



DX Is King

"DX is king" a friend told me when I first became an amateur radio operator and he was right, at least to me anyways. Some folks with a license don't care all that much for DX and never seem to get over the HT & repeater phase regardless of the class of license that they hold. There are many organizations, small and large, that are centered on the art and science of DXing. You say DXing isn't an art or a science? Then you've never chased one of the elusive "new" countries or DXpeditions on the bands. You can't DX without learning about band peculiarities, propagation, noise sources, and operator skills. Many a contact has been in the log here just by learning what the DX station is looking for from those calling them. Are they higher or lower than the online spots? Are they running up and down the band where they have been spotted? Then there's the knack of "out tuning" the others guys so the DX hears you and not the wall of noise aimed in their direction.

So what has this to do with 10-10 or 10 meters for that matter? DX on 10 meters is a challenge, sort of like fishing for those of you inclined to do so. Some local folks we have around here will throw out a single CQ and declare the band as dead because no one came back to them immediately. That's sort of like going fishing with one shiner or worm in your bait bucket and coming home because the fish weren't biting once your bait was gone. With nearly ten thousand digital contacts in the log I couldn't tell you how many times the Icom has keyed up calling CQ but it pays off. Working DX on 10 meters is both exciting and frustrating to those that have used the band for any length of time. I've seen opening on the digital modes occur across the pond for mere seconds and I have waited nearly two hours on an open band for a chance to work the Iditarod Chapter for a membership number back in 1979.

As for 10-10 and DX, they didn't name the organization 10-10 International Net just to have a really cool name for the net. The cover of this issue shows but a few of the DX members of 10-10 and I have dedicated the "Way Back Machine" to the various DX postings I was able to locate in the archives of the 10-10 NEWS. 10-10 is about using the 10 meter band and there just isn't anything more enjoyable than DXing on the 10 meter band whether the DX has a 10-10 number or not. As my friend told me in 1977, "DX is King".

From The President

UPPER LEVEL QRM

The Dayton Hamvention this year was a bit unusual. Commercial vendors were reporting about a thirty percent reduction in visitors from last year. However, the huge flea market seemed to be packed. It seems that perfect weather is not optimum for inside sales. The decision was that net officials only would staff the Ten-Ten booth. We had five in the booth and this is a bit crowded. Actually, it allowed freedom to visit forums. flea market and vendors without creating a shortage in the booth. It also gave the impression that we were in fact dedicated to promoting Ten-Ten totally at the leadership level. Staffing the booth was WA2SUH #407, KR7RK #63324, WA6POZ #21274, K6RDK # 65812 and I. Sunday KA6SPS #69700 sat in to assist allowing her OM, WA6POZ to attend a forum. Once again, thank you Linda for the assistance. We had 215 sign the log, which was an increase of one from 2011. On the down side, we only had 37 renewals, considerably less than 2011. It will be interesting to see the actual attendance figures for the event compared to the 22312 attending in 2011. On the positive side, we were able to generate over \$200 for the Scholarship Fund through sales of pins and patches at the table. The fiftieth anniversary pin was the big seller; it will be a collectible in the future.

One reason for the reduction in renewals may be the large increase in these during the month of April resulting from the new membership fee structure. I am not an accountant or statistician therefore this is just my guess. We have had 99 renewals on the shopping cart since 1 April and some of the statistics are surprising. Eighty four percent of our one-year renewals elected to stay with the traditional printed News, while on the 3-year incentive renewals fifty-nine percent choose the electronic delivery option. Receipts from the Dayton event continue this trend with seventy percent of the one-year renewals choosing the printed News and seventy-nine percent of the three-year incentive renewals selecting the electronic delivery option. One of our new electronic delivery options appears to be quite popular and that is the senior life electronic delivery membership. Some of this may be the result of the uneasy economy, upcoming presidential election, or band conditions. I do not think anyone can really be sure now.

Ten-Ten will have a presence at the Texas Ham-Com event the second weekend of June. N5MT, various chapter members from the Dallas/ Forth Worth area and I will staff the booth. Maybe we will have more input concerning the electronic delivery options and membership renewals after that event. This article will be in the hands of the Editor before that event.

Electronic distribution of newsletters publications was a hot topic at Dayton between many of the organizations in attendance. One publication has gone strictly electronic, but the support so far has not been up to expectations. They have actually lost membership and many feel that this was the cause. All the organizations agreed that the printed newsletter no matter what size is rapidly becoming a financial burden. The major issue is Postal Cost, but the cost of printing and material has increased as well. While the mailing cost is visible to the public the cost of printing is internal and sometime is difficult to explain. Cost of fuel, labor, and paper all contribute. Ten-Ten will continue to provide both postal and electronic delivery, but will encourage our membership to choose the electronic version. The electronic version is not limited to 32 pages and can contain full color content, neither of which is possible with our printed product.

It is once again election time for Ten-Ten. In this edition, you will find the bios of the perspective candidates as well as the ballot. Please copy this ballot and upon completion mail it to the teller before October 1 2012. I have always wanted to see members requesting nomination from the younger generations. Ten-Ten does need new and fresh input to stay abreast with the current and future Amateur community. We tend to operate in a continuous circle, unless new ideas and proposals become evident. Members that have been active for 20 years or more tend to have tunnel vision concerning modern technology as it develops.

This year the Board of Directors will meet in Atlanta Georgia. The location is at the Buckhead Marriott Courtyard on July 21. Visitors are always welcome and the session will begin at 8:30 AM. Please consider attending and as always, input from the visitors is encouraged.

The desire to succeed and the spirit of competition are common to the human psyche. When done in moderation these benefit all concerned. Like anything else in excess, they produce the opposite effect. It appears that ever so often one of our members or groups of members go overboard when Ten-Ten contacts are concerned. Twenty years ago long before internet was involved one could ignore this problem and it would go away. Current technology changes things and when there are negative comments recorded within the internet structure, they are visible forever. Some of the things that I have said and done over the past 31 years as a member are only available to my memory and that it seems is passing as time goes. Currently searching on ones call sign, name, or email address will normally provide data back to the 1996 period. Things recorded within the World Wide Web currently will be there as a permanent record until technology dictates otherwise. In the meantime, negative

input concerning the organization continues to demand concern on the part of the officials of Ten-Ten. Maybe some of you will recognize the following statement. "Ten-Ten International Net, Inc. is an organization dedicated to assisting, encouraging, and promoting amateur radio activity on the 10 Meter amateur band, using all lawful modes of operation and embracing new technologies. Our aim is to assist in the growth of amateur radio around the world, to mentor new members, and enhance fellowship among radio amateurs."

Maybe if we would work together as an organization to recruit new members on a daily basis and not depend on the 1800 UTC nets to accomplish growth we would see favorable comments published on the web. It is very hard for an organization to increase in numbers when membership is only possible by contacting current members, while some of that membership refuses to contact non-members. That is simply beyond anything I can understand.

What gives with cycle 24 actual conditions continue to fall short of the predictions. Many continue to monitor the chapter nets from Europe and hear nothing. Located in the south central region does not allow for much activity before 1400 UTC and currently all we are getting is some North South activity in the afternoon's and evenings. I continue to make calls on PSK throughout the day and hope for conditions to improve. Maybe by the time of this edition is in the mail I will regret making comment about a disappointing 10-meter band, hope so.

10-10 NEWS DIGITAL EDITION


The Digital edition of the 10-10 NEWS has an expanded format from that of the printed version with a few extras thrown in. For one we can now use an all color layout so that now all of the pictures that are sent in of chapter gatherings, hamfests, etc. can now be displayed in *full color*.

The limitations to the printed version tend to tie the hands of an editor when it comes to laying out a newsletter of this size. Naturally the ever increasing postage is a huge expense to the Ten-Ten organization which any of us that QSL with any regularity can attest to. The printing itself is a disadvantage because of the 32 page limit but that is the limit as it stands and it costs a pretty penny to print these newsletters. Of the 32 pages that are printed there are many that cannot be used for extra content. There are times when the leadership needs to insert special content such as the minutes for Board of Director's meetings, new memberships fees, election information and so forth.

One more limitation of the printed version of the NEWS is the listing of scores from the QSO Parties and the Digital Contest. This has been a huge headache to KZ3T who has gone way out of his way to provide accurate scoring while condensing it as much as possible. The QSO Party results being so large are actually a good "problem" to have being that there is more participation which means more logs. As this area grows it may mean moving the *full report* to the digital version and posting only the World and Call Area/DX winners in the printed version. NOTE: This is only a "*maybe*" so don't bombard the Board of Directors with flames about the issue.

One more benefit of the digital version is the new membership rate which is a big savings for Ten-Ten and the members alike. Ten-Ten saves in printing/postage costs and we get to enjoy a cheaper rate. When was the last time any radio organization ever offered you *lower* rates?

TenX DX News June 1, 2012

The fun of working DX is usually determined by how much the Sun excites the atmosphere and creates an opening where we can talk across the oceans. Well, for the past six months, occasions for talking to DX have been few and far between as there has not been a lot of DX to talk with on Ten. The band to be on has been fifteen meters as seen during the CQ WPX contest last weekend. Ten was open mostly to South America and Oceania with few Europeans heard. Until the solar flux gets a boost upwards, the old days of daily morning European openings are being missed.

I have been waiting to work the only active 10-10 member in Monaco for twenty plus years. Until the flux gets up to its peak level and that being during the winter months, I will not have a chance to talk with Monaco from here. Usually during the summer months in the USA, we look forward to the best DX paths to the east, south and southwest for DX, unless an unexpected path opens up late in the day.

I just turned off the radio after being on Ten since 2230 UTC with the beam pointed toward Europe calling CQ. I worked ten stations in the Portugal/Azores/Italy area and then an Australian called me off the back of the antenna at about 2330 UTC. The local time in Portugal was after midnight and he gave me a 59, he got a 53 from me. I was using the amp and my 4 el yagi at 75 feet. So the band was open to Europe giving us one of those unexpected path openings to the northeast at the end of the day as there is one hour of daylight remaining here. It would be nice to hear Europe in our morning times like the past cycles but when summer skip starts, it's usually a different path and no Europe. I have heard several days of Europe DX late in the day, so good luck to others

There are two articles in the June issue of the National Geographic magazine that are DX related. On the cover is a picture of the Sun with a flare in progress. There are great images from the Solar Dynamics satellites. There is also a story about Socotra Island, Africa, with some historical and cultural viewpoints. The recent 706T DXpedition was from the Socotra Island area in Africa. Visit your public library to find this June issue.

Countries Award: There were four upgrades and no basic award issued this past quarter. Everyone is taking advantage of the new rule for NO QSL cards required for awards. IF you apply for any award, you must use a form from the 10-10 website OR submit the application using software like Win1010 and include an ID cover sheet.

General 10-10 DX reported in the past quarter:

3V Tunisia. The Club station 3V8BB #70613, was on in the WPX SSB Contest but none of the ops were 10-10 members. Few ops know what 10-10 is about, so GL.

5H Tanzania. Nizar K0NM/5H3NM #75901, was on a working trip to his home country so his radio time was limited in late May. 6Y Jamaica. Allen N2KW #14114, was in Jamaica from March 5-23rd using call sign 6Y0A operated mostly CW.

7O Yemen. A rare DXpedition to Yemen started about May 1st and ended May 16th. 10-10 members were Dave K3LP #13394, Paul N6PSE #68859 and Andy UA3AB #23433. They logged 162,000 contacts in 16 days! Ed Note: It has been twelve years since 7O1YGF from Yemen was active and one of the ops was a 10-10 member.

A2 Botswana. Frosty K5LBU/A25CF #51322 and Joel N5JR, were on the air in Botswana from March 18th to 28th. They used a special call A25HQ in the WPX Contest.

A5A Bhutan. A rare DXpedition started on May 24th from Bhutan. Kazuhiko VR2KF/A52KF #69615, was the only 10-10 member. They have three stations on using CW, SSB and RTTY and I just worked them with call sign A5A on 15 CW. They will depart on June 6th. Propagation: Propagation in the Summer of 2012 has not been as good as in Nov-Dec 2011. The solar flux has been flat the past six months. The October 2011 record 180 solar flux has not been repeated in 2012. Expect the daily solar flux to range from 110-150 this next quarter as solar cycle 24 continues. NASA predicts the peak of the cycle to be in the winter of next year 2013.

On June 1st the solar flux was 117, the A index was 10 and K index 2. Look for the best conditions: June 5-9th, July 2-5th, July 29-31st, Aug 26-31st, and Sept 22-26th. Over the next three months, for USA stations, expect a 10-20% chance of DX in the mornings to Europe or Africa and a 25% chance into Asia, South America or the Pacific in the late afternoon. To see what DX paths are open, listen for the beacons from 28.175-28.300 (especially 28.200).

The location is Central Florida, in a rural area, closest town is 15 miles away. The property is a little over 5 acres and is pasture land with very few trees, just a few to shade the cows. I have a long wire that is used as my all band antenna. It stretches from my main tower toward the rear of the property and is supported by a 40 foot tower in the middle of the run and a 40 foot tower at the end, this wire is about 700 feet long. This antenna gets used very little. The main tower is a 200 foot Rohn 45 with A99 on top and additional A99 and Ringos spaced at different heights on the tower. The A99 on top is fed with 7/8" hardline. Until just recently the 10 meter beam was located on a Rohn 25 tower at 50 feet. It was a 6 element, 38 foot boom constructed by N0TW. It worked so well that I purchased a Maco M107C ten meter beam, which is 7 elements on a 40 foot boom. Lightning protection is a real issue in Florida, I had the Company that does the grounding for the Telephone Companies drive a main ground rod 70 feet and other various ground rods are all tied together to form a continuous bond around the house as well as all of the steel in the house is tied together. Copper plates are installed on the towers with Polyphasers on all feed lines. I have two Power Companies that have lines in front of my house, they have been very good to me in reducing noise. At the present time, I have a zero noise level, however keeping this level is a constant challange. The radio is an Icom 7600, tuner is an Ameritron ATR-30, with an Ameritron AL-82 amplifier, which I seldom have to use due to the antenna system and a Heil headset with mic. I had to replace the rotor when the new beam was installed, now using a Yaesu G-800DXA. When using the station in a digital mode, a SignalLink USB is used.

On the 10-10 Webpage is a tab for "Resources". Under that is a tab for "QSL Bureau". On the QSL Bureau page is a box that if you type in your callsign, it will tell you the number of cards and envelopes that are at the bureau.

Before sending QSLs to the bureau, it is a good idea to check to see if those hams have envelopes at the bureau. You can do this by using the box mentioned earlier in this article. If you send QSLs to hams without envelopes at the bureau, your QSLs will just sit at the bureau.

It should be noted that you do <u>not</u> have to be a current paid 10-10 member to use the QSL Bureau.

You can make QSOs on <u>any</u> band with other 10-10 members and use the bureau for your QSLs.

5.2 **10-10 QSO PARTIES**

new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed 10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10 here are for all general QSO parties. The Anniversary, Meet the Volunteers, Spirit of 76, Open Season and Mobile QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules.

5.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as check logs. Check logs are used to validate (check) other logs, but do not qualify the sender for any awards.

5.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently ten QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Mobile - Held on the 3rd Saturday in March.

0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprit of 76 - 7 day, 6 mode event centering around 4 July each year

0001 UTC Monday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10).

0001 UTC through 2359 UTC.

Fall CW - held on the third full weekend in October.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

Fall Digital - held on the second full weekend in November.

0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

FREQUENCY AND MODES 5.2.3

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP, Echolink, or any other similar type of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter 5.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM). The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter band. NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band.

5.2.4 **ENTRY CLASSIFICATION**

Entrants may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications: OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid. call signs and 10-10 numbers.

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or

10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event.

CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by 10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, their National Licensing Authority and must have an active 10number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

EXCHANGE 5.2.6

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

QSO POINTS 5.2.7

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a check log. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode except during certain specialty events.

5.2.8 **CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT**

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

QSO PARTY ENTRIES 5.2.9

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to insure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a check log. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. All logs may be sent via Email. Please no .Q95 or .adif files.

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value. A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs INDIVIDUAL: Includes single station operators and can also include exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in

Mobile applies to car, truck, RV. motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. If in doubt, contact the QSO Party Manager. A station operating mobile must be a true mobile. Sitting in the driveway and using the base station antenna or amplifier, or using commercial power is not permitted. RV generators are permitted only if the generator is used while in

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name, date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). The contact form and membership application is provided on the page that follows.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more year's full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 of the page that follows.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

To become a member either fill out the form on the following page and mail to the Data Manager at the indicated address or go online to the 10-10 web page, www.ten-ten.org and follow the links from 'membership' to 'application' and select membership category.

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

Senior life membership is available to anyone who is currently 65 years of age or older. Payment can be made as one lump sum or within a one year period. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Family Life Membership is no longer available

Club Membership

Club membership is available to any Amateur Radio Organization which holds a valid Amateur Radio License. Application must be made by the club trustee. Dues are the same as the Primary member. No family or life memberships are available. Clubs have all the same rights and privileges as primary members except the right to vote in elections.

Electronic Membership

Electronic Membership is available to anyone who qualifies for any of the types of membership listed previously. Electronic membership means that all communications, including the 10-10 NEWS, from 10-10 to the qualifying member will be conducted via email distribution. The exception to this policy is when a member qualifies for a certificate from either one of the various QSO Parties or from one of the Awards programs.


