

I am sure you are all aware of how difficult it is to make a contact on 10 meters these days. In the last three months, I think I have only been able to hear a daily 10-10 net three times. These propagation conditions are very discouraging to say the least.

I did some research and looked up the number of logs that were submitted for the annual ARRL 10-Meter contest. A record number of logs were submitted for the 2014 contest: 5488 logs. In 2015, only 1049 logs made it to the ARRL. The QST article on the 2016 contest didn't even mention the number of logs submitted. I am guessing it wasn't a very big number.

Just keep calling and look for those openings that can and will occur. There is the 10-10 Fall CW (Oct 21-22) and Digital (Nov 11 -12) contests to try and make contact. And don't forget ARRL's 10-Meter contest (Dec 9 – 10). As Harry, K3HS, pointed out in his letter to me (See Letter to the Editor in this issue), "You Gotta Make Calls if Ya Wanta Get Results."

Hang in there and keep calling. I hope to hear you on a 10-10 net or catch you working one of the 10-Meter contests.

From the President

A lot has happened to my life in the past 3 months and not very much of it concerns ham radio. I have recently remarried and am now getting used to having a partner once again. Her name was Susan Dioquino and she is now Susan Webb. Not yet a ham but we are working on it. She is quite fascinated with ham radio but it is like a new language for her — still has a lot to learn about the hobby.

I have received a suggestion from one of our members to revise the rules governing our QSO Parties. Since this item involves our members, I think we should have some discussion from interested members regarding the proposed changes. The following changes are proposed:

QSO Party Proposed Rule Changes

- 1. Establish Low Power as a classification for those stations running 200 watts or less. This will establish QRP, Low Power, and High Power as entry classifications for power levels. This will establish a distinction between stations running low power versus high power. Right now, there is no distinction in power levels between low and high power and this is a definite disadvantage to those stations running 200 watts or less.
- 2. Change the award structure from CALL AREAS to ARRL Divisions. This will increase the number of awards from 10 to 15. This will encourage the Northwest and Midwest areas to submit logs.

I felt this topic should be openly discussed by our members rather than giving it to the Board of Directors for discussion. Participation in the QSO Parties has declined and we need to modify the rules in order to make the QSO Parties fairer and hopefully more enjoyable.

Please send any comments on the above recommended changes to me at n0twterry@yahoo.com. I will review your comments and report the findings in the next newsletter.

Ten Ten will be represented at 11 Hamfests this year. We rarely break even for these events, but it is important that we keep up an appearance. We have eliminated having Board of Director meetings in conjunction with the Dayton Hamvention and this has reduced our expenditure considerably. I

would encourage any of you who have a local hamfest to request literature from WN4AMO if you want to set up a booth at your local hamfest. We should thank all members who have given their time and expense for manning booths at these events. The German 10-10 members set up a booth at the Friedrichshafen Germany hamfest this year. A special thanks goes out to them for helping to promote our organization in Europe.

QCWA 70th Anniversary Charity Cruise will take place October 18 thru October 29. This 11-day cruise will visit lots of Caribbean islands and gives an opportunity to work hams operating maritime mobile while they are cruising. I had originally planned to make this cruise but personal reasons caused me to cancel. I was going to do a 10-10 forum during this cruise so unfortunately this will not happen. Hope you get a chance to work hams while they operate from Holland America's MS Koningsdam.

Sad to see more chapters folding. With poor propagation it is difficult to keep many of the chapters functional. My thanks to those chapters who stay functional during these difficult times.

And, the daily 10-10 nets (28.380 and 28.800 Mhz) still struggle to keep active during these poor propagation times. Since I am a net control station, some days there are no check ins and the next day there are more than 20. With the band conditions as they are, there is no way to determine whether there will be any contacts or not.

Congratulations to WA2HMM and 4X6DK for submitting Country Awards upgrades. Charles WA2HMM received an upgrade for 65 countries and David 4X6DK for 100 countries. There have been just 52 awards for working 100 10-10 countries since the inception of the award so this is a great achievement.

During poor propagation time periods, it may be time to review your 10 meter antenna. Verticals do not offer any gain so it may be time to upgrade your antenna to one with gain, either a beam or quad. I run a 4-element quad and am very pleased with its performance. One benefit of quads is they work pretty good even at a low mounting height.

I would encourage everyone to keep their dues up to date. Also, the scholarship fund could use your donation to help defray the (5) \$2,000 awards that 10-10 issues each year. I think the scholarship donation is one of the most important functions of our organization. Helping others with their education is a valuable asset.

Remember that your Board of Directors is here to serve the members. Any questions, concerns, etc. can be addressed to any of the BOD members.

DX News

Mike Davidson, N5MT (#24949)

There was a 10-10 table at the Irving TX hamfest on June 9-10th with the help of our past President, Mel KD5DE #33513 and myself. We renewed about ten members and received a few scholarship donations for our efforts. The crowd at HamCom was twice the size of the Houston hamfest in March, as there is a bigger ham base in the Dallas - Fort Worth area. We logged a lot of names in the 10-10 table sign-in book.

The season has changed to Fall for us in the USA and propagation on Ten is unpredictable but we do have days when there is one hop E-propagation. I try to check-in to the daily net on 28380 at least twice a week but my average is I can only hear it once a week. Our Field Day outing this year was a great success. We had about 150 contacts on Ten plus some contacts on 6 Meters! Propagation was not as good on 20 meters but we did make more contacts this year with a better SSB setup with two new antennas.

The Summer QSO Party 2017 had better propagation than the previous year. This year, I made 363 QSOs, had 43 new 10-10 members and six DX contacts, which was a hundred and fifty more than last year. The station that won the contest was Al N5XZ, who made one big contact with Europe when a station from Sardinia Italy called him.

The range of solar flux has set a record of being less than eight points from the high and low for the month of June 2017! The high was 79.4 the low 71.5, a difference of 7.9! This is another indication that the cycle is reaching its end.

I still expect poor conditions on Ten for the next two years as this cycle reaches its final days and this cycle ends. The flux will stay in the 70's and 80's for the rest of Cycle 24 and Cycle 25 is expected to start about the fall of 2019. I just submitted my daily and contest logs to the LoTW system so be sure to upload your logs at least each quarter! North Korea P5 still is the number one most wanted country/entity for many hams that missed it in the past.

Countries Award: There was one Basic Countries Award submitted and two upgrades issued this quarter. There have only been two members that have ever turned in a batch of 100 countries and we got one from David 4X6DK #36972 this past month. All 100 of his contacts were validated OK and I

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mailed his certificate to him airmail back to Israel. During the past ten years we have only had twenty-five Basic awards issued. There have been 117 member applications in those ten years with an average of 183 upgrade apps submitted. Each app averaged about 9 countries so I verified at least 1650 countries over ten years. So be sure to read the Rules at the 10-10 website for all awards and do not make a mistake. If you apply for any award, get the correct forms at the 10-10 website.

I am posting this to the 10-10 website on September 1st.

Propagation: I expect the solar flux to range from 67-90 during the fall months of 2017. The Fall Equinox is on September 21st, when HF propagation will shift to east/west propagation paths. Just a few days after the Equinox will be the start of our fall DX contest season in the US.

The peak solar flux of this cycle was in February 2014 with a value of 170.3. Our solar cycle #24, has been the weakest solar cycle in more than a 100 years and it is slowly going through the solar minimum phase which ends with the beginning of cycle #25, probably in twenty-five to thirty months. There have been a few CME flares on the sun this summer, but the X-ray output from the sun was minimal. I just saw the solar eclipse and observed three flares in the rim light, which was exciting! The natural cycle of the sun is still 11 years and we are now 8 2/3 years into cycle #24. I predict cycle #25 will start about the end of 2019 and it will be weaker than our current cycle #24!

The maximum solar flux for each month of 2017 was: Jan 87, Feb 83, March 91, April 112, May 82, June 79, July 95 and August 93.

The minimum flux for the same period 2017: Jan 71, Feb 72, March 70, April 71, May 69, June 71, July 68 and August 68. Note: A first for this cycle, in June, the flux stayed within 8 points of the high and low!

On September 1st, the solar flux was 93, the A index was 19 and K index 4. The sun has produced several solar flares that could be seen during the solar eclipse on August 21st. The solar flux high for August 2017 was 50 points lower than the May 2016 high of 123.

My Prediction: Over the next four months, the best conditions: Sept 17-21st, Oct 15-18th, Nov 11-13th, Dec 8-12th which is the ARRL 10 Meter contest weekend. For USA, expect slight chance of DX to Europe or Asia with a 25% chance of DX to S. America and the S. Pacific, later in the day. Listen to the beacons from 28.175-28.300 so you will know which direction the DX signal is coming.

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CW CORNER

CW on 10 meters since our last visit has been very slim pickings. In fact, I have to go back to February 19 to find my last CW contact on 10 meters, in spite of some nice Sporadic E openings and a handful of beacons being heard at my Illinois QTH.

In the absence of propagation, other Amateur Radio projects have been tended to, including the installation of a new homebrew dipole at 25 feet. This replaces the Antron 99 Vertical I purchased over the winter, which had an issue with the SWR wanting to jump around like a can of beans. This has gotten me on the lower bands, with efforts being geared toward finishing off my Senator Award for the Straight Key Century Club. This involved making 200 contacts with either Centurion or Tribune members of the SKCC, after the chaser of the award has obtained the Tribune. I currently sit at 164 of the required 200 contacts. While this sounds like a valiant feat, I have been working on that since 2013, so I have been rather slow in pursuing it, so now is truly the time. I am pleased to report that 78 of those 164 contacts were made on 10 meters.




Some thoughts on FT8 mode.

First off, you MUST make sure you have an accurate and stable clock in the PC. I suggest you run a program to make sure, I am running "NetTime", it is FREE. Power is not required. QRO is 20 watts; typical station power is 5 to 10 watts. Almost any antenna will work. I have worked DX stations, which are running 2 watts and an indoor dipole, on 20 meters.


The FT8 software is FREE. It can be downloaded from the WSJT website. There is also a tutorial there, and it is well written.

Work DX with low power and a simple antenna; exchange 10-10 QSO info.

Then the "Enable TX", to send your info.



I wanted to thank you for your work with the Foundation of Amateur Radio. I am truly honored to be a recipient of the 10-10 International Net Scholarship this year. 

Last year, in the Fall 10-10 News I told you about my involvement in emergency communications during Cyclone Hud Hud that occurred in October 2014. Once again it was proved that when everything else fails. Ham Radio gets the job done. I was interviewed by the film

star Mr. Nagarjuna on a popular TV program about my emergency communications. This was telecast several times and by several local TV channels. I was featured in the July 2015 issue of CQ Magazine (Page 12).

Details about my emergency communication activity is now taught in the Class IX English subject in the schools in the states of Telangana and Andhra Pradesh, India. I am helping to propagate the hobby among the youth of my country.

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EDZs: Stacked and Unstacked

Editor's note: This article is a reprint of an article done by L.B. Cebik, W4RNL (SK), #41159 in a previous issue of this newsletter.

After an article on EDZs (extended double Zepps) appeared in Communications Quarterly in Fall, 1995, I received some mail and phone calls on a version of the antenna I had not covered. So I thought I would bring it to your attention. The EDZ is a good fixed wire antenna for those who do not wish to fool with towers and rotators, but do wish to work some DX when the band fully reopens. It helps to have high trees or other tall poles to support the ends and you have to like ATUs (Antenna Tuning Units or transmatches). Even if you do not like these things, read on – they can grow on you.

THE BASIC EDZ

The basic EDZ is a 1.25-wavelength wire antenna fed at the center. Unlike a dipole, precision wire cutting is not required. A 1—meter EDZ needs about 44 feet of copper wire. The feedpoint impedance will be about 130 ohms with about 680 ohms of capacitive reactance. I recommend you use 450-ohm parallel feedline to an ATU. Although you can match the EDZ to 50-oyhm coax at the antenna feedpoint, you would lose the ability to use the antenna on other bands. For every band 2—meters and up, the antenna is longer than a dipole and thus shows a little gain above a dipole.




Figure 1. Azimuth Radiation Pattern of EDZ v.s. Dipole

At 10-meters, an EDZ up 40' in the air shows about 3.5 dB gain over a dipole. Of course, both antennas are bidirectional. The EDZ gets its gain by shrinking the side-to-side beamwidth of its two main lobes. The dipole has a half-power beamwidth of about 78 degrees while the EDZ cuts that to about 30 degrees with two small side lobes in each direction. See Figure 1.

Some folks view the sidelobes as QRM producers. If you agree, see the ARRL Antenna Compendium, Vol. 4 for an EDZ with capacitors in the elements to eliminate them. However, you may lose some performance of the antenna on other bands.

Almost any wire antenna for 10 up in the air 40' has a take-off angle of 12 degrees above the horizon. Take-off angle means the elevation of the lobe with the most power in it. The half-power points are ±6 degrees around that angle, so there is plenty of power in the low angles needed for efficient DXing. But




Figure 2. Vertically Stacked EDZ Antennas

perhaps we can do a little better.

Stacking any two antennas will do two important things for you: 1. It will increase the system gain a bit and 2. it will lower the take-off angle a bit. Both these advantages are DXer delights. So let's get crackin' and stackin'. The system I shall show you derives from an article in the November 1968, *CQ* by John Schultz, W2EEY called "The Expanded Lazy-H Antenna." (My thanks to Henry Pollock, WB4HFL, for sending me a copy of the article.)

A vertical spacing of 5/8ths of a wavelength is about the most efficient gain producer when stacking antennas. This applies to Yagis and other arrays as well as EDZs. At 10 meters, this means a spacing of about 22' or so. Again, this number is not critical plus or minus a foot. Figure 2 shows the general scheme. Assuming you have the side supports, there are only a few questions to ask about stacked EDZs.




Figure 3. EDZ Lazy-H Elevation Pattern on 10 meters

- 1. What do I get for my trouble? First, you get 3 to 4 dB additional gain in both directions, depending upon which wire you set at the 40' level, where we placed our one-wire EDZ. If you can put the second wire at about 60' or so, you will get the higher gain, plus a lower take-off angle of 9 degrees. That puts the bulk of your power in the 10-meter far-DX zone. Figure 3 also shows a secondary lobe at about 28 degrees for shorter paths. If you place the lower wire at about 20' up, you will get the lower gain and a basic take-off angle of 14 degrees. This is still worth while.
- 2. How do I aim single and stacked EDZs? With care since they are fixed. In much of the US, the NE-SW corridor gets you both Europe and VK-ZL-land. Or you can broadside N-S for South America and over-the-pole and back scatter. Or, you can broadside to Asia. Finally, if you have lots of trees or poles, you can build 3 EDZ stacks and switch among them (a nice wiry dream).
- 3. How do I feed the beast? The easiest feed system is to run 450-ohm parallel feeders from each feedpoint to a common center. At that point, you will see something like 75 ohms resistive and about 460 ohms inductive impedance. This situation gives us a choice.
- a. If you wish to use the antenna on 10 meters only, you can insert on each side of the line junction a 24 pF capacitor. This is a series connection on each side with the end then connected to each side of a coax connector. The capacitors cancel out the inductive reactance, leaving only about the same mismatch you would get with a dipole--and that's manageable.
- b. If you wish to use the antenna on all bands from 20 meters on up, just connect more 450-ohm parallel feeder and bring it to the shack and ATU. On 20 you will get dipole gain or better, with more gain on the other bands between 20 and 10.
- 4. What does it cost? Well, #14 wire runs about 7 to 12 cents a foot, depending on its nature, and 88' of wire is in the \$8.00 range. Add some insulators and rope

for supports. Then add the 450-ohm parallel feeder, which is cheaper than coax. Even if you have to erect some supports (4 sections of 10' TV mast per side, plus rope guys and tie-down ring-screws in the ground), you might run the bill to \$75 to \$100. That will barely buy the TV rotator, let along the tower and very light beam that goes with it.

Editor's note: These prices may have been true in 2000. I am sure today's prices will be a bit more.

Note that, as in all antenna work, we must compromise. The stacked EDZ requires supports and fixes your general directions to two, but saves you many dollars, pounds, yen, francs, marks, or lire. The long Yagi with the same gain gives you freedom of direction, but empties your pockets and requires constant maintenance. (Remember, Murphy's law says that when the rotator goes bad, it is always stuck in a direction with no hams in sight.) So the EDZ and the stacked EDZ array are suitable only for some people. But perhaps you are one of them.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN 10-10?

Here is what you need:

- 1. You must hold a valid amateur operator license.
- 2. Your valid amateur operator license MUST authorize or qualify you for unsupervised transmitting operations in the ten meter amateur band under your own personal call sign.
- 3. You must make contact with ten members of 10-10 and submit a log listing all contacts, their 10-10 number, call sign, name (as received off the air), date of contact, and QTH (state/province/country). The contact form and membership application is provided on the page that follows.
- 4. You must remit dues for one or more year's full membership. Fee schedule and payment information can be found in Section 2 of the page that follows.

TYPES OF MEMBERSHIPS

To become a member either fill out the form on the following page and mail to the Data Manager at the indicated address or go on-line to the 10-10 web page, www.ten-ten.org and follow the links from 'membership' to 'application' and select membership category.

Primary Membership

Primary membership is available with yearly dues, although there is a special incentive available when you pay for three years at once.

Family Membership

Family membership consists of a primary member and one or more family members who qualify as a 10-10 member (has made the necessary 10 contacts) and who reside at the same location and postal address. Family memberships run concurrently with that of the primary member. Add \$5.00 for each additional family member for each year. Only the primary member will receive a copy of the 10-10 News.

Life Membership

Life membership is available and may be paid in one lump sum or spread across two or three yeas. For information refer to the "Life Membership Application" form on the web or contact the 10-10 Data Manager.

Senior Life Membership

TEN-TEN QSO PARTY RULES

5.2 10-10 QSO PARTIES

10-10 QSO Parties are events that are held for fun and to meet old, new and prospective members around the world. The rules listed here are for all general QSO parties. The Spirit of 76 and Open Season QSO Parties are specialty events and do have additional rules. The Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers are year long contact events.

5.2.1 WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

QSO Parties are open to all amateurs with operating privileges on the 10 meter band, however, logs will be accepted only from active members as of the date of the event with the following exception: Open Season event logs will be accepted from all amateurs. Other logs received will be handled as check logs. Check logs are used to validate (check) other logs, but do not qualify the sender for any awards. A QSO party contact log submitted by an Amateur that intentionally submits erroneous contact information to cause errors on membership applications and awards, will be considered an invalid log. Ten-Ten will not accept any log of contacts from an Amateur who had his or her membership/1010 number revoked.

5.2.2 WHEN ARE THE QSO PARTIES?

There are currently nine QSO Parties held throughout the calendar year:

Winter Phone - held on the first full weekend in February 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Spring Digital - held on the last full weekend in April. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Spring CW - held on the first full weekend in May. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Open Season (PSK) - held on the first full weekend in June 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Spirit of 76 - 7 day, 6 mode event around 4 July each year 0001 UTC Monday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Summer Phone - held on the first full weekend in August. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Sprint - a 24 hour event held on October 10th (10-10). 0001 UTC through 2359 UTC. Fall CW - held on the third full weekend in October. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. Fall Digital - held on the second full weekend in November. 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday.

5.2.3 FREQUENCY AND MODES

Direct unassisted contacts only are permitted. Repeater, Satellite, IRLP, Echolink, or any other similar type of assisted contacts are NOT allowed. Based on the appropriate band plan for the country of operator, CW QSO Parties should be operated in the CW area of the 10 meter band and operated using CW only. Digital QSO Parties should be operated in the digital area of the 10 meter band and operated using Digital modes only (RTTY, PSK, etc). Phone QSO Parties must be operated in the PHONE area of the 10 meter band and may be operated using any approved method (SSB, FM, AM). The SPRINT utilizes all operating modes in the 10 meter band. NOTE: A QUIET ZONE between 28.490 and 28.510 shall be in effect during QSO Parties using the Phone portion of the 10 meter band to allow for others to use the band.

5.2.4 ENTRY CLASSIFICATION

Entrants may submit a log in ANY of the following classifications:

INDIVIDUAL: Includes single station operators and can also include OM/XYL teams or any families or groups of people using individual call signs and 10-10 numbers.

QRP: same as an individual as listed above except that output power does not exceed 5 watts with CW/Digital operations and/or 10 watts with Phone operations during the entire event.

CLUB: A Club must have a valid club station license issued by their National Licensing Authority and must have an active 10-10 membership. Club entries must list the call, name, and 10-10 number (if any) for all operators using the club call. Club operations will take place at one location using one set of equipment. Operators entering under a club entry may also enter an individual log for contacts made using their own call sign.

MOBILE: A mobile applies to car, truck, RV, motorcycle, boat, airplane or other mode of transportation. Use of a base station antenna, amplifier or commercial power is not permitted. Operation while your vehicle is parked across a county line, occupying two counties, counts as two counties and two contacts. Marine and aeronautical mobiles must be able to establish counties of operation. Safety is paramount while operating mobile. If you are unable to park near multiple county lines due to safety issues (i.e. on a bridge, on a freeway, etc.), please move to the closest area which would provide the best operating conditions and still be able to give out multiple counties. Duplicate entries are allowed when working in multiple counties. In addition to the normal log information provided the County Worked from and County worked must also be included. Mobile stations will receive awards within their own category and will not be included in the individual sections or Top Ten in the World. Mobile entries will only be accepted for Winter & Summer Phone and 10-10 Sprint QSO Parties.

5.2.5 TRANSMITTER INFORMATION

An operator may operate mobile, portable or fixed. If they change their exchange QTH during the QSO Party, the operator must show same in their log. The operator may enter a log from one call district, province, or DX country. Multi-transmitters (two or more transmitters operating simultaneously, sharing one call sign) are NOT permitted in any QSO Party. If a single transmitter becomes inoperable, it is permissible to change to a replacement transmitter.

5.2.6 EXCHANGE

10-10 members send call sign, name, 10-10# and QTH (State, Province or Country). If received exchange does not have a 10-10#, then record a zero(0) in the log.

5.2.7 QSO POINTS

Two (2) points are awarded for contacts WITH a 10-10 number. One (1) point is awarded for contacts WITHOUT a 10-10 number. Duplicate entries should be retained in log and show a zero (0) for points. Any log showing 10% or more errors may be handled as a check log. A station may be counted only once regardless of mode except during certain specialty events.

5.2.8 CHAPTER SCORE ASSIGNMENT

Any entrant who is a chapter member and whose operating location is within 150 miles of the primary net location of that charter, may assign the entrant's score to that chapter. QSO Party scores for the Sprint may not be assigned.

5.2.9 QSO PARTY ENTRIES

Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager as identified in the 10-10 NEWS or on the 10-10 web site. It is strongly suggested that logs be sent as soon as possible after the close of the event. It is also recommended that DX logs should be sent AIR Mail to ensure they are received in good time. Any logs received with a postmark date AFTER the deadline date will be handled as a check log. Any logs received more than 15 days after the entry deadline, regardless of postmark, will be discarded. All logs may be sent via Email. Logs (if cabrillo, adif, or text) may also be uploaded at www.hamclubs.info/scorer/. Please no .Q95 files.

5.2.9.1 ENTRY DESCRIPTION

Entries must contain a Cover Sheet, Log and Dupe Sheet as described here: COVER SHEET will list the Event Entered, Entry Classification, US Call Area (W0-W9 or DX Country), Chapter Score Assignment (if any), number of contacts and points with 10-10#, number of contacts and points without 10-10#, and total contacts and points claimed. LOGS must be listed in date/time order and list UTC Date, UTC Time, Call, Name, 10-10# (zero (0) if none), QTH and Contact Point Value. A DUPE SHEET is required for any logs exceeding 50 contacts. It may be either a list of all calls contacted in call sign order or hand entered on a dupe sheet grid.

5.2.9.2 ENTRY DEADLINES

Entries for all QSO Parties listed EXCEPT the Sprint shall be postmarked no later than 15 calendar days (this will always be a Monday) after the close of the event. Mailed entries for the Sprint (held on 10/10) shall be postmarked no later than October 25th, unless that day falls on a Sunday, then the postmark deadline shall be October 26th.

5.2.10 QSO PARTY RESULTS AND AWARDS

QSO Party results will be posted on the 10-10 web site about 15 days after the closing deadline for the event and also printed in the 10-10 NEWS in the appropriate issue. Awards will be issued by the certificate manager for Top Ten Individual scorers in the World, the top individual scorer in each Us Call Area (W0-W9), each DX Country, and for top QRP, CLUB, MOBILE and CHAPTER. Electronic certificates will be sent to the 2nd and 3rd place scorers in these categories.

5.2.11 ANNIVERSARY and MEET THE VOLUNTEERS EVENTS

These events run from January 1 0001 UTC to December 31 2359 UTC. In the Anniversary event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members that have the anniversary year contained in their membership number. Example: 2010 is the 48th anniversary year of 10-10 International Net, Inc. Contact with members containing a "48" in their membership number (i.e.,72048, 69485,64854, 48126, 00487) would count toward the event. Each year the anniversary number changes, making a new group of members the focus of the event and promoting the use of the 10-meter band. All general rules are applicable with the following exceptions: During the calendar year (January 1 through December 31) make legal 10-10 contacts with 10-10 Number, Date, Call Sign, QTH with members containing the anniversary year in their membership number as described above. In the MEET THE VOLUNTEERS event, entrants may submit a log of contacts with members listed in the 10-10 NEWS as being a 10-10 volunteer. One contact per volunteer is

permitted, regardless of mode of contact. In both events, contacts must be made on the 10-meter band with any legal mode (AM, SSB, FM, PSK, CW, etc.). All submitted logs must contain only one entry for each 10-10 number contacted. Contacts MUST be listed in 10-10 number order and each entry must list the 10-10 Number, Date, Call, Name, QTH and Mode, in that order. These events are for Individual entries as described in section 5.2.4 and certificates will be awarded for the TOP Ten, however all entrants will be listed in the 10-10 NEWS. Logs MUST be postmarked no later than January 15th of the year following both the Anniversary and Meet the Volunteers events. Only members in good standing (with dues paid) are allowed to submit logs.

5.2.12 SPIRIT OF 76 (7 Days, 6 Modes) QSO PARTY

This event will run for 7 days and be around July 4th of each year. Make as many contacts as you can during the week using 6 modes. The modes that will be used are as follows as well as the suggested frequencies to monitor:

- 1. USB (28.345) 2. RTTY (28.086) 3. CW (28.050)
- 4. FM (29.600) 5. PSK (28.120) 6. AM (29.000)

Scoring will be as normal for QSO Parties, 2 points for members and 1 point for non-members. Dupes will be allowed once for each mode. It will be possible to work the same call 6 times in each of the various modes for a maximum total of 12 points per call. All other normal rules apply. Logs shall be forwarded to the QSO Party Manager.

5.2.13 10-10 SPRINT (October 10) QSO PARTY

An award will be issued for working all 10 USA Call Districts.

5.2.14 W6OI/VE9TEN/DL0X SPECIAL EVENT

This event is held during the 3rd weekend of November each year from 0001 UTC Saturday through 2359 UTC Sunday. This special event operation is where volunteers operate the 10-10 official club stations (W6OI/VE9TEN/DL0X) seeking to work anyone anywhere. Any mode of operation is permitted. Many operators will be authorized to operate W6OI from most US states and VE9TEN from various Provinces/Territories simultaneously. DL0X is operated by Henry, DL8YBM. The purpose is to have fun promoting 10-meter activity making contacts with 10-10 members and of course, non-members. This is a great way to increase membership! Exchange is similar to any 10-10 party event - name, call, QTH, 10-10 number if one is available. As contacts are made, provide info on 10-10 organization and where to find our website - www.ten-ten.org. If anyone wants to volunteer to operate W6OI during this event contact Jerry, N9AC. Members in Canada should contact Rob, VE9KM for permission to operate VE9TEN.
