frequencies would be used for *emergency, security, and maintenance* purposes. Never mind the possible interference that might have taken place had the FCC granted their request.

BACK TO USE IT OR LOSE IT

So what again does this have to do with 10-10 International and amateur radio? We lost the 11 meter band in 1958 and now folks look upon freebanding as if it's okay because everyone is doing it. Remember the 10-10 statement:

"dedicated to assisting, encouraging, and promoting amateur radio activity on the 10 Meter amateur band"

So those glued to one particular spot of the 10 meter band might try another part of the band to help 10-10 International fulfill our mission statement by using the *entire 10 meter band*. Ever wonder how the amateur community lost 11 meters? Most likely the FCC used something like *band loading assessments* where they study the band or frequency range in question to see how much it's getting used.

Scan across 10 meters sometime to see how much it is being utilized.

Why do some folks like to experiment with other modes when SSB is so much faster to operate? On SSB you only need a mike and your voice while all the other modes need some sort of extra radio gear of some sort. A keyer, computer interface, etc.

The orphan modes on 10 meters are more effective and more efficient than SSB even if they are somewhat slower. What good does it do to sit and monitor the phone sections of 10 meters listening to noise when you could be working others on one of the digital modes? I made a big

mistake during the last 10-10 Digital QSO Party when I suggested using JT65 to make contacts, a mistake I'll not make again. When I checked the PSK section of the band and found it dead I switched to JT65 and started making contacts. True, the mode is slow and difficult to work a legal 10-10 exchange but when faced with the prospect of *no contacts* it seemed to be something worth trying. Only two 10-10 members tried the mode, one was not a complete (legal) contact while the other one was.

Why was it a mistake to suggest JT65 for use during the Digital QSO Party? It was the remarks that began showing up after my first email to the list. One station wanted the folks working each other on JT65 to *switch* to PSK or RTTY despite the fact that those modes were unusable at the time. One poster stated the mode (actually the digital modes themselves) are a waste of time and spectrum. Yet another operator is waiting on digital modes to be included into a proprietary software package before they'll even




consider using digital modes. Another suggested digital modes are "for no-code hams". These are just the kind of comments that keep people away from 10-10 International instead of drawing them into the organization.

Maybe JT65 or JT9 isn't for you because it's so slow (and quite robust), but it does make use of the 10 meter band. Maybe CW isn't for you because your code skills aren't the greatest (I have yet to meet a CW op who would not QRS), but it does make use of the 10 meter band. PSK may be too slow for you (even though PSK125 is quite brisk), but it does make use of the 10 meter band. RTTY or any number of other modes may not be what you enjoy but they give our members a chance to use other parts of the 10 meter band. There's certainly nothing wrong with SSB contacts as long

as one doesn't stay glued to one particular section of the phone portion of 10 meters. If the goal of 10-10 International is to utilize the 10 meter band to its fullest then it's up to the membership to make sure to use as much of 10 meters as we can. Allowing freebanders an opportunity to find wide open stretches of frequencies on 10 meters is something we should all strive to prevent. This is true even if it means learning to use an new mode to do so.

Puppy Installation

Create your own digipup.



Please follow these instructions to create your own Puppy with the W1HKJ ham software suite:

Download the latest Puppy iso image from Puppy Linux (http://www.puppylinux.org). Burn your CD using the instructions given on the puppy site. Reboot the computer from the Live Puppy CD

Install the following "pet's" - if you are running Puppy you can simply click on the link and the "petget" program will install the program and all supporting files:

- 1. Required libraries pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/fldigi/fl libs.pet
- 2. fldigi pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/fldigi/fldigi-3.21.pet
- 3. flarq pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/fldigi/flarq-4.3.pet
- 4. flrig pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/flrig/flrig.pet
- 5. flmsg pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/flmsg/flmsg.pet
- 6. flwrap pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/flwrap/flwrap.pet
- 7. fllog pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/fllog/fllog.pet
- 8. flwkey pet: http://www.w1hkj.com/downloads/flwkey/flwkey.pet



The pet installer will add each executable to the menu system. You will find the entries on the "Network" or "Internet" menu heirarchy, depending on Puppy version you are using.

Open the Rox viewer in the Home directory (the home icon on the desktop). Click on "my-applications" and then "bin". You should find the new executable items in this directory, /root/my-applications/bin. You can assign a nice 48x48 png image to each of the executables.

open a 2nd instance of the Rox filer (click on the Home icon) in the 2nd Rox filer change directory to /usr/share/midi-icons this is the default directory that petget places the 48x48 images right click on one of the executables, fldigi for example select Set Icon... from the popup menu

drag the icon, fldigi48.png from the /usr/share/midi-icons directory and drop it on the Set icon dialog box where indicated repeat for the other programs.

The executable files in the ~/my-applications/bin directory should now be shown with the icon images that you selected.

If you want to create a desktop item for each of these you can do so with a very simple step

Drag the executable from the ~/my-applications/bin directory and drop it on the desktop. That creates a link complete with a nice icon image on the desktop that allows you to single click on it to execute the program.

XML files for fldigi rigCAT

Open the ~/my-applications directory in your Rox filer. Then click on the directory xmls (that was added when petget installed fldigi). Click on xmlarchives.html; SeaMonkey should open with the html file in view. Read and follow the instructions contained therein.

Hamlib shared libraries

Open the ~/my-applications directory in your Rox filer. Then click on the directory lib which was also added when petget installed fldigi. You should see 24 files that comprise the complete hamlib shared lib system. Do not remove or move any of these files unless you are uninstalling fldigi. You need them to be present even if you do not use the hamlib interface to your transceiver. You can see which shared libraries that fldigi depends on by opening a terminal window and cd'ing to ~/my-applications/bin. Then execute "Idd fldigi" and you will see that the petget system has placed the hamlib*so files in a location that is in the search path for shared libs.

Final Installation

When everything is working as you expect you can either save your changes to a file, back to the CD, or you might want to remaster the ISO image. All of these are available either from the Puppy Menu system or when you exit Puppy.

Are you wondering if you have QSLs and/or envelopes at the QSL Bureau?

On the 10-10 Webpage is a tab for "Resources". Under that is a tab for "QSL Bureau". On the QSL Bureau page is a box that if you type in your callsign, it will tell you the number of cards and envelopes that are at the bureau.

With poor band conditions the past few years, QSL activity has been slim. With the current band improvements, I expect activity to pick up. With this improved activity, I recommend that you get 1 or 2 envelopes on file at the bureau.

Before sending QSLs to the bureau, it is a good idea to check to see if those hams have envelopes at the bureau. You can do this by using the box mentioned earlier in this article. If you send QSLs to hams without envelopes at the bureau, your QSLs will just sit at the bureau.

It should be noted that you do <u>not</u> have to be a current paid 10-10 member to use the QSL Bureau.

You can make QSOs on <u>any</u> band with other 10-10 members and use the bureau for your QSLs.

Frank had just earned his 500-Bar and assumed that TEAT had to be TEE END of number collecting. So -- why not move up the band. But how to get others to do the same.



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TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

5.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Spirit of 76 and Open Season QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules. The Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers are year long contact events.

5.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as check logs. Check logs are used to validate (check) other logs, but do not qualify the sender for any awards.

5.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently nine QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprit of 76 - 7 day, 6 mode event centering around 4 July each year 0001 UTC Monday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10). 0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the third full weekend in October. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the second full weekend in November.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

5.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP, Echolink, or any other similar type of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM). The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter band. NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band.

5.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrants may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications: *INDIVIDUAL*: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or

10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event. **CLUB**: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by

their National Licensing Authority and must have an active 10-10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

MOBILE: A mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. Use of a base station antenna, amplifier or commercial power is not permitted. Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation. Safety is paramount while operating mobile. If you are unable to park near multiple county lines due to safety issues (i.e. on a bridge, on a freeway, etc.), please move to the closest area which would provide the best operating conditions and still be able to give out multiple counties. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties. In addition to the normal log information provided the County Worked from and County worked must also be included. Mobile stations will receive awards within their own category and will not be included in the individual sections or Top Ten in the World. Mobile entries will only be accepted for Winter & Summer Phone and 10-10 Sprint QSO Parties.

5.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

5.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

5.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a check log. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode except during certain specialty events.

5.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

5.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a

check log. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. All logs may be sent via Email. Please no .Q95 or .adif files.

5.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value. A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

5.2.9.2 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15

calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

5.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top individual scorer in each Us Call Area (W0-W9), each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB, MOBILE and CHAPTER. Electronic certificates will be sent to the 2nd and 3rd place scorers in these categories.

5.2.11 ANNIVERSARY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS EVENTS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC. In the Anniversary event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have the anniversary year contained in their membership number. Example: 2010 is the 48th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "48" in their membership number (i.e.,72048, 69485,64854, 48126, 00487) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions: During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above. In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is permitted, regardless of mode of contact. In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.). All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order. These events are for Individual entries as described in section 5.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following both the Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers events. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

5.2.12 SPIRIT OF 76 (7 Days, 6 Modes) QSO PARTY

This event will run for 7 days and be around July 4th of each year. Make as many contacts as you can during the week using 6 modes. The modes that will be used are as follows as well as the suggested frequencies to monitor:

- 1. USB (28.345) 2. RTTY (28.086) 3. CW (28.050)
- 4. FM (29.600) 5. PSK (28.120) 6. AM (29.000)

Scoring will be as normal for QSO Parties, 2 points for members and 1 point for non-members. Dupes will be allowed once for each mode. It will be possible to work the same call 6 times in each of the various modes for a maximum total of 12 points per call. All other normal rules apply. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

5.2.13 10-10 SPRINT (October 10) QSO PARTY

An award will be issued for working all 10 USA Call Districts.

5.2.14 FOR MORE INFORMATION

Current information about 10-10 and upcoming 10-10 QSO Parties and events are always available on the 10-10 web site. Cover sheets, logging forms and dupe sheets are also available for downloading or printing at http://www.ten-ten.org. Any unanswered questions regarding the QSO Party rules may be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). The contact form and membership application is provided on the page that follows.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more year's full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 of the page that follows.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

To become a member either fill out the form on the following page and mail to the Data Manager at the indicated address or go online to the 10-10 web page, www.ten-ten.org and follow the links from 'membership' to 'application' and select membership category.

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. Dues are the same as the Primary member. No family or life memberships are available. Clubs have all the same rights and privileges as primary members except the right to vote in elections.

Electronic Membership

Electronic Membership is available to anyone who qualifies for any of the types of membership listed previously. Electronic membership means that all communications, including the 10-10 NEWS, from 10-10 to the qualifying member will be conducted via email distribution. The exception to this policy is when a member qualifies for a certificate from either one of the various QSO Parties or from one of the Awards programs.

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
